Many of us who serve the University in various capacities are often confronted with questions concerning names, addresses, and occupations of our alumni. We are also asked how a friend or alumnus may become a member of our growing association, types of membership available, and other contributions or gifts that may be made to the University's Alumni Foundation Program.

Recent issues of our ALUM-NUS Magazine have seen a new approach to alumni recognition and alumni listing. However, to better satisfy your many questions, we are devoting this entire "special issue" of the ALUMNUS to what we will call our Annual Foundation Report.

You will note that "active" members of our association are listed in alphabetical order by states where they are now residing. Other classification of membership include President's Club and Alumni "M" Club.

This report will also show our membership growth over the past two years (since computerized programming was started) and will show growth potential so we can observe the work that is ahead of us. This is where our "Eagle Hunt" Campaign comes into focus.

Many of our alumni with expressed interest in Morehead State University have asked, "How can I give to the University?" With this in mind, we are including a section that will better explain the total "giving" program. A listing of those alumni who have participated in these methods of giving are listed in this report.

We hope this report will be most beneficial to you, explaining many of our programs, recognizing new programs of interest, and encouraging you to become more involved in activities of your alma mater.

### ALUMNI ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP

Membership in the Morehead State University Alumni Association is classified as active membership and associate membership.

Active membership is obtained by a donation to the Foundation by all persons who have graduated from Morehead Normal School, Morehead State Normal School and Teachers College, Morehead State Teachers College, Morehead State College, and Morehead State University. Others included in active membership are individuals who have attended as full-time students at these respective schools for two full terms and whose class has graduated.

Associate membership is available to present and past members of the administration, staff, faculty, friends of the University, parents of present and past students and members of the Board of Regents.

# ALUMNI FOUNDATION METHODS OF GIVING

#### GIFT OF CASH/CHECK

The easiest method of contributing to the support of the Morehead State University Alumni Foundation is a gift by cash or check. For those in higher income brackets this simple gift technique has attractive tax considerations. A cash or check gift can reduce the actual cost of the gift by eliminating the amount of tax a person normally would be required to pay on that part of his income if he did not make the gift. You can determine the effect of a gift on your individual tax situation by checking current federal income tax tables.

#### **GIFT OF RROPERTY**

Often it is more convenient for an individual to give property to the university than to make a gift from income. There are a number of advantages to be obtained through a gift of property particularly if the property has increased in value since it was purchased by the individual. If a donor should decide to make a

gift of real estate, charitable contribution deduction would be allowed on the individual income tax return based on the fair market value of the property at the time of donation. This fair market value should be determined by a qualified appraiser obtained by the donor. In the case of real property such as homes, buildings, or land, it is possible for the donor to make a transfer of the property to the university and yet retain the use and enjoyment of the property for the remainder of his or her lifetime. In such cases the individual may obtain an immediate tax deduction on a charitable gift in the year in which the transfer of property is effective. If you are considering a gift of real estate to the Alumni Foundation, it is suggested that you contact the Alumni Office to insure that your gift is properly coordinated with university programs and procedures.

#### SECURITIES:

Gifts in the form of securities are deductible to the extent of the fair market value of securities on the date of gift. Subject, of course, to the usual charitable gift limitations. This rule applies even though the securities have greatly depreciated in value in the hands of the donor prior to the time of gift. If you are considering giving securities to the Alumni Foundation, please write the Alumni Office to receive suggestions on how to make the transfer orderly and systematic.

#### GIFT OF KIND:

Gift of art, book or other collections, as well as gifts of personal property and commercial products, are known as gifts in kind. Gifts in kind offer special advantages to persons whose estates have relatively small amounts of cash and other liquid assets. In these cases, it may be necessary in estate settlement for executors to sell residences, collections, and other personal property to raise sufficient funds to pay taxes and other settlement costs. By reducing estates earlier through gifts in kind, forced sales may be avoided. Business firms may contribute inventory or stock in trade to the Alumni Foundation.

#### **DEFERRED GIFTS:**

LIFE INSURANCE. A life insurance policy may be given to the Morehead State University Alumni Foundation by naming the Foundation sole beneficiary and irrevocably assigning ownership of the policy to it. An amount approximating cash

surrender value is considered a gift to the university and may be claimed as a charitable contribution in the year the policy is assigned. In addition, as premiums continue to be paid, they are fully deductible on income tax returns in the years paid. If you are considering a gift of this type, please consult your insurance agent or the Alumni Office for additional information that will allow you to be engaged in the gift program without affecting the safety of living beneficiaries.

WILLS AND BEQUESTS: The principle tax consideration in making a gift by will to the Alumni Foundation is that the total value of the gift is deductible for federal estate tax purposes. Unlike the charitable annual deduction which is limited to 30% of adjusted gross income, there is no limitation on the amount of the estate tax deduction for a charitable bequest. For example, if a person bequeaths all of his estate to the university, there will be no federal estate tax to pay, regardless of the size of the estate. An outright bequest, is one which passes at the time of estate settlement directly to the university for its immediate use. most common methods of making outright bequests are: a specific amount of money, a fraction or percentage of the total estate, a fraction of all the residual estate, that part of the estate left after deduction of all expenses, debts, taxes and specific bequests, specific property such as a house, specified real estate, works of art or specified securities etc. An outright charitable bequest under terms of the will is fully deductible from the adjusted growth in determining the taxable estate because federal estate tax rates are progressive property which the charitable bequests removed from the taxable estate would otherwise be taxed at a higher rate. If you are interested in this method of giving, it is suggested that you write the Alumni Office for specific information concerning the restricted and unrestricted bequest plan. The best procedure for each donor to follow should be determined by the donor and his attorney as they work with the Alumni Foundation.

TRUST FUND: The irrevocable trust involves a situation in which a donor irrevocably sets aside assets subject to trust agreement. He may instruct the trustee to invest and manage the trust to pay him or other beneficiaries including the Alumni Foundation the income from the trust. Upon the death of the individ-

ual beneficiary, the trustee will pay the income or transfer the assets of the trust to the university as directed by the terms of the trust. The revocable trust is an arrangement whereby a donor establishes a trust with the income payable to designated recipients but in which the donor retains the right to revoke the trust The advantage of this any time. type of giving is that the donor retains the opportunity to use his funds during his lifetime and his assets receive professional management by the trustee. Barring his revocation, the university receives the benefit of the trust upon the death of the last individual beneficiary and a charitable deduction is allowed to the estate. Estate planning is flexible; it is possible to combine revocable and irrevocable trusts in gifts planned by single individuals.

TEMPORARY INCOME DIVER-SION: An individual may transfer income producing property, stocks, bonds, apartments or other rental property to the Alumni Foundation for two or more years and direct that the university use the income earned during that period. At the end of the period, the property can revert to the owner or can be transferred to a short term. Trust of this nature could be of interest to persons whose high income tax brackets are due largely to salary and other employment compensations, but who have accumulated some income producing wealth and anticipate lower income after retirement or at a later period. Regardless of the disposition of the property at the termination of the agreement, income that the university receives during its period of stewardship is not taxed to the donor. In addition the donor also may claim a charitable deduction for income received by the university during its stewardship if the property does not revert to the donor at the conclusion of the agreement. In effect, this is a double deduction.

A TAX ESTABLISHED BY WILL: A testamentary trust is an arrangement made by will whereby legal ownership of property is placed with a trustee who pays the income from the property to one or more beneficiaries. It does not become operative and binding until the death of the donor. Such a trust may give the income for life to a wife, son, daughter or other designated person. The trust may be divided so that separate incomes go to a number of people. On the death of the beneficiary, the trust principal may pass to the university. Under this plan, the life interest of the beneficiary in this state is subject to estate taxes. This increases the residue available for the trust and thereby increases the annual income paid to the beneficiary. This testamentary trust has the added advantage of placing the estate in the hands of skilled management—the trustee of the trust. This can be important to a man who would like to make maximum provisions for his wife but who is concerned about her ability to manage a large estate.

ANNUITIES: Persons who wish to make an important contribution to the Morehead State University Alumni Foundation, but do not wish to reduce their income from investments, so often satisfy both the requirements with an annuity. The annuity's plan carries a lot of benefits for the individual and it is suggsted that you check a schedule of gift annuity guaranteed rates of return at various ages.

LIFE INCOME CONTRACTS: Life contracts are similar annuity arrangements but differ in one major respect. Where an annuity guarantees the rate of return, even if it means distributing the principal, the preferred life income contract provides the actual return earned by the university's pooled endowment. This method of return is established in the contract and the principal is never invaded. Life income contracts also may be made on more than one life. For example, on a man and his wife. Among the possible advantages to a donor of a life income contract are:

a. Charitable contributions deduction larger than with an annuity; b. Relief of financial management responsibility; c. Capital gains tax avoided; d. Estate tax advantages.

Both annuities and life income contracts enable individuals to gain financial management of their investment from the same competent investment counselors who manage the foundation funds.

TAX EXEMPT INCOME: A tax exempt life income contract that assets transferred irrevocably to the Morehead State University Alumni Foundation are to be placed in investments such as municipal bonds, which provides income exempt from federal taxes. This income is received by the university and paid to the income recipient to whom it remains tax free. Tax savings resulting from such an agreement are similar to those derived from the taxable income agreement with one exception. Capital gain taxes must be paid by the donor on depreciated property used to fund tax exempt agreements. Even though a capital gain tax may be required in this situation, the advantage of tax free income for life could more than offset this factor. The capital gains tax disadvantages are eliminated if the agreement is funded with cash, unappreciated property, proceeds from the sale of property that has decreased in value, or tax exempt bonds already owned by the donor.

Editor's note: If you have already named the Alumni Foundation a beneficiary in your will, life insurance, or other deferred gift instrument please let this be known to the University so that deserved recognition can be extended to you and your gift intention coordinated with policies and procedures of the institution.

We hope that the ideas presented here will suggest to you some avenues for your giving that will enable you to receive satisfaction in your support of alumni programs. Whatever your motive in giving, a gift to the Morehead State University Alumni Foundation is an opportunity to help your fellowman and to capture for yourself a feeling of accomplishment and participation in the lives of young people in their endeavor to receive a quality education at a quality institution.

HENRY C. HAGGAN ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP - The Alumni Association initiated a scholarship in honor of Henry C. Haggan, professor of agriculture on the Morehead State University faculty from 1923 until his retirement in 1964. The scholarship is awarded in the amount of \$200.00, payable at the rate of \$100.00 for The scholarship is each semester. awarded to a high school senior who has excelled in agriculture and wishes to continue in this field of study while attending Morehead State University. The award is administered by the Alumni Association with the cooperation and aid of the agriculture faculty of the University. Applications may be mailed to the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

A. Y. LLOYD ALUMNI SCHOL-ARSHIP IN PUBLIC ADMINISTRA-TION - The Alumni Association initiated a scholarship in Public Administration in honor of Dr. A. Y. Lloyd, a former member of the Morehead State University faculty. The award is made to an upper classman enrolled at Morehead who has demonstrated outstanding academic ability and has an expressed interest in Public Administration. The grant is in the amount of \$200.00 payable at the rate of \$100.00 per semester. recipient of the scholarship is selected jointly by the Chairman of the Division of Social Studies, the Director of Government Service Training Program and the Director of Alumni Affairs. Applications should be sent to the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

THE JESSE T. MAYS MEMORIAL ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP—The Alumni Association and the Morehead State University Campus Club initiated a memorial scholarship in honor of Jesse T. Mays, an instructor in Industrial Education at Morehead

GENERAL SCHOLARSHIPS - A number of scholarships are awarded each year to outstanding high school seniors who need financial assistance in order to attend Morehead State University. These scholarships are in the amount of \$100.00 per semester and are automatically renewed if the recipient maintains a standing of 2.5. To apply for one of these scholarships an applicant must file a report of his high school record with the office of Alumni Affairs by March 30 along with a scholarship application form which will be furnished upon request by the Director of Alumni Affairs. Letters of recommendation are very helpful and it is suggested that applicants have at least one recommendation from a graduate of Morehead State University

ALUMNI-FACULTY A WARD SCHOLARSHIP —A scholarship in the amount of \$200.00 is presented annually to a student enrolled at Morehead State University. The grant is awarded in honor of the recipient of the Alumni Association's Distinguished Faculty Award. Both the recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award and the scholarship award will be named at the alumni banquet held annually in May. The scholarship is awarded to a Morehead stu-

dent on the basis of financial need and achievement within the field of study in which the recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award teaches. The recipient is named by an alumni committee and applications are not accepted for the award.

GABRIEL BANKS ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP — Lloyd Cassity, a past president of the Morehead Alumni Association and member of the Board of Regents, has established a scholarship fund in honor of Gabriel Banks, an associate professor emeritus of English. The award is payable in the amount of \$100.00 each semester provided a standing of 2.5 is maintained. High school seniors are eligible and applications should be in the hands of the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30. Preference is given to potential English students.

MONA COMBS MEMORIAL ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP — A memorial scholarship fund has been established in honor of Mona Combs, an instructor in English at Morehead State University from 1959-1964. She received the bachelor's degree from Morehead in 1941 and the master's degree in 1958. This award is in the amount of \$200.00 payable at the rate of \$100.00 each semester with the provision that the recipient maintains a 2.5 standing. Applications should be in the hands of the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30. Preference

State University for 35 years and head of the Department of Industrial Arts. This scholarship is awarded each year to a high school senior who would like to study Industrial Arts at Morehead. The award is in the amount of \$200 payable at the rate of \$100 per semester. Applications should be sent to the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

BILL SALISBURY MEMORIAL ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP—A memorial scholarship fund has been established by the Alumni Association in honor of Bill Salisbury, a distinguished alumnus of the University. This award is in the amount of \$200 payable at the rate of \$100 per semester with the provision that the recipient maintain a 2.5 standing. Application should be sent to Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

PEOPLE'S BANK OF MOREHEAD ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP-Each year the Peoples Bank of Morehead sponsors five scholarships that are administered through the Alumni Association. These scholarships are based upon need and scholarship of the student and may be given to entering freshmen or upper classmen attending the University. Each scholarship is in the amount of \$200 payable at the rate of \$100 each semester with the provision that the recipient maintain a 2.5 standing. **Applications** should be sent to Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

CITIZENS BANK OF MORE-HEAD ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP—The Citizens Bank of Morehead sponsors each year two scholarships in the amount of \$300 payable at the rate of \$150 each semester to two deserving Rowan County students. Scholarship applications may be sent to the Director of Alumni Affairs or the Citizens Bank by March 30. Evaluation of applicants is based upon need and scholastic achievement of the student.

MOREHEAD JAYCEE'S ALUM-NI SCHOLARSHIP—Each year the Alumni Association matches a scholarship contribution by the Morehead Jaycees in establishing a \$200 scholarship payable at the rate of \$100 per semester. This scholarship is awarded to a graduate of University Breckinridge or Rowan County High School in Morehead. Application should be sent to the Director of Alumni Relations by March 30.

MOREHEAD WOMEN'S CLUB SCHOLARSHIP—Each year the Morehead Women's Club sponsors two scholarships in the amount of \$200 each payable at the rate of \$100 each semester per scholarship grant. The scholarship is administered by the Alumni Association with applications being accepted by the Alumni Association or the Morehead Women's Club. Applications should be sent by March 30.

ALPHA THETA UPSILON ALUM-NI SCHOLARSHIP—Alpha Theta Upsilon with a working arrangement with the Alumni Association sponsors one scholarship each year in the amount of \$200 payable at the rate of \$100 each semester provided that a standing of 2.5 is maintained. Applications should be sent to the Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30. Preference is given to members of Alpha Theta Upsilon Fraternity.

VET'S CLUB ALUMNI SCHOL-ARSHIP—The Veterans Club on the campus of Morehead State University, sponsors three scholarships each year in the amount of \$50 each semester. These scholarships are administered by the Alumni Association and applications should be made to the president of the Veterans Club or Director of Alumni Affairs by March 30.

THE BAINES "TINY" JONES MEMORIAL ALUMNI SCHOLAR-SHIP-Friends of Baines "Tiny" Jones, teacher and coach in the Mt. Sterling school system for over 30 years, have initiated a memorial scholarship in his honor. The recipient being a deserving student from the Mt. Sterling school system. The amount of the scholarship varies with the need of the individual. Application for the scholarship may be made to Director of Alumni Affairs, Morehead State University, by March 30. Each applicant will be evaluated by the Baines "Tiny" Jones Committee and the Alumni Association will administer the award.



### \$250,000 Grant Awarded MSU

A \$250,000 federal grant has been awarded Morehead State University by the United States Office of Education for the continuation of an eight-state special experimental demonstration project in adult basic education headquartered at the University.

The project, administered through the Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center at Morehead, is designed for the development and demonstration of the use of programs, materials, facilities, and educational technology involved in the teaching of undereducated adults.

The Morehead center, established under provisions of a 1967 planning grant of the U.S. Office of Education, serves as an Appalachian regional service center, according to George Eyster, its executive director.

Through it, a number of special experimental demonstration projects have been developed in the Appalachian regions of the eight states involved — Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, Ohio, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.

The new grant, Eyster said, will provide funds for the continuation of the center and for the operation of the special demonstration projects now underway in the eight states.

All state projects, he pointed out, have been developed within the framework of a state advisory committee.

"These committees have identified problems and have developed demonstration projects for problem solving in selected state areas," he said.

"Each committee has been designed to demonstrate ways of effecting significant improvements, efficiency and effectiveness in the quality of adult basic education among the educationally disadvantaged people of its specific Appalachian area."

directors of adult basic education in each of the eight states provide much of the local leadership, Eyster said, indicating each has submitted special project proposals to the center.

"The new grant will enable many of these projects to become operational immediately," he said, adding that the variety of projects developed and the impact of the total effort is expected to result in the involvement of increasingly large number of undereducated adults in the areas affected.

"The demonstration capability in projects, the information gathered regarding the needs of the undereducated adult and the insights tested in new curricula, materials and technology should be reflected in marked improvements in adult basic education programs in the Appalachian region and the nation," he said.

themselves, were on the campus for a week of dancing and fun.

The name "Knob Tigers" originated from a story told several years ago by Miss Shirley Durham of 4540 Southern Parkway, Louisville, co-director of the Institute. "I was telling tales to scare the Yankees, and a story about a knob tiger just slipped out of my mouth," she said. Since that day some 12 years ago, the group has called itself the "Knob Tigers."

One feature of the camp is "Knob Tiger Night," when persons attending the institute for the first time are initiated into the order of "Knob Tigers." The new initiates have to drink tiger milk and pet a tiger, Miss Durham claimed.

The Institute, which is now in its 15th year, has a relaxed and friendly atmosphere. "The friendliness which prevails at the institute causes people to want to come back," said Miss Durham, who has been with the Institute since its beginning.

Other veteran instructors included M. G. Karsner, of the Western Kentucky University Physical Education Department, co-director of the institute, who has been attending the institute for 14 years. Another 14-year veteran of the institute is Vyts Beliajus, Denver, Colorado, editor of Viltis, a folklore magazine. Beliajus specializes in international dances.

Stu Shacklette of 1121 Christland Avenue, Louisville, has participated in the Institute for eight years. His specialty is square dance calling and he gets plenty of practice, calling an average of six square dances a week during the school year. He supervises five square dance clubs in the Louisville area.

Huig Hofman, a retired school administrator from Belgium, was a special guest instructor at the institute this year. Hofman, who organized a youth organization to promote folk dancing in his native country, made his third appearance at the Institute. He teaches North European dances, and he also makes his own records,



which are imported to dance clubs in the United States.

"I wanted to return to the Kentucky Dance Institute because it is so friendly here, and every one makes me feel right at home," Hofman said. When he was not teaching, he was dancing or planning a new dance to teach the others.

One "celebrity" attending the Institute was Darrell Green, who will appear in four NBC-TV specials next fall with the B Ward Dancers. Green, a native of Montgomery, Ala., will appear in the

dancing chorus on shows starring Andy Williams, Glen Campbell, and Nancy Sinatra.

The Institute is not restricted to any single age group. The group ranged in age from nine-year-old Cece Meyers of South-hampton, Pa., to 73-year-old Mrs. Elizabeth Bennett of Burlington, N. C.

The returnee rate is extremely high at the camp, Miss Durham said. She estimated that about two-thirds of the participants return to the Institute each year.

# CUMBERLAND FOREST MUSIC CAMP "THE SOUND OF MUSIC"

The hills were alive with the sound of music this August at Morehead State University.

Over 330 students, teachers and directors of music attended the third annual Cumberland Forest Music Camp here, representing 34 states and 187 cities.

The camp enrollment, which had more than doubled since last year, included students at all levels of training and experience, said Dr. Robert Hawkins, camp director.

"We offer a full range of activities so that students of all levels, from junior high school to the graduate student, may find work sufficiently challenging to project their musical abilities,"
Dr. Hawkins added.

"The enrollees are very talented youngsters who settled down to work very quickly and were very interested," said Dr. Glenn Fulbright, head of the Music Department at Morehead. "Enthusiasm of both students and faculty was high. We heard some outstanding concerts from the bands."

This year, for the first time, the camp had a baton twirling class conducted by a professional twirler, Mrs. Joyce Ross, who has recently returned from a six months tour with the Harlem Globetrotters basketball team.

Mrs. Ross, who won the Na-

tional Baton Twirling Championship in 1959 and attended Iowa State University on a full scholarship, taught baton and dance to 26 girls from 7:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. each day. Her students ranged in age from 10 years to collegelevel majorettes.

"I'm pleasantly surprised that the girls seem to be so exact," said Mrs. Ross, who performs under her maiden name of Joyce Rice. "Even in this hot sun, the girls are almost always in unison." She explained that each girl received a minimum of four hours instruction daily. The classes were small enough that each girl received a lot of individual instruction, she said.

During the 10-day camp the girls learned about 20 short routines or "series," Mrs. Ross said. "I concentrate on teaching personality projection, posture, and developing confidence. Confidence is a very important requisite for a twirler's success."

Another unique opportunity available at the camp was the option to take harp lessons from Mrs. Margaret White of Indiana University. One veteran harp player was Adrien Dansker, a high-school senior from Bloomington, Ind., who has played the harp for seven years. She began harp lessons because she was tired of piano les-



sons and her parents wanted her to continue music lessons. She is a regular pupil of Mrs. White.

The camp harp class of 26 students included five boys. The students ranged in age from 10 years through college level. The younger members played troubadour harps which cost approximately \$500. Concert harps, the larger models, cost from \$3,000 to \$5,000.

Students can accomplish more in the 10-day camp session than they can during a regular school semester, Mrs. White said, due to the intensive training offered.

Eleven concerts were scheduled during the camp.



### MASTER OF BUSINESS EDUCATION AVAILABLE

A new program, leading to the Master of Business Education degree, has been announced by Dr. C. Nelson Grote, dean of the School of Applied Sciences and Technology at Morehead State University.

The program, which became effective in early June with the opening of the summer term, permits Kentucky teachers of business education to earn Standard Certification and allows students from other areas to broaden their knowledge and experience in the business education area, Dr. Grote said.

The degree program is open to majors or minors in business education or business administration. "The course work is flexible enough," the dean said, "to permit the student's program to be built around the needs of the individual.

"The curriculum especially will be helpful to business administration majors seeking to prepare themselves for teaching on the junior or senior college levels," he added.

Fourteen semester hours are required with 16 semester hours selected to fit the student's background or future career plans.

Dean Grote also announced that graduate assistantships are available for students who wish to work toward the new degree. An assistantship stipend of \$2,200 per year will be paid, he said, and students selected are charged the regular Kentucky resident registration and incidental fees.

Dr. Ardyce Lightner, associate professor of business at Morehead, has been appointed coordinator of the school's Graduate Business Education Program. Inquiries regarding the new graduate degree should be directed to Dr. Lightner.

Their contributions to Morehead State University and higher education in Kentucky will be great as we face the problems of the future."

# Library Receives \$25,102 Grant

A \$25,102 federal grant was awarded Morehead State University for the purchase of new books and materials for the University's Johnson Camden Library.

Jack Ellis, recently-appointed director of the library, said the funds will be provided through the College Library Resources Program under provisions of Title II of the Higher Education Act of 1965. They will be used to increase the number of volumes in the general collection as well as in the special areas of technology, adult education and teaching materials, he said.

Increased demands for volumes in these areas have resulted from the University's involvement in three separate projects — the Appalachian Technical Institute, the Eastern Kentucky Education Development Corporation and the Appalachian Adult Basic Demonstration Center.

The Appalachian Technical Institute is to be established within the University and will offer an associate of applied science degree. Instruction will be provided in the technical areas of nursing, x-ray technology, commercial photography, welding, horticulture, computer technology, interior decorating and construction.

The Eastern Kentucky Education Development Corporation (EKEDC) is a program designed to furnish teaching materials to 35 local school districts. The corporation also furnishes personnel to distribute materials to the public school teachers and to demonstrate their most effective use.

The University library also is actively involved in providing service for the Appalachian Adult Basic Education Demonstration Center, which serves an eight-state area and is headquartered on the campus.

The agency's objective is to develop educational materials and technology for the under-educated adults within its area.

### EDUCATION IN KENTUCKY APPALACHIA

Speakers at a meeting of the Committee on Education in Kentucky Appalachia at Morehead State University this fall unanimously called for greater participation by the people of Appalachia in the decision-making process.

Over 75 leaders in business, industry and education heard former governor Edward T. Breathitt, Jr., who is now Director of the Institute on Rural America, say "The prevailing system of development programs, in which project categories are developed at the top and sent down, is not engaging the full potential of local leadership and initiative. Much thought is now being devoted to changing this system to reverse the flow of program ideas and plans."

John Whisman, State's Regional Representative, Appalachian Regional Commission, Washington, told the gathering that "We have to change. Our people must become the technicians. The outside technician cannot bring about significant change without the use of our people in Appalachia."

The five priorities of the Education Advisory Committee of the Appalachian Regional Commission were spelled out by Charles Foltz, Executive Director, Washington. The priorities are: (1) Bringing about greater cooperation and sharing between local school units and between colleges and universities and secondary and elementary education; (2) Focusing greater attention on vocational and technical education with emphasis on the training of teachers and counselors in these areas; (3) Developing a formalized approach in grades seven to nine which would more clearly define various occupations; (4) Developing early childhood education beginning at age three; and (5) Working toward the training of more teachers and personnel for the school systems of Appalachia with the goal of developing greater holding power in the region.

Frank Groschelle, Administrator, Kentucky Program Development Office, Frankfort, pledged the full support of his office on behalf of the efforts of the Committee on Education in Kentucky Appalachia.

Dr. Adron Doran, President of Morehead State University and Kentucky's representative on the Advisory Committee on Education to the Appalachian Regional Commission, presided at the meeting. Also on the program was D. C. Anderson, State Department of Education.

# OPERATION TALENT SEARCH IS GIVEN \$50,754

Morehead State University has been awarded a \$50,754 federal grant to help finance a 21-county, year-long project designed to discover and identify young people of exceptional ability but lacking the financial resources to continue their education beyond the high school level.

An additional \$7,030 is being provided by the university.

The purpose of the project, entitled "Operation Talent Search," is to encourage these young people, beginning at the junior high school level, to complete their secondary school work and to seek a college education.

Directing the project will be Frank Sandage, graduate school instructor in psychology. Sandage, who came to Morehead at the beginning of the summer term from the University of Kentucky where he has been a doctoral student and an instructor in psychology, is a native of Tell City, Ind.

He received his bachelor of arts degree in 1964 at Southeastern Louisiana College at Hammond and his master's degree from San Diego State in California. He assumed his project responsibilities July 1.

Sandage will continue the project with the academic interests of the young people "discovered" as well as with the influence and support of local resources in the 21-county Eastern Kentucky area.

The counties involved are: Bath, Boyd, Breathitt, Carter, Elliott, Fleming, Floyd, Greenup, Johnson, Knott, Lawrence, Lewis, Magoffin, Martin, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Pike, Rowan and Wolfe.

Working with the project leaders in each county will be a local "discovery committee," made up of community leaders in school or school-related areas.

"Our objective," Sandage said, "is to identify the unusually talented young people in Eastern Kentucky who need financial as-


sistance with which to continue their education but who are likely to fail to get it, for example, because of a failure to meet existing standards of reading skill.

"Others may fail because of a lack of available funds as the result of family income being too low or because of inadequate motivation.

"Still others may fail," he said, "because of a failure to apply for assistance because of a sense of false pride, or because they do not know what funds are available or where and how they could apply for them.

"There also are cases where exceptional children are prevented from continuing their education because of parental resistance to their going on to college.

"These are the types of youngsters we seek to locate and help," he added.



### **EXPERIENCE IN A NEW PROGRAM**

Having been the only boy in most of his classes for the past three years at Morehead State University doesn't seem to have affected Tony Fisher, 21, in the least.

He has been too busy working toward the University's first bachelor of science degree in food service administration to notice his enviable situation. Besides, he's married. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Fisher, 8411 Mayfield Drive, Cincinnati, Tony will be a senior at Morehead in the fall. He expects to be the first Morehead graduate to receive the new degree since the former two-year food service administration program was expanded into a fully-accredited, four-year offering in the School of Applied Sciences and Technology.

Tony also is in the army.

Applying last November for admittance to the Army's Student Dietitian Program, he has been accepted, and on July 9 was enlisted as a private in the reserves at the Armed Forces Entrance Examination Station in Cincinnati.

As such, he automatically became a member of the Student Detachment Unit at Fort Meade, Md., a unit made up of student dietitians and student nurses across the United States.

Having been accepted by the Army, he will receive \$250 per month plus free medical service and Post Exchange privileges at military installations while completing his senior year at Morehead. His only obligations to the Army will be to maintain his 3.00 scholastic standing of the possible 4.00.

Upon graduation next spring, Fisher automatically will be commissioned a second lieutenant in the Army and will go on active duty for four years as a medical specialist.

He also will begin a required one year of dietitian internship at a military hospital, being assigned to one of four in the country — Brooke General at San Antonio, Tex., Fitzsimmons at Denver, Letterman at San Francisco, and Walter Reed in Washington.

"I've asked to be sent to Letterman," he said, "but you never know."

As an intern, he will work under the supervision of the hospital's dietitian and in all phases of food service administration in the installation.

Upon completion of this year's internship, he hopes to receive his license and to be classified as a full-fledged dietitian.

A graduate of Woodward High School, Cincinnati, Tony is married to the former Barbara Holcomb of Fairfield, Ohio. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Holcomb, 6120 Ross Road, Fairfield, she is a senior at Morehead, majoring in business education. They met while students at Morehead and have been married a year.

Since most of his work naturally falls in the Home Economic area, he has been the only boy in many of his classes. One semester, he was the only male in a class with 99 girls.

"It has been like that since I've been at Morehead," he said with a smile, "and it's something to get used to."

Since coming to Morehead, Tony has learned to cook just about anything you'd want to eat and in many different variations.

He also has become proficient in the operation of the quantity cooking equipment in the university kitchens.

He also handles much of the preparation and serving of food at Baptist Student Union functions on the campus and helps with the food service at special events held at either of the University's two cafeterias.

As versatile as he is, there's one thing Tony does not do — cook at home.

"That's Barbara's domain," he added, diplomatically. "I relax and enjoy what she comes up with."



# "WE CAN BE OVC CHAMPS"

Yelling "We can be OVC champs," 80 football hopefuls began fundamental drills at Morehead State University August 26.

Coach John J. (Jake) Hallum, who is beginning his first season as the Eagles' head coach is as optimistic as many of the players. Hallum seems to be all over the field, supervising drills and shouting encouragement to players.

The team opened their season September 14 at Marshall University. Hallum hopes to improve over last season's 4-5-1 overall record.

## Geological Grant Received

A \$32,000 grant effective August 1 was awarded to Morehead State University by the National Science Foundation to finance a two-year geological research study of the North and South Carolina seaboard, Dr. W. C. Simpson, dean of the School of Sciences and Mathematics at the University announced.

In charge of the study will be Dr. Jules R. Dubar, chairman of the department of geoscience at the University and a nationally recognized authority on the area to be studied.

He will be assisted by Harry Hoge, an instructor in geology at Morehead. Hoge will be in charge of the analysis of sediments periodically collected during the study, which will be headquartered at the University.

Purpose of the study is to determine as precisely as possible the land mass changes which have taken place over the past 10 to 20 million years along the inner coastal plain and to combine the results of the study with those obtained in detailed studies already made of the adjacent outer coastal plain, Dr. Simpson said.

It is expected that the knowledge gained will be useful in bringing about a more meaningful correlation of pre-historic events along the Atlantic Coast from Long Island to South Florida.

Dr. DuBar is co-editor with Dr. Robert Q. Oaks, Jr., Utah State University, of a symposium entitled, "Post-Miocene Stratigraphy of the Central and Southern Atlantic Coastal Plain."

A number of geologists across the country also are coordinating their studies on the coastal area and will contribute chapters to the DuBar-Oaks symposium. At present, the number is 22, representing 15 universities, one private research institution, two industrial firms, two state and two federal agencies and four counties.

The study involves the south flank of the Cape Fear Arch in North and South Carolina.

The area is bounded by the Lumber-Little Pee Dee River Valley on the southeast, by the Orangeburg Scarp on the northwest and by the northwest-southwest trending lines passing near to Lumberton, N. C., on the northeast, and a few miles southwest of Florence, S. C., on the southwest.

The surface geology will be mapped, land mass changes studied, the nature and degree of weathering and erosion noted and all significant outcrops examined in detail Dr. DuBar said.

Surface mapping will be supplemented by detail close-spaced cross-sections and a regularly located grid of power auger and rotary drill holes from which samples of the earth's strata will be obtained. The holes to be drilled will number between 350 and 500.

Close-spaced drilling sampling has proved to be the only firm basis for establishing a three-dimensional concept of stratal units and their relationships with topography, Dr. DuBar said.

It also will provide for the drilling of 350 to 500 holes from which the samples of the earth's strata will be obtained.


"This is a tremendous opportunity for national recognition for Morehead State University in the field of geoscience," Dr. Simpson said.

"In Dr. DuBar we have a project director who has won national recognition for the work he already has done in the coastal areas, and this grant provides an unusual opportunity for a number of our science students to obtain valuable field experience in their area of study."

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## NUCLEAR ENERGY DISPLAY TO BE PRESENTED



A lecture-demonstration program designed to present the peaceful use of nuclear energy to high school students will be conducted by Morehead State University and the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

The University will work with the Oak Ridge Associated Universities, Oak Ridge, Tenn., in presenting the exhibit, called "This Atomic World," to about 100 high schools in Kentucky this school term, said Dr. William C. Simpson, Dean of the School of Sciences and Mathematics at Morehead.

Charles Mays, a 1968 Morehead graduate with a bachelor of Science degree in physics and chemistry, will be in charge of the exhibit, which will be presented at 40-minute assembly programs at the high schools.

Using a specially-designed vantype truck to transport the exhibit, Mays will visit one high school each day, presenting the nuclear energy peacetime story first at an all-school assembly program and later in classroom sessions.

Mays, who took eight weeks of intensified training in atomic energy and the presentation of the exhibit at Oak Ridge, will be available at each school for special counseling with interested students and



guidance counselors.

"The assembly program is designed to interest all students. It will cover in student terms such basic nuclear physics highlights as radioactivity, drain reaction, reactors and their uses, transmutation, and the application of radioisotopic in medicine, industry and agriculture," said Dr. Charles A. Payne, chairman of the Division of Physical Sciences at Morehead.

A more detailed discussion is presented in the classroom session later. Aimed primarily at the science students, the topics discussed in the classroom include atomic structure, the nucleus, radiation biology, fission and fusion, Mays said.

Specifically-designed electronic equipment, including a radiation counter, a reactor model, a Van de Graaf generator and a number of electronically-activated panels, will be used in the presentations to illustrate Mays' lectures.

The Kentucky exhibit of "This Atomic World" is one of 14 such units visiting the nation's high schools, Dr. Payne said.

The Morehead State-operated unit will be available to all schools in Kentucky during the next two school years, Mays said. He will visit schools in the eastern portion of the state this year and visit the schools west of Louisville next year.

"We think this is a tremendous opportunity for high school principals to bring a vitally important and meaningful program to their students and teachers. We cannot overemphasize their early acceptance of the offer to have the exhibit in their schools," Dr. Payne said.

#### **NEW DIRECTOR NAMED**

Vinson A. Watts has been named Director of Non-Academic Personnel at Morehead State University.

Included in his duties are receiving applications of prospective non-student workers, interviewing, testing, and other administrative functions relating to a university-wide personnel program. This information will be available to all campus departments needing employees.

Previously, the many facets of job applications were handled by individual university divisions. Now these functions will be brought into one office.

The Breathitt county native came to Morehead from Berea College where he was Associate Dean of Labor.

He holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Berea and a master's degree in educational supervision from Eastern Kentucky University.

Watts is married to the former Patricia Ann Ascough of Holden, W. Va. They have two sons, Alan, 13 and Patrick, 12, who will enter University Breckinridge on the Morehead State University campus this fall.

Brown and his wife, Jacquiline, who is a science teacher at Graham High School, reside in Christiansburg, Ohio.




## ALUMNUS GETS POSITION AS PRINCIPAL


## MONHOLLON GETS NET POST



## Alumnus Travels In Style With Self Made Car

Like thousands of Americans, members of the Noah Logan family at Morehead took their annual summer vacation trip.

This year, Logan, an industrial arts teacher at University Breck-inridge School on the Morehead State University campus, his wife, Joy, and their two children, Nelson, 13, and Theresa, 9, toured southeastern Kentucky, western Virginia, and southwestern North Carolina, visiting friends in Charlotte.

What's so unusual about that? Very little other than the fact that they traveled in a 1931 Ford Model A sports roadster which Logan built himself.

This is the fourth year the Logans have vacationed in the sporty little Riviera blue car with the cream-colored wheels, a familiar sight on the streets of Morehead.

In 1965, they drove it to Jamestown, Va., and back, a distance of 1,200 miles. In 1966, they toured central Kentucky, covering more than 1,000 miles in the car. Last year they drove it 1,200 miles through West Virginia and northern Ohio.

"And, we've never had a bit of trouble with the car," he said proudly. It took Logan almost three years to build his car, which sports the only rumble seat in Morehead. He estimates it cost him about \$900 in actual cash outlay plus "every spare minute for three years."

"I believe I neglected everything, including my family, while I was putting it together," he said, recalling the 10 to 15 hours a week he spent working on it during that time.

Although such a car in its day would have cost \$525, Logan has refused offers as much as \$2,300 for his. "It's not for sale," he said.

A native of Fitch in Lewis County and the son of a farmer, Logan's interest in Model A Fords dates back to his childhood.

"We had a Model A pickup truck and a 1930 sedan on the place," he recalled, "so I just sort of grew up with them. I guess I've owned six or seven of them at different times."

Logan's love for automobiles, and Model A Fords in particular, almost cost him an education.

"I quit high school in my sophomore year," he says, "largely because of that car. I would rather work on it than go to school, so I became a dropout, working at service stations and running a cream route among other miscellaneous jobs until I enlisted in the Air Force in 1948."

For four years while in service, he lost contact with Model A's but not his interest in them.

Returning to Lewis County in 1952, Logan re-entered high school at the age of 22 and graduated two years later.

He then enrolled at Morehead State University. "That was the year Dr. (Adron) Doran came to Morehead as president," he says. "I like to remind him we were 'freshmen' together."

Logan earned a B.S. degree in industrial arts at Morehead in 1957, and two years later received his masters degree. After teaching at Erie School at Olive Hill and in Maysville, he came to University Breckinridge in 1966.

It was during a deer hunting trip along Kenny Creek in Lewis County that the car building project was conceived.

"As we were walking through the brush," he said, "we came across an old Model A Ford sports sedan. It was delapidated. Weeds had grown up in it, and it hadn't been in service for years.

"Two years later I went back and bought it for \$20. It became the foundation for the car we have today."

From this old car, Logan salvaged the frame, motor block, transmission and front end. From there on, it became a matter of rebuilding with parts gathered virtually from all over the country.

The front fenders, for example, came from Lewis County where a farmer was using them as a roof for his hog house. Driving by, Logan noticed them, stopped and bought them.

The rear fenders, he said, came from a junk yard in Portsmouth, Ohio.

The body he found near Denver, Colo., while attending a National Education Association meeting in the west. "I just happened to see it in some brush on the prairie," he said, "and was able to buy it."

A local garageman cut it into pieces so he could haul it back to Kentucky atop his station wagon to be reassembled.

The seats and upholstery were custom made by a firm in Haverhill, Mass., and the top came from a shop at Charlotteville, N. C.

The hardest thing to locate, he said, was the right kind of horn. He found it at Patomac, Ill., while visiting friends.

"I was telling them about building the car and that all I needed was a horn," he recalls, "when my friend spoke up and said, 'Why, I have a horn like that in the garage.' It was the right one, too.

"The only thing we had to have done professionally," he added, "was the pouring of the main bearings in the engine block. We had to take the engine to Cincinnati to have this done. Everything else was assembled right at home."

There isn't a thing on Logan's car that wasn't standard equipment when the model was manufactured in the early 1930's.

What next? A 16-foot sailboat with an 18-20 foot mast, he says.

"I've been bitten by the sailing bug," Logan says after having helped Dr. Joost Yff, until recently of the Morehead faculty, build such a boat.

"When Joost let me take the tiller on a sail at Greenbo Lake, I knew I was hooked and had to have one," he said.

"It'll be especially nice for the family, too, when the Cave Run Reservoir is completed."

## '66 GRAD SERVING IN PEACE CORPS

Susan Carol Hutchison, 1966 graduate, is serving with the Peace Corps in Columbia, South America. Carol while at Morehead majored in English and had a double minor in sociology and speech.

In the following paragraphs, Susan describes her life and experiences in Columbia.

"Being that I consider it a great honor to be serving in the United States Peace Corps in this time of peril between peoples and nations with the destruction of so many valuable lives even to the extent of Robert F. Kennedy, in this time when there is such a need for peace and understanding, for love and acceptance, I shall attempt to describe briefly my position here in Colombia, South America.

"The capital of Antioquia, a state of Colombia, is Medellin. It is a large industrialized city known for its climate as the city of eternal spring and is very similar to a city in the U.S., but with some cultural differences. From Medellin one has only to take a five hour long

some cultural differences. From Medelin one has only to take a five hour long bus trip through winding mountain roads and changing climates to arrive in the small pueblo of Tamesis where I live. Tamesis is a small municipio of 26 thousand inhabitants with industry . . . it is very poor in some ways. I have be accustomed to seein out of the country o Tamesis is a small municipio of 26 thousand inhabitants with industry . . . it is very poor in some ways. I have become accustomed to seeing these people without shos for example and from observing their feet I now know why one wears shoes. But to go on . . I live with a wonderful Colombian family. There are seven children and another is expected. The parents are very young and very active in community affairs. In the house there is no hot water, no refrigerator, no oven, no shower or bathub . . all these things which are taken for granted by many . . but there is a lot of love.

"I work in the educational system of Antioquia. My official title is "Asesora" which means that I am educational advisor in educational television and education in general in the primary schools. My field work covers two pueblos and ten schools. It is challenging work and above all it is limitless. One would be shocked at the difference between the level of education here in Colombia and that in th United States. In the primary schools there are no textbooks nor libraries. The principal method of teaching is the "ROTE METHOD" which is simply

mechanical repitition or memorizing-learning without understanding. Each child has a notebook in which he copies everything from the blackboard. There is very little room for creativity. How-ever, with luck and hard work perhaps we can improve somewhat these defic-iencies in the educational system of Coiencies in the educational system of Co-

"I also am involved in the community as a whole working with various programs when I can. For example, at the moment I am working in a program to capacitate eighty young uneducated women who have no skills. Our major problem of course is that we have no money and therefore no tools to work with. But little by little we hope to obtain these necessities through CARE and other such organizations.

"I have achieved a tremendous acceptance by the people here in Tamsis; they are a warm and kind people. This Peace Corps experience is certainly one I shall always consider worthwhile . . ."

## 52 Years Of Study For Three Degrees

It took a total of 52 years to get them, but Mrs. Fenton Simpkins, 84, her daughter, Mrs. Iva Trimble, and her granddaughter, Mrs. Janet Spencer, all Montgomery County school teachers, now hold degrees from Morehead State University.

Although this is an educational feat in itself, the most significant aspect of the careers of these ladies is the fact that all were married and either had their families started or grown before ever enrolling in college.

Mrs. Spencer received her degree in elementary education August 1 after working for it off and on since 1958. Her mother, Mrs. Trimble, received hers in 1962, some 28 years after starting on it, while the grandmother, Mrs. Simpkins, who "retired" in 1954 after 41 years in the classroom, earned hers in 1942 after 10 years of study.

The wife of Elbert Spencer, a Montgomery County farmer, Mrs. Spencer is the mother of four children, whose ages ranges from 6 to 14.

Married while still in high school, she had three of her children before she started taking Morehead correspondence courses in 1958. During the summer terms and the three full semesters she attended the University, she commuted from her home at Levee, near the Powell County line, to her classes, a round-trip distance of 90 miles. During two of those three full-time semesters, she was an honor student.

For the past two years she has been teaching in special education at the Mapleton Elementary School in Montgomery County.

The youngest of Mrs. Simpkins' six children, Mrs. Trimble first started to Morehead in 1932 along with her mother, the two of them living in an apartment near the campus.

She had completed only one semester of work when she left the school to marry Rucker Trimble. A well-known Montgomery farmer today, he also operates stockyards in Mt. Sterling and Morehead.

Before she returned to Morehead to get her degree in 1962 through correspondence courses and summer work, 28 years had passed and Mrs. Trimble's four children were all grown.

After having started her teaching career in 1956 at the Camargo Elementary School in Montgomery County, she currently is working toward a certificate in TMR at the University of Kentucky, and expects to teach in a new unit for exceptional children in the county this fall.

The matriarch of the clan, however, is Mrs. Simpkins.

Alert and spry at 84, she delights in looking back over her four decades of teaching, most of which was spent in one-room Montgomery County Schools.

She first started in 1913 at the Cook's Branch school after successfully completing a state certificate examination. Her salary was \$37.50 per month.

This was the first of several one-room schools in which she taught for the next 20 years before starting her 10 years of work toward a degree at Morehead in 1932.

"We taught all eight grades in those one-room schools," she recalls with a chuckle, "and I walked six miles round trip to school every day after first getting up and cooking breakfast for the family.

"Often when heavy snow fell, my father would hitch a log to a horse and drag a path in the snow for me to follow.

"We teachers also had to build our own fires in the pot bellied stoves which was our only source of heat. This, too, meant getting to school well before the children arrived."

Another early day teacher responsibility, Mrs. Simpkins remembers, was to oil the floor of the classroom. "This took several days of our own time without pay before school started," she says, "but the school folks did furnish the oil."

Mrs. Simpkins taught all six of her children through the first eight grades and saw four of them become teachers. Three of her 17 grandchildren are teaching today. One, Miss Irene Centers, is teaching in New York City and holds a masters degree from Columbia University. There are also 34 great-grandchildren.

Are school children more difficult to control today than they used to be?

Very definitely, Mrs. Simpkins says. "In the early days," she recalls, "parents didn't mind you paddling their children when they misbehaved. In fact, many of them told me to give them a licking at school if I thought they deserved it and they'd get another when they got home.

"That's not true any more. Lick one of them today and you not only have the parents after you but the entire school board as well.

"You had to lick one or two of them every now and then to let the others know you meant business," she added. "I guess you'd say we believed you had to lick 'em to l'arn 'em, as some of the old timers used to say."

"I'll never forget mother on one of those paddlings," Mrs. Trimble spoke up. "Three of the Violin bows are poised as music once again fills the air at Constitution Hall. A new face in the National Symphony Orchestra is Mrs. Virginia Harpham, principal second violinist, the first woman to hold that position.

Mrs. Harpham joined the National Symphony Orchestra in 1956 and became assistant principal second violinist in 1958. She was appointed principal second violinist in 1964, becoming the first woman to earn this honor.

In 1941-43 she was head of instructional music elementary schools, Washington, D. C.

Studying under the distinguished violinist Joseph Roisman of the famed Budapest Quartet greatly influenced the music career of Mrs. Harpham. A native of Indiana she received her degree in music at Morehead State University.

She formerly played with the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra and the National Gallery Orchestra. She also performs professionally as a member of the Lywen Quartet.

She always wanted to play the violin, she says, "putting it mildly." The most thrilling moment in her career, so far, was the playing of the "Star Spangled Banner" after the arrival of President and Mrs. Kennedy at the Inaugural Concert.

The wife of Capt. Dale Harpham, Assistant Director of the U.S. Marine Band, the Harpham family is a musical one with their daugh-

ter Evelyn, playing the chester, Va. George is viola and son, George, a sophomore at Wood-

ter Evelyn, playing the viola and son, George, the cello. Evelyn is studying to be an elementary school teacher in her first year at Shenandoah College, Win-

chester, Va. George is a sophomore at Woodrow Wilson High School. A favorite family diversion is string trio playing by Mrs. Harpham and the children. A story of rags to riches unfolds when the name of C. E. Norris is mentioned. Norris is owner and president of Howell's Motor Freight, Inc., Roanoke, Virginia.

Following four years of active duty in the navy, where he served as a pilot, Norris began work in the trucking industry and later purchased Howell's Motor Freight. In the past ten years the company has unprecedented growth expanding to a multi-million dollar business.

In 1967 he was elected chairman of Refrigerated Division, American Trucking Association and has published numerous articles on the trucking of refrigerated products in leading magazines in the trucking industry.

In May of 1968 Norris retired from the U.S. Navy after serving 24 years. As a member of the Navy Reserve he was involved in personal administration, industrial relations, general aerology, and served as a naval pilot and instructor.

A survey conducted by Medical Economics magazine revealed that 43 per cent of the doctors' wives interviewed believe that their husbands don't spend enough time with their families.


One physician who has successfully incorporated his wife into his practice is Dr. Paul Maddox. His wife Patricia, who received her bachelor's degree from Morehead State University in 1951, has been helping him with his busy practice since its beginning in 1953. Because Dr. Maddox believes that a busy wife is a happy wife, he asked his wife to help manage his clinic in Compton. Fifteen years later, she is in charge of the clinic's office staff and paper work.

Mrs. Maddox spends about 14 hours a day in her husband's office. Though she often works until 2:00 a.m., she usually manages to spend four or five hours attending to family matters in their home above the clinic. The Maddoxes have four sons — David, 8; Mark, 12; Daniel, 14; and Michael, 15.

Since Dr. Maddox treats an average of 126 patients a day and about one-third of these are on welfare, there is an abnormally high volume of paper work which must be handled. This is done by Mrs. Maddox and 10 aides who work around the clock.

The hectic pace seems to agree with Mrs. Maddox. "I don't do this work out of necessity," she says. "I do it out of preference. If I didn't have my work here in the clinic, I think I'd go out of my mind."

Dr. Maddox encourages her participation in his work. "Physicians' wives become bored over the years," he says. "The well-adjusted doctor's wife is the one who takes part in her husband's practice. If she feels needed, and is needed, she'll help her husband in his career."



## Faces in The Crowd

"Some doctors practice where the money is. Dr. Paul Maddox chose to practice where the need is. And 6500 hill folk in a pocket of poverty in Appalachia are still thanking him for it," stated an article in Kiwanis Magazine.

The article was referring to Dr. Paul Maddox, who graduated from Morehead State University in 1948 with a major in biology. Since 1953 he has been a general practitioner at Campton in Wolfe County, one of the poorest counties in the United States.

Dr. Maddox, who has been called the busiest doctor in the United States, sees about 800 people a week, delivers about 400 babies each year, keeps his clinic open 16-18 hours each day, and has been maintaining this routine for 15 years.

Maddox, who attended the University of Louisville Medical School on the GI Bill, combines his home and his clinic. He takes time to be a member of the County Health Board and the County School Board. He is a Scoutmaster and a Kiwanian. He served a

term as mayor of Campton, "just to see if I could get something done."

He is also a member of the Alumni Executive Council at Morehead.

Dr. Maddox cannot be accused of charging unreasonable rates for his services. He charges \$3.00 for a visit and \$60 for a birth, including anesthesia, circumcision of a male child, and a four-to-eight-hour stay in the clinic "breeder" room. Even at these rates unpaid bills pile up, and some women owe for two or three children. But Dr. Mad-

dox never turns anyone away because of money, and he figures he collects enough to pay his bills and then some, anyway.

Why does he continue to work so hard for such small wages? "Here I am really needed," he said. "I always tell young doctors: 'Go to a place where you are needed.' " Dr. Maddox is really needed in Wolfe County.

One observer has remarked that one can tell that Dr. Maddox really loves the people of his native Kentucky hill country. He is content at being "Mr. Medicine" in Wolfe County.



Working with students and assuming a leadership role in education is no new experience for Buford Crager, dean of students, Morehead State University. As a student at Morehead he was elected president of the student body and starred on the Eagles football team.

Graduating in 1961 with a bachelor of arts degree in business administration and physical education, Crager served as a graduate assistant the following year, coaching the offensive backfield unit for the Eagles as he earned the master's degree in secondary education. As a student he was a member of the dean's list, and was listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities.

Before returning to Morehead in September, Dean Crager taught in the business education department and coached football and baseball at Fairmont West High School in Kettering, Ohio, for five years, helping produce three conference championships in football and was state baseball champion Class AA in 1966. During his stay in Ohio he did additional graduate work at Miami University, at Oxford and at Wright State University in Dayton.

Many Eagle fans will recall his long touchdown runs from his fullback slot and his aggressive offensive and defensive play on the gridiron.
