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MOREHEAD, Ky.---Drs. Martha (Mattie) Decker, associate professor of education, and Kimberly Peterson, assistant professor of veterinary technology, presented their paper, "Racing Toward the Finish, Youth and Greyhounds Learn Together," at the 64th annual International Correctional Education Association Conference in Madison Wis.

This model regional engagement project allies Morehead State University's Department of Curriculum and Instruction and Veterinary Technology Programs and teams up with the Kentucky Department of Juvenile Justice's Morehead Youth Development Center and Greyhound Pets of America-Louisville Chapter to conduct an examination of the effects of the presence of animals on learning with adjudicated female youth through an on-going series of learning cycles.

Every 12 weeks, retired greyhounds from West Virginia are trained by youth at Morehead Youth Development Center to become pets in future homes. The model includes the components of vocational and technical training in veterinary science for the secondary school level.

The youth participate in a writing workshop in preparation for publication of original works. Associate degree candidates of Veterinary Technology gain proficiency in their technical training through the delivery of veterinary medical care to the greyhounds with the goal of achieving optimum wellness for the greyhounds in preparation for adoption. Current findings suggest: improved academic success and self-efficacy, decrease of reportable incidents among adjudicated youth; and a decrease in adoption failure of dogs. This study suggests sustainability as a model for other facilities.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University would like to remind students that Oct. 5-9 is "Fire Prevention Week." Jeff Barker of MSU's Office of Environmental Health and Safety had tips to help students stay safe.

According to Barker, if the fire alarm is sounding or if you discover a fire in a campus residence hall or other building:

Close the windows, leave the room or apartment, and lock the door behind you. At night, leave a light on; pull the fire alarm if it is not already sounding; exit the building immediately; call the MSU Police Department at 911 or use a blue-light or other emergency telephone.

Do not reenter the building until told to do so by the fire department or MSU safety personnel.

If a fire alarm sounds:

Feel your room's door. If it is cool, open it cautiously. If the accumulated smoke outside the door is not excessive, close your windows, lock your room door, and exit from the building by the designated or alternate routes. If the smoke is heavy, close the windows, lock your room door, and crawl or move in a crouched position to the nearest exit.

If the door is hot, do not open it. If the corridor is full of smoke to prevent a safe exit, stay in your room. Keep your door closed and stuff something in the space under the door. Open your window, hang a light-colored sheet or towel over the ledge to signal for assistance, and crouch on the floor directly beneath the window.


When exiting a building during a fire or fire alarm:

Never use an elevator; always use the stairs; crawl or move in a crouched position in smoke-filled hallways; do not push others in the stairwells as you exit; assist individuals with physical impairments; upon exiting the building, stay clear of parking lots and fire lanes so that emergency vehicles can get through safely; proceed to the assembly area designated for the building; do not attempt to fight a fire - let the professionals do it.

Barker stated that MSU has a 100 percent evacuation policy. If the fire alarm is sounding you are to leave the building as quickly and safely as possible, no excuses.

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

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


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
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MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Kentucky Folk Art Center will receive the Folk Heritage Award for its role in promoting Kentucky's self-taught visual artists and conserving their work.

The Kentucky Arts Council announced the 2009 recipients of the Governor's Awards in the Arts that will be honored by Gov. Steve Beshear at a public ceremony and celebration on Tuesday, Oct. 6, at 10 a.m. in the Capitol Rotunda in Frankfort.

"The Governor's Award is a point of pride for everyone associated with the Kentucky Folk Art Center and Morehead State University. While many of our staff members and board members have played significant roles in the Center's development, this award should be seen in part as recognition for the fantastic work that Adrian Swain has done here at KFAC for more than 20 years. He, more than anyone else, is responsible for bringing Kentucky folk art to a national audience, for creating a serious conversation about the work, and for building our Center's fine collection with consistently limited resources. It's also a symbol of the significant achievements of Kentucky's self-taught artists, because without their work we could not exist," said Matt Collinsworth, KFAC director.

The Governor's Awards in the Arts recipients are selected in nine different categories, with the Milner Award being the most prestigious and the first, which was established by the Kentucky Arts Council in 1978, and named in honor of the late B. Hudson Milner.

Other winners include:

Jerry E. Baker, arts leader and philanthropist of Bowling Green, is the 2009 recipient of the Milner Award, which recognizes outstanding individual commitment to the arts and their role in the economy, community and culture of Kentucky.

George Clooney, actor, director, producer and screenwriter, born in Lexington and parttime resident of Augusta, will receive the National Award in recognition of his artistic achievement reaching national and international acclaim.

Chilton Price, songwriter, of Louisville, will receive the Artist Award for her lifetime achievement in the arts.

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

While this is a new post, it is his second gubernatorial appointment in as many years.

In a law career that spans two decades, Holton was a prosecutor with the Jefferson County Attorney's Office for 19 years.

Calling it an exceptional place, Holton and guide dog Buddy returned to the MSU campus as he was the keynote speaker for the Emerging Leaders Symposium.

"This is a very special place for me," said Holton. "I tell people I got a million dollar education at Morehead State, and I really mean it. Not just in the classroom, but outside the classroom, with my experiences serving on the Board of Regents as Student Government Association president.

"The community, not just the people on campus, was really good to me. I am real proud of how this University is today," said Holton. "MSU is going in the right direction and you can tell that in how everyone is upbeat on campus."

With his appointment, Holton became the first blind person to serve as judge in Kentucky.

After earning his bachelor's degree at MSU in 1984, he graduate from the University of Kentucky College of Law.

"It is not important that it happened to me but it is important that it happened," said Holton, who lost his sight when he was a youngster due to a brain tumor. "I hope it does break down some barriers and make things easier for the people who follow me."

Holton's father, David, also is an MSU graduate. "When I started looking at colleges, he suggested that I look at MSU. He told me his friend Buford Crager was the vice president of student affairs and to make sure to find him."

During his days at MSU, Holton and his guide 'Simon the Wonder Dog' became well-known across the campus. He was a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity at MSU, and remembers the time he as beat out for "Big Man on Campus" by Simon.

Of course, Holton received the award the next year.

An avid sports fan, Holton regularly listens to Eagle athletics via the Internet from his Louisville area home.

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MOREHEAD, Ky.---The United States has begun a program to extend human presence in the solar system, beginning with a return to the Moon. Returning to the Moon will enable the pursuit of scientific activities that address our fundamental questions about the history of Earth, the solar system, and the universe- and about our place in them. Returning to the Moon will allow us to test technologies, systems, flight operations, and exploration techniques to reduce the risk and enable future missions to Mars and beyond.

Join the faculty and staff of the Morehead State University Space Science Center Friday, Oct. 9, at 6:30 a.m. to witness the culmination of the LCROSS mission, part of NASA's revived robotic exploration of the Moon.

Live coverage from NASA TV will be shown on the Star Theater dome as the LCROSS satellite observes the impact of its Centaur upper stage into a crater permanently shadowed near the moon's South Pole at approximately 7:30 a.m., followed four minutes later by the impact of the LCROSS vehicle itself.

The LCROSS mission is searching for water ice in the Cabeus crater. The impact of the Centaur upper stage will create a crater within Cabeus approximately 28 meters in diameter and 5 meters deep. The Impact of the LCROSS spacecraft will create a crater 18 meters in diameter and about 3.5 meters deep. The combined impacts will eject approximately 850 metric tons of material which scientists suspect will include water ice.

In conjunction with this live event the Space Science Center will be utilizing the 21-meter Space Tracking Antenna to observe the impact in the radio spectrum. The Space Science staff will monitor the impact event with the Center's L-band feed system operating in a broadband continuum which includes the 1.42 GHz atomic hydrogen line. The team hopes to contribute to the understanding of the composition of lunar mineralogy and resources which NASA needs to plan its proposed lunar outpost.





Entry into the practice of nursing in the United States is regulated by the licensing authorities within each jurisdiction of the national council. The Kentucky Board of Nursing (KBN) is the licensing authority for the state.

To ensure public protection, the KBN requires a candidate for licensure to pass an examination that measures the competencies needed to perform safely and effectively as a newly-licensed, entry-level registered nurse.

The Kentucky Board of nursing monitors the performance of each program of nursing to review the performance compared with the outcome achievement measure of an 85 percent pass rate.

MSU's May graduates achieved above the outcome measure for Kentucky and have exhibited superior accomplishments.

"Achievement of successful learning outcomes is a positive reflection of the teaching-learning partnership that exists between faculty, staff and students," said Dr. Erla Mowbray, chair of MSU's Department of Nursing.







He was the husband of Lois Taylor Howell, also a retired MSU faculty member.


Dr. Howell came to MSU in 1972 to launch an environmental education center which later merged with the biology department. Under his leadership, environmental science became one of the most popular undergraduate degrees at the University. He later served as chair of the Department of Biological and Environmental Sciences.

Dr. Howell retired from MSU in 1997 after 25 years of full-time service. He held a doctorate from the University of Tennessee.

He started the MSU Water Testing Laboratory and help introduce environmental education into the statewide public school curriculum in Kentucky.

A native of Floyd County, he was among the organizers of the Kentucky Association for Environmental Education (KAEE).

Dr. Howell wrote a newspaper column on environmental issues, titled "Our Fragile Earth," which was syndicated to newspapers and other publications in East Kentucky and beyond for several years. He also raised money for a scholarship endowment to help East Kentucky students go to college. That endowment now is managed by the Christian Appalachian Project.

The concert is sponsored by MSU's Department of Music, Theatre and Dance and Marshall University's Department of Music, in conjunction with a grant from the U.S. Department of Education, "Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education" and the Brazilian Ministry of Education.

The program, jointly administered by the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) and the Brazilian Ministry of Education, provides grants for up to four years to consortia of at least two academic institutions each from Brazil and the United States. The program fosters the exchange of students and faculty within the context of bilateral curricular development.

Moura and Dr. Meirinhos also will offer master classes to students at MSU and Marshall.

Dr. Meirinhos is the director of the School of Music of the UFG-Universidade Federal de Goiás (Federal University of Goiás), Brazil, where he teaches guitar, guitar literature and chamber music. He holds a Doctor of Music degree from Florida State University, a master's degree in musicology from Universidade de São Paulo (University of São Paulo) and a degree in music performance from the Staatliche Hochschule für Musik und Theater Hannover in Germany.

Dr. Meirinhos has extensively performed in South America, Germany and the United States, participating in several music festivals as both teacher and performer. Among these festivals are the Festival de Musica de Londrina, Festival de Inverno de Campos do Jordão, Seminario de Musica de Montenegro, Curso de Verão de Brasília, Festival de Vale Vêneto, etc. In 1997 he recorded the CD Radames Gnattali, Sonatas e Sonatinas, and in 1998 participated in the live recording of the Festival de Musica de Londrina, which also was made into a CD. In 2007, he released his solo CD Eduardo Meirinhos em Recital.

In Hannover, Germany, 1989, Dr. Meirinhos had the honor of performing in the world premier of Greek composer Nikos Platirrachos' Lisistrati, for violin, viola, clarinet and cello, in which the guitar is featured as a solo instrument. He also has premiered performances of Laudate Dominae, Toada Triste, Um Tranquilo Entardecer, Cantiga de Ninar by Siegfried Schmidt and instigated the first Brazilian performance of "Variations sur un Thème de Django Reinhardt by Leo Brouwer."

"Brazilian guitarist de Moura is an assistant professor at UDESC- Universidade do Estado de Santa Catarina (Santa Catarina State University) since 2004, where he teaches classical guitar, guitar literature, guitar pedagogy and chamber music. de Moura holds both a Master of Music degree in guitar performance from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University and a Bachelor of Music degree in guitar performance from UNICAMP, Universidade Estadual de Campinas (University of Campinas).

As an educator, de Moura helped develop the curricula and methods used in the guitar programs of EMB- Escola de Musica de Brasilia (School of Music of Brasilia) and UDESC. As an arranger and performer, he co-produced and performed in different recordings for the Árvore da Vida Press, a Brazilian Christian publishing house.

Besides his interest in solo guitar music, de Moura frequently performs as a member of Camerata de Violões UDESC (UDESC Guitar Ensemble) and is the music coordinator of the Quarteto de Violões UDESC (UDESC Guitar Quartet), a group devoted to playing a wide scope of music styles and genres and to which he also serves as an arranger.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---The Writing Eastern Kentucky Conference on Saturday, Nov. 14, in Mt. Sterling will focus on writing about place and offer sessions based on this theme for both writers and teachers.

Morehead Writing Project, Montgomery County Council for the Arts and Morehead State University's Center for Regional Engagement will sponsor the event.

MSU creative writing faculty Crystal Wilkinson, Chris Holbrook, George Eklund, and Rebecca Howell will join 2009 Chaffin Award winner Mark Powell to lead sessions at the conference for both writers and teachers of writing.

In addition to the featured speakers, authors Nancy Kelly Allen and Annie Jones, and teachers Carrie Coaplen-Anderson, Shane Jordan, George David McKee, Bob Sloan, and Audra Slocum, will lead sessions.

MSU writer-in-residence Wilkinson will present "Home and Beyond: Kentuckians Writing About Place." She will share passages of Kentucky writing about place; discuss the importance of place-based writing; and culminate the session with some writing exercises based on place. "Home and Beyond" edited by Morris Grubbs has been recommended to complement the session.

Eklund will present "Pyschic State as Place." He will conduct studio experiments with language apparatus. These early writings will serve as texts toward poetic treatments of psychic states as landscapes--concrete places. Writers will enter the process of the poem and search for their own language of place. Poets will seek new communions between the "real" place around them and the "abstracted" places of the psyche.

Writing Place as Parable." Howell asks how can we learn to use imagination to approach our landscape in fresh ways; and how exactly do we 'set the familiar [place] in unfamiliar context'? Howell's session will explore the point where 'home' becomes a metaphor, and through it, parable. She will engage in close readings, in-session writing, and workshop to discover how place, our place, can be both realized and revelatory in our work -- leading us to new insight on what it means to get from here to there.

Coaplen-Anderson, assistant professor of rhetoric and composition, will present "Place and Identity." She will look at how place is an often taken for granted element of identity, yet in life writings such as memoirs, personal narratives, and essays, sense of self often profoundly expresses itself in relationship with home and/or place. This session will guide writers through simple prompts to begin approaching writing about self through considerations of place and/or home. This session also will provide passages and sections from work that does the same, including recommended readings.

Slocum, a high school English teacher, will present "Community-Based Research Projects: Learning about Our Past, Our Present, and Looking to the Future." The session will focus on a unit of study that centers on the students' communities as a site of inquiry, and the students as social scientists and writers. The presentation will include samples of student work, and example handouts.




She was among 55 ROTC cadets and midshipmen commissioned by former President George Bush in the White House in May 2007. The program was part of National Military Appreciation Month.

MOREHEAD, Ky.---Morehead State University's Department of Earth and Space Sciences Speaker's Program will host "The Early Days of the Space Program in the U.S. and Gil Moore's Space Projects" on Friday, Oct. 30, at 2 p.m. in the Space Science Center Star Theater. The lecture will be given by one of the Space Program's true pioneers, Gil Moore.

The event is free and open to the public.

Moore can give history of the space program that few other people can give. He is a close colleague of Bob Twiggs, who recently joined the faculty at MSU.

Moore has spent 62 years in the space program. He started out at the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico in 1947, as a student employee of New Mexico State University, installing instruments in captured German V-2 and U.S. Navy Viking and Aerobee rockets for the pioneering space scientists of that day.

In his career he worked with space pioneers who are now household names including James Van Allen, Wernher von Braun, and Fred Whipple. He also worked alongside some of Robert H. Goddard's employees, who moved to White Sands after Dr. Goddard's death in 1945.

Following graduation from New Mexico State, he spent 13 years supervising teams of engineers who launched sounding rockets all over the world to study the effects of solar storms on the earth's upper atmosphere. This field is known as solar-terrestrial physics. Moore spent 25 years working for Thiokol Corporation in northern Utah, continuing with solar-terrestrial physics rocket launches around the world, and then transitioning into earth-orbiting satellite experimentation.

As an adjunct professor of physics at Utah State University for more than 30 years, he has helped several generations of university undergraduate students to build and fly dozens of "Get Away Special" experiments in NASA's Space Shuttles. Moore joined the astronautics department of the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1995 to help establish a program to allow cadets to build and fly their own satellites on surplus military launch vehicles.

Upon retirement in 1997, Moore and his wife Phyllis developed project "STARSHINE" to involve tens of thousands of children in more than 40 countries in deploying a series of mirrored spherical satellites from Space Shuttles and expendable launch vehicles, to keep track of the way storms on the sun influence the density of the earth's upper atmosphere and, thereby, the orbits of low earth orbiting satellites.

Three "STARSHINE" student satellites were flown. Each was designed by the U.S. Naval Research Laboratory and built by an informal, volunteer coalition of organizations and individuals in the U.S. and Canada.

The first of these satellites, Starshine 1, was deployed into a circular orbit 387 kilometers by the crew of Space Shuttle Discovery on June 5, 1999. Starshine 1 circled the Earth every 90 minutes, descending and speeding up slightly during each orbit due to the effects of atmospheric drag, until Feb. 18, 2000, when it was consumed by aerodynamic heating on its 4,212th circuit of the Earth above the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Brazil.

Starshine 2 was launched from the Space Shuttle Endeavor from the shuttle's payload bay on a mission to the International Space Station. Dubbed by some a "disco ball in space," the satellite was covered with 845 aluminum mirrors, which reflected light toward the Earth's surface to aid in its tracking by students around the world. It was also highly successful.

A third satellite, Starshine 3, was launched on an Athena I unmanned launch vehicle out of the Kodiak Launch Complex, Alaska, on Sept. 29, 2001, into a 470 km. high circular orbit. Starshine 3 burned up in the earth's upper atmosphere above southern Greenland in January 2003. It had made 7,434 revolutions around the earth. Scientists have used data from the Starshine missions to measure the effects of solar extreme ultraviolet radiation on satellite orbital decay and to continue to improve orbital decay prediction codes for future satellites.

Students will learn the basics of art quilting and embellishing, including embroidered text, shi-sha mirror application, and utilizing found objects on fabric. All work is hand-done, no machine, and open to all skill levels.

A signed copy of "Creative Quilting with Beads" featuring the art of Reis is available for an additional charge of \$25.

Reis, an arts professional, is a practicing artist with a B.F.A. degree from Columbus College of Art, an M.A. degree in museum studies from Syracuse University, and an M.A. degree in studio art with an art education emphasis from Morehead State University.

As an actively exhibiting and award winning artist, she has shown her work at the Kentucky Museum of Art and Craft, WomanMade Gallery in Chicago, Turchin Center for the Arts in Boone, N.C., American Quilter's Society Museum in Paducah, the Dairy Barn Arts Center in Athens, Ohio, Miami of Ohio University Galleries, Southern Ohio Museum, among others.

MOREHEAD, Ky.--Dr. Nathan Nabb, assistant professor of music at Morehead State University, has released his first full-length solo recording, thanks to an MSU Faculty Creative Production Grant.

The album, titled "Tangled Loops," is named after the recording's first track, written by Jason Eckardt.

"This recording explores the various timbres and capabilities of the saxophone family through the compositions of some of the most gifted composers of the late 20th century," said Dr. Nabb.

Dr. Nabb, whose musical interests predominantly lie in the performance and promotion of contemporary saxophone music, said that some of the pieces recorded on "Tangled Loops" were already standards. "I recorded the other pieces [the Babbitt, Hurel and Eckardt] because they are incredibly strong compositions and I feel they will stand the test of time and eventually become additions to the saxophone's standard repertoire."

The pianist featured on the album is Dr. Winston Choi, assistant professor of piano and head of piano studies of the Chicago College of Performing Arts at Roosevelt University and former member of the faculty at Bowling Green State University.

"Because of Winston's outstanding talent and dedication to his instrument, we were able to record pieces of great complexity and depth," he said.

"Tangled Loops" was recorded in Bowling Green, Ohio, by Mark Bunce, electronic/recording engineer and director of recording services at Bowling Green State University, and is published by Amp Recordings, a contemporary music label.

He performs regularly in a variety of settings as a soloist, in the Northshore Trio, in the Oasis Saxophone Quartet and also with the Amethyst Quartet. A list of upcoming performances can be found on his' Web site: www.nathannabbmusic.com.

"As a performer, your ultimate goal is to share your music and musical interests with the public," Dr. Nabb said. "In a live performance, the music is transitory. While there is an irreplaceable excitement about live performance, with a recording, the music is documented. To that extent, a recording is the performing musician's equivalent of publishing a scholarly paper or book."

The workshop is free for all participants; however, seating is limited and advance registration is recommended.



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
