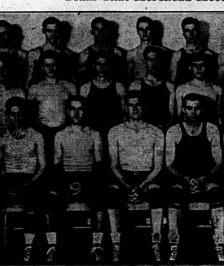

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## Coaches Satisfied With Grid Measure

Only Two Minor Changes Will Be Effected By Rules

Football coaches in convention at New Orleans last week turned their attention to the measure which was proposed by the National Football League for the purpose of the camera for improving a team's play. 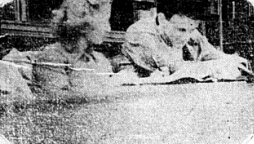

## Purdue Prof Says Students Don't Rest

**Traces Weighty Problems Of Love, Finance**

Lafayette, Ind.—ACB—Weighty problems of college students usually can be traced to love, economic worries or fatigue. Prof. E. S. Conklin, director of Indiana University's psychology department, told the annual Purdue vocational guidance conference last week.

Conklin asserted that students average only about six hours sleep a night, adding that fatigue and worry caused by low grades tend to bring about drinking on the part of the student.

Another speaker at the conference, Dr. Homer P. Ranney, director of the American Council on Education's Youth Commission, said needs of youth are not being met either schools or the employment of labor.

## Machine Grades School Papers

A glimpse of a school teacher's Utopia is on display in the research department of the University of Louisville.

A machine that grades papers leaves very little to be desired in a pedagogical heaven and that's just what they have at the U. of L. —the eighteenth such machine to be installed in the United States.

The table-shaped machine that will grade with inflexible accuracy, 300 test papers an hour, is causing great head-shaking among the students. They are debating "this machine says and confuting pessimistically on 'what will they think of next' in a manner unbecoming the forward-looking youth of the nation. There is a possibility, of course, that a grading machine will make instructors more tact conscious. If the machine can grade 100 papers in fifteen minutes and an instructor can grade 100 papers in fifteen hours—many instructors will be inclined to use the machine and how often? The answer is obvious at a glance. Say U. of L. boys and girls, the trick of the functioning of the scoring gadget rests upon the fact that a soft lead pencil mark is electrically conductive.
