U N D E R G R A D U A T E R E S E A R C H

Kayly Coleman, sophomore, is currently working alongside a graduate student in the kinesiology lab under the guidance of Dr. Gonzalez and Dr. Probst, both of the Department of Kinesiology, Health, and Imagining Sciences. They are researching the effects of hip rotation on leg cycling power by measuring the muscle activity using electromyogram (EMG) output. A large part of their current work is learning how to use the EMG to manipulate the results of their trials for understanding. They hope to begin trials next semester, and Kayly hopes to present their findings at some point.

Sydney Blanton, sophomore, is currently working with Dr. Gearner of the Department of Biology and Chemistry. They are working on tracking the presence of antibiotic-resistant bacteria and Escherichia coli in watersheds throughout Rowan County. They perform DNA extraction, polymerase chain reaction, and gel electrophoresis to do this. Eventually they would like to be able to map out the presence of these species and determine where they are entering the watershed.


