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The TCC Z-Degree

- In August 2013, TCC became the first accredited college in the U.S. to offer an Associate of Science degree allowing students to expend \$0 on textbooks

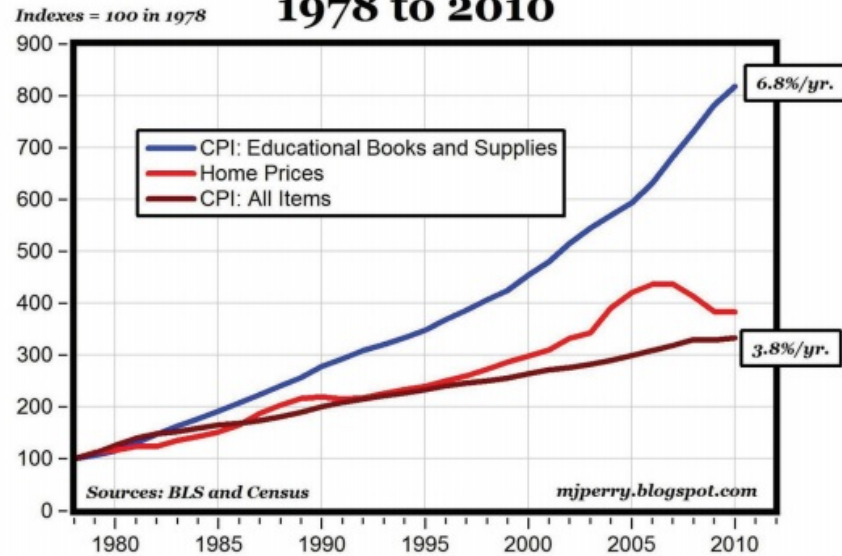


TCC Z-Degree goals

- Reduce financial barriers to access
- Focus OER content on course learning outcomes
 - Continuous improvement



CPI: Educational Books and Supplies vs. Home Prices vs. CPI: All Items 1978 to 2010



The cost of college textbooks has risen 812 percent since 1978, more than the rates of inflation, health care, new home prices, and college tuition.

(Kingkade, 2013)

More and more, college students are unable to afford their textbooks, and as many as 70 percent of students have reported avoiding buying at least one textbook for their courses. A recent survey at Old Dominion University in Norfolk revealed that nearly one in five ODU students are attending classes without the benefit of textbooks (*The Virginian-Pilot*, Dec. 30, 2013). Not surprisingly, these students do not do as well academically (Rethink).

Z-Degree reduces cost by 25%

Tidewater Community College's "Z-Degree" Program:
Impact of OER on the Total Cost-of-Degree

	Z-Degree	Traditional Degree	Difference
Textbook Cost*	\$0	\$2,400	25%
TCC In-State Tuition (61 credits)	\$9,600	\$9,600	Z-Degree shaves a quarter from the total cost-of-degree

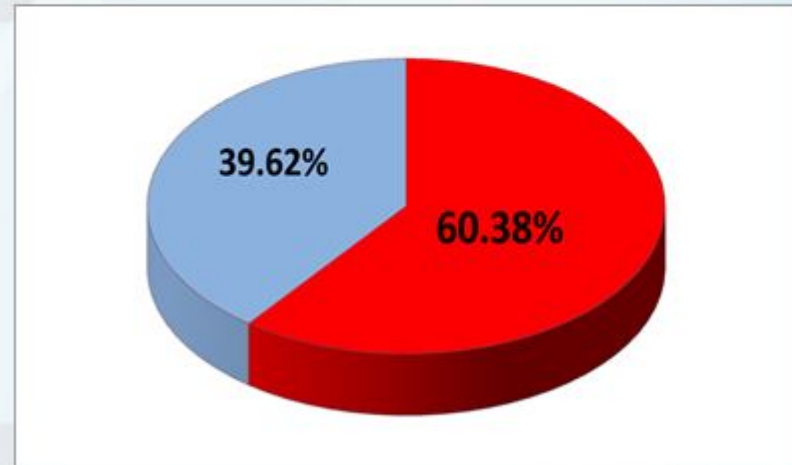

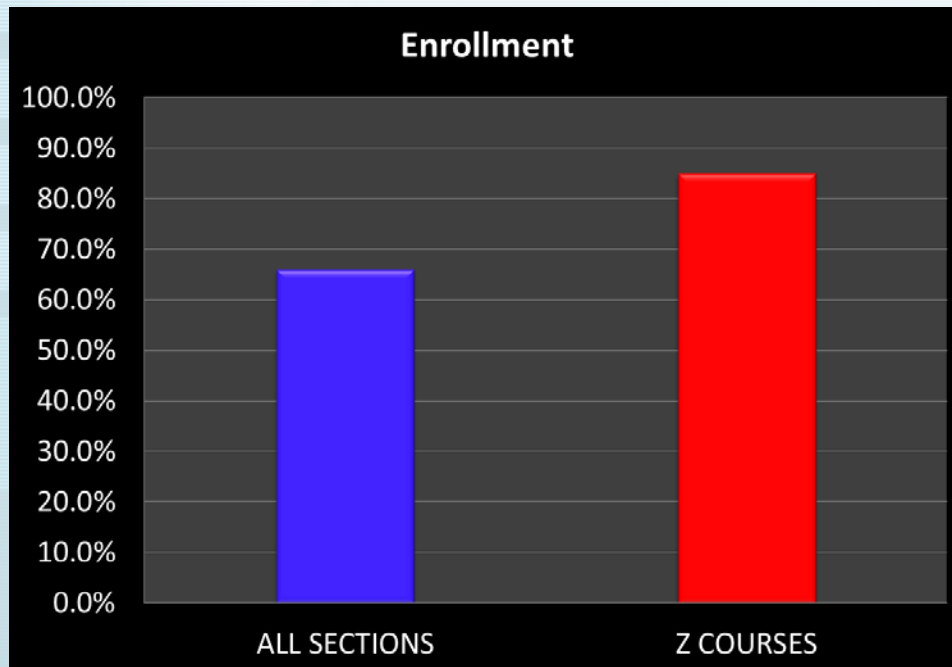

Z-Course enrollment rate

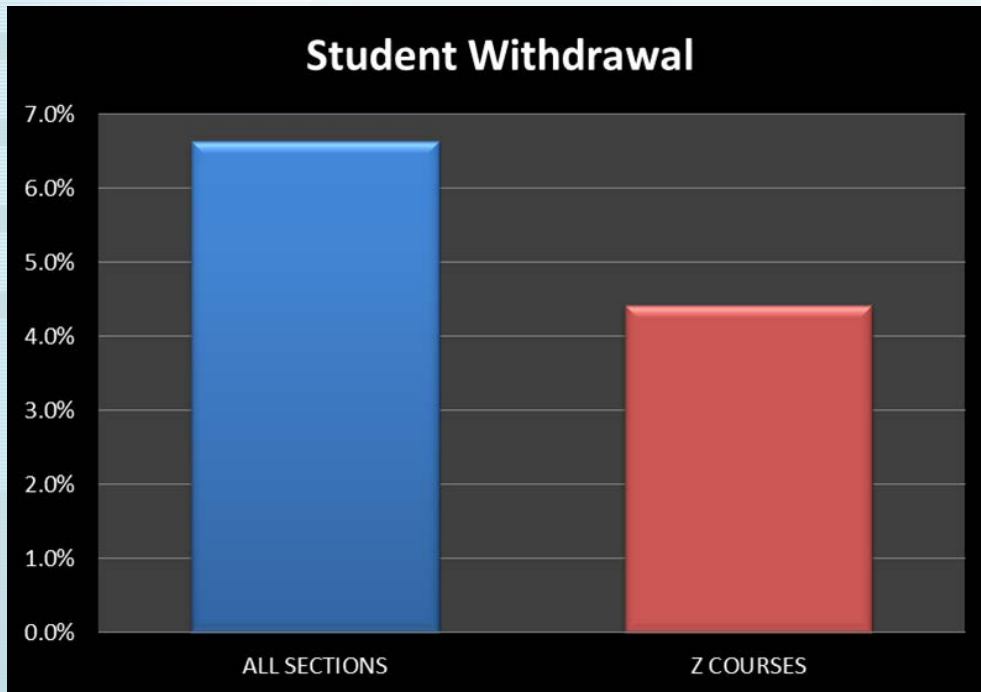


Enrollment as a percentage of course capacity

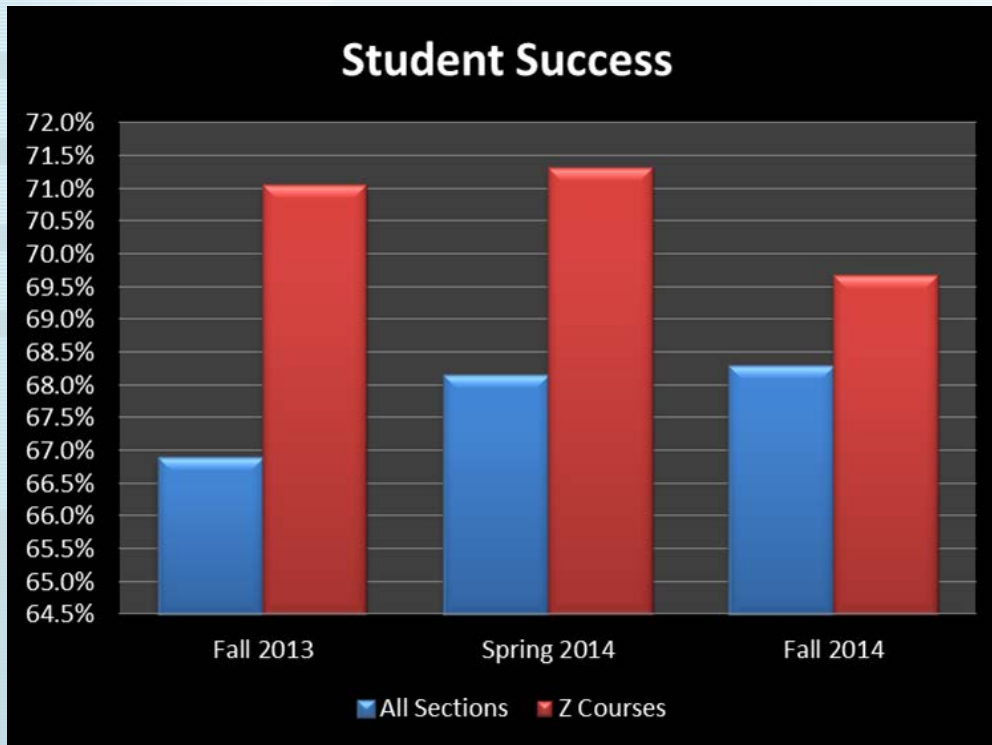
Z-Course withdrawal rate

Z-Course success rate

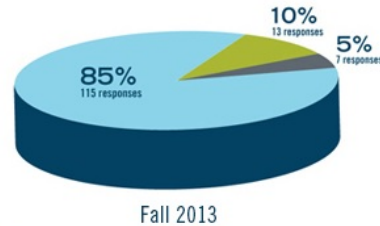


Course completion with a grade of C or better

44% response rate

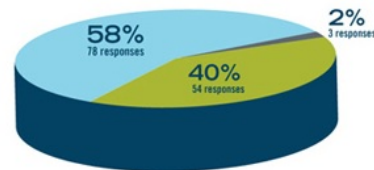


Fall 2013

Would choose a Z Course over a textbook course

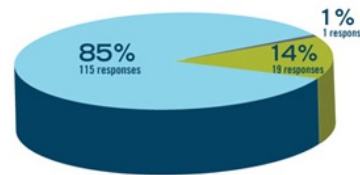


Fall 2013 - Fall 2014
