It was as if the 1930s had come alive. Dancers with numbers on their backs bopped, rocked, twisted, jumped and sometimes clung to each other through the night in hope of beating time and exhaustion.

At one time, dance marathons became a way of making a living for many post-depression survivors in this country. But for the students that volunteered their feet and legs last Saturday-Sunday, it was a fundraising effort on behalf of the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

This was the first time such an event was made possible

here, thanks to the combined efforts of PT'ers Ann Lunz and Mary Ozialga. They contacted and worked closely with the MDA representatives from Binghamton.

The Binghamton MDA has helped organize similar dance marathon events at other upstate colleges and universities, as well as at high schools.

So, when the first musical notes of "Desperado", a local band, broke the air at 8:01 Saturday night, 74 couples began a 12 hour journey into the sleepless night.

At 8 a.m. the next morning only two couples had dropped out. However everyone was a winner this night, especially

Hillel Director Resigns

Dr. Jane Camhi to make Israel her new home

After six years at Ithaca College, Dr. Jane Camhi is resigning her post as Hillel Director, at the end of this semester because of personal reasons.

Dr. Camhi serves a variety of roles within the college community which include Jewish chaplain, teacher, administrator and counselor.

Commenting on her duties as chaplain, Dr. Camhi said she prefers not to be the sole officiator of the Hillel Friday night services. She sees active student involvement and participation as an important part of the

Dr. Camhi is not an ordained chaplain and said that ordination has not been necessary in the fulfillment of her role.

Occasionally people are surprised to see a female chaplain. Dr. Camhi said a woman in this position is becoming much more prevalent within the religious community. She added that chaplain is an important role for a woman to play.

Dr. Camhi teaches a variety of Jewish learning courses such as Introduction to Judaism, the Arab/Israeli Conflict and Chumash (Bible). She said she

prefers teaching in small informal settings where her job is more of a facilitator among the students.

As counselor, Dr. Camhi said she deals with "everything from spiritual questions to personal problems." She also serves as advisor to students on social and cultural programs.

Dr. Camhi said her role as counselor is the most important to her because, "I'm here when someone walks in." She added that counseling is also one of the

Students may apply for Justice Positions

The Student Justice selection committee has announced that applications for Justice positions are now available from the student affairs office 2nd floor, Job Hall.

A student justice is selected to the Conduct Review Board for a one year appointment, which reviews cases of alleged violations to the Student Conduct Code.

The Ithaca College Student Conduct Code assumes a twofold responsibility: "To protect the rights of community members to pursue educational objectives, and to protect the rights of individuals accused of violating its rules and regulations."

Its rules and regulations.

In order to begin the process of selection, a student must have the following qualifications: 1) Applicants must be at least a sophomore and in good academic standing with the College at the time the appointment would take effect 2) Applicants must be in good judicial standing with the office of the Assistant to the V.P. for Student Affairs.

Frank Lamas, assistant to the vice president for student affairs/Judicial administrator, works closely with the residential life staff and the safety and security staff. Lamas commented, "The student justice position is a positive learning experience. It gives a student the opportunity to be a part of the judicial system which protects the rights of all

individuals."

Personal qualities expected for a student justice include good interpersonal skills (listening skills, communication skills and assertiveness); ability to evaluate the facts of a case and come to an objective decision; ability to function well in a group and ability to maintain confidentiality and discretion.

Lamas added, "A student in any area of study may apply and must have a genuine interest in and commitment to the position. Student justices must effectively deal with all types of people and a 'well rounded' individual is an excellent quality."

The student justice application contains two recommendation forms which are mandatory and should be given to non-student members of the IC committy (faculty, administrator and/or housing staff). You have the option of submitting up to two additional recommendations which may be completed by persons of your choice.

There will be a general information meeting for interested applicants on February 16th, at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Room, 3rd floor, JOB Hall. Completed application forms should be returned to Frank Lamas, 2nd floor, JOB Hall, no later than 5:00 p.m., Friday, February

As a matter of fact, it's a problem that time might just make worse. Ithaca College currently accomodates nearly 5,000 students and as enrollment gradually increases, the number of parking

The problems of parking on-campus are all-too familiar to most students. It means taking into consideration the fact that you might hunt for a space for nearly a half-hour before you can get close to your early morning classes.

What this means is that students (and visitors, et al) are continuously late for their classes and/or appointments. Worse, it means parking your car in "S" lot while living in the Towers. Everyone admits that there's a problem, but the major result of this is talk.

Solutions? The only feasible one is unreasonable: banning freshmen from having cars their first year. Although this is an alternative that could inexpensively relieve the parking crunch, the Ithacan doesn't condone it.

The other alternatives are more costly. Since the new Academic Building will draw a significant number of people after its completion, it appears obvious that concentration should center there. There is some talk among students that a double-tiered parking complex would be appropriate. The possibility of such a structure is, however, questionable.





Dr. Camhi is currently involved in developing a Jewish studies program. She hopes to incorporate courses such as Hebrew language and Jewish history into the curriculum.

Among her other activities, the chaplain edits a newsletter that goes to the Jewish community, is active in the planning of interfaith activities and ensures opportunities for observance in the celebration of Jewish holidays.

Dr. Camhi received her bachelors degree in History and Middle Eastern studies from Barnard, her masters degree in Midevel History from Berkely and her doctorate from Tufts in Women's History.

Dr. Camhi has taught at Cornell and S.U.N.Y. Cortland. She was also the editor of a graphic arts magazine in Hollywood.

Justice Selection

A mandatory meeting of all student justice applicants will take place on Wednesday, March 17, in the Board Room. The purpose of the nieeting will be to provide information about the selection process and sign up for first inter-

views. Jim Leech, student justice, states, "The position requires a lot of commitment. As a peer it is often hard dealing with students who are the same age. It is necessary to evaluate each case thoroughly before declaring someone innocent or guilty. The position is definitely a worthwhile experience."


The chaplain first came to IC in 1976 with the completion of the Chapel. She said she's seen a positive growth in the direction of the Jewish religion at IC. She added that there has been an "increase in interest and caring" among the students and that "Hillel has become a more accepted part of the college community."

Dr. Camhi spent last semester on leave in Jerusalem and is planning to move to Israel with her family this summer. She said she has explored several job

possibilities in Jerusalem but the move also has a strong spiritual context for her. She said she is excited about making Israel her home and feels that it is the direction in which she would like to be challenged.

Dr. Camhi said she is seeking an opportunity that will enable her "to translate the concerns of the religious and non religious in Israel." She added that she hopes to "break down some of the barriers and prejudices that exist between the two groups,"

The chaplain said she is pleased with her accomplishments at IC and it will be difficult to leave the area. She expressed her feelings by adding, "Outside of Jeruslaem, I can't see myself anywhere but Ithaca."



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

B-Store Heist Still Under Investigation

Safety & Security is still looking into a dramatic bookstore heist that left the IC Bookstore short some \$1900 last semester.

The theft-which occurred in the early morning of December 17, 1981-was apparently premeditated as a college-age male sprinted past the bookstore with his sweatshirt pulled up over his head. A table had been set up for students to sell used books back to the bookstore and a cashbox was sitting on the table. The male grabbed the box before several witnesses and raced down the hall with it.

He supposedly disappeared into Holmes Hall, according to witnesses.

Lou Withiam, head of campus Security, told the ITHACAN, "Well, very honestly, we can say we've run into a dead end street so far. However, we've continued the investigation and there are some leads were still checking out."

Security's investigation has included talking to "countless people" and "two or three (good) witnesses." there was even an attempt to pursue the thief with one of the Sheriff's police dogs. However, this failed because the dog was confused by the multitude of trails that people use on the Ithaca College campus.

Although Withiam wasn't certain the thief will be caught, he emphasized that the investigation was continuing.

Grad Speaker: It's Still Guess Who?

If you heard Luke Spencer's coming as the Class of '82's graduation speaker, don't count on it. Senior Class President and member of the speaker selection committee Bill Meinel said, "Well, I can safely dispel all rumors that somebody definite is coming, because the graduation speaker hasn't been selected yet."

Rumors have cropped up all over campus about who the speaker will be at Commencement in May and some of the names that have been heard are Rodney Dangerfield, Alan Alda and General Hospital heartthrob Tony Geary. None of the above are coming, however.

"We're working on it," Meinel assured The ITHACAN. "We'll hopefully get him or her as soon as possible, probably within next month."

The process of selecting a graduation speaker is complicated. It begins at a meeting toward the end of a Class' Junior year. Concerned Seniors-to-be suggest candidates they would like to hear speak at their commencement the following May. The Class of '82's list included such notables as James Michener, television personality David Hartman and several national news personalities.

The actual selection, however, is shouldered by the Selection committee. The Committee is an elite faction made up of Meinel, Student Government President Jim Leech, faculty representative Dr. Harold Emory, Vice President of Student Affairs Dr. Richard Correnti and Ithaca College President James J. Whalen. According to Meinel, the Committee is looking for someone with ". . . something pertinent to say. We could look for big names, but that doesn't always promise that a relevant address will be given."

The Committee isn't revealing many names to quell the rumors, however. All Meinel would say about those most likely to speak come May is that "we started with a list of popular candidates and some have refused." 纒

2191191 Lack of Study Areas: Shock, Outrage, Disbelief

To the Editor:

My first reaction was shock, then outrage. Now it is simply disbelief. It was the Friday night before finals week, a few minutes before ten o'clock. I was on my way to the library because our dorm had become too noisy to study. Ten feet before I reached the door I saw two or three hundred students being herded out of the library. Disbelief and anger was on some of their faces mixed with jokes of, "Well, I guess they want us to go down town now and study at the Dugout."

Some students attempted to study at Friends. Friends is hardly a sufficient place to study. While its overall capacity may be large, its capacity as an effective, quiet study area is quite limited. Most of the tables are too small. The only tables large enough to sit comfortably at for any duration are the instructors' tables which are usually limited to one per class. Also, many reserve materials, available only within the confines of the library, are essential in

studying for finals. Even those who found Friends to be the effective, quiet and comfortable study area they were seeking, would find themselves being asked to leave at 12:00 A.M. by S.A.S.P. After this time, there was absolutely no place provided by the school outside the dorms for students to study.

Other students who did not opt for Friends and still wished to study made the journey to Cornell's library. Cornell, like many other schools across the nation, extended the library hours the week before and the week during finals. Many colleges and universities even maintain a policy of keeping their libraries open 24 hours a day before and during finals.

For the administration of Ithaca College the question should not simply be whether or not to keep the library open, but rather, what are the goals of the administration for the school and the students? If the goals of the administration are to provide the students with an atmosphere where it is more convenient to go down town and drink, then to stay at

the library and study, then they are doing an A+ job. But if they are attempting, like many other schools across the nation, to provide an atmosphere of academic growth, then they are failing miserable.

I am not completely naive to the administrative complications of keeping the library open. But, if the administration truly desires to provide the students at Ithaca College with a college-type atmosphere, they could get around these problems. The easiest solution would be not to provide 24 hours of library service, but simply to increase the service. This is exactly what I mean to suggest. The lib rary hours should simply be extended the weekend before finals. Realistically, I cannot imagine I.C. students missing last call on any Friday or_ Saturday night, but they should have that choice. The hundreds of students that piled out of the library at 10:00 p.m. on Friday, December 11, 1981 should have had the choice to stay or leave.

Open Mike Night: Is It All That 'Open'?

An open letter to S.A.B.: For as many years as I've been here (3) SABs "Open Mike Night" in the Egbert Union Crossroads has been an institution for experimental and amateur acts to find a willing audience. Within the last academic year however I have been increasingly troubled by several aspects of the program. The number of shows has been cut in half, from at least once a month to twice a semester (not counting the "Best of" shows which are not open to unsolicited acts). The natural response to this has been a much larger turn out of acts which, rather than expanding the show, has caused a cut in the performance time (one song or skit only now according to Chuck Biondo, the M.C.). The effect has been less space and time for some of the best amateur talent I've seen anywhere. I also have a hard time with Biondo's general "lets get this over with" attitude. I remember when there wasn't a single act turned away from the show, even if it ran for three hours or more (the audience was always free to leave and most chose to stay). In addition it seems that Chuck Biondo has seen fit to preplan which acts will go on and when. At the last Open Mike of last semester I had an act listed seventh on the list and I told Chuck personally that we had to go on in that spot. When we were finally called after the thirteenth act I was a

bit peeved. At the most recent show I was at the sign-up spot at 6:06 (I was not going on but just wanted to see who was going to sign up) only to see people being turned away by the soundman who said

"Chuck says the shows Full". The poor soundman had to deal with irrate, frustrated would-be performers while Chuck (And everyone who was supposed to have been signing up) was nowhere to be found. In short, Biondo had obviously promised the vast majority of time spots before sign-ups ev en occured. My solution to this is to have SAB and Chuck Biondo clean up their proverbial acts! For openers: increase the number of shows to at least one per month, the interest, acts, and

crowds justify that, move the show to the Union dining where the room will be large enough to accomodate both the acts and the audience, have sign-ups start only when they're supposed to, as opposed to the present "friends first" policy presently impractice, call the acts up as they're listed, as opposed to when Chuck feels like it, and finally, allow two songs and unlimited sign-ups. These are just a few possible and NECESSARY changes to make it the program. Ressurect "Open Mike" in its original, spontaneous, long-winded, unpredictable form or do us all a favor and drop it from your schedule entirely.

After reading the letter to the editor entitled "The Top 40 Pop of Bubble Gum" in last week's edition of the Ithacan, I feel that it is necessary for the students of Ithaca College to understand certain things about the Bureau of Concerts as well as the Hall and Oates concert.

In the first place, the Bureau

of Concerts tries to bring quality, top name acts to the college and the community. One way to make the decision as to which act should appear at the school is to use the input that the students give the Executive Board of the Bureau of Concerts. This input is given to us through surveys, polls, and by people actually coming up to our office and

talking to us. It has always been our contention to get as many students involved in the process of producing concerts and this begins with students actually voicing their opinions

Secondly, the reason why Hall and Oates was chosen to appear at the school is a very basic one. In October of 1981, the Bureau of Concerts conducted a survey, listing the possible acts that were available to appear at the school. According to the results of this survey. Hall and Oates was the number one choice of the student body. Another important feature of that particular survey was that all students had the opportunity to voice their opinions. The surveys were distributed to all the dorms and tables were set up in the union for off-campus students. In addition, the survey had one of the widest distributions of any survey sponsored by a studentrun organization and there was a 30 percent rate of return

on the surveys. The Bureau of Concerts is fully aware that every student is not going to be pleased by every choice that we make. However, we also try to attract as many students as possible to the concerts that we produce. What this means is that a diversity of music must be presented to the IC community. In the past we have followed that philosophy and will continue to do so in the future. In addition, when we receive an availability for any band, that does not mean we can automatically get them to appear at the school. There are a number of factors involved in the decision-making process including whether or not we have the gym, whether or not our bid will be accepted by the group, etc.

Finally, the Bureau of Concerts would like to thank the Ithacan for their support in helping us make this show a successful effort. As for the "concerned music lovers of the campus," we invite you to voice your concerns by coming up to our office and talking with us. Our office is located on the third floor of Egbert Union and our phone r imber is 274-3323.

Nominations will be accepted by the Financial Aid Office until 5 pm, Friday, March 19. No nominations will be accepted over the phone, only those in writing accompanied by the nominator's and nominee's campus/local address and phone number.

The Campus Life Awards will be presented on Saturday, May 15.

To the Editor:

I was very pleased to read your January 28, 1982 article Viewpoint-"Warm Feeling in Cold Weather."

However, I feel that I must point out that the sound of scraping shovels at 6:00 in the morning were more than likely being made by the Physical Plant's third shift custodial staff that shares in the responsibility for snow and ice removal as well as having all our academic buildings cleaned and ready by 7:00 in the morning for another days use.

I feel obligated to comment on this because the difficult problem with night shift work is the inevitable feeling of not belonging and not getting recognition for the work done on the night shift because they are very seldom seen by the College Community, but the work done by the night shift is very evident with out total custodial operation.

I would also like to point out that with any snow emergency or adverse weather conditions at Ithaca College that the Custodial Staff(all or any shift) is right there working with the Ground's Division to keep our campus as safe as possible.

IC Gets 6.5 From Students

The following survey was conducted by the Ithacan to get a general view of Ithaca College by its students.

Included are the responses of 164 Ithaca College students (82 males, 82 females) to eight questions pertaining to the academic/social life of the college.

Students were interviewed by the phone and in person. Dorm hall phones were randomly selected. Students were also interviewed as they passed through Egbert Union.

The 'random' shown here of 164 students is a small percentage of the 4,700 students presently expolled, and so this survey should not be thought of as evidence, only as a representation of a group of students.

The following are the questions which were asked: (1. Academically, how would you rate Ithaca College on a scale from 1 to 10? (10 being most competitive, 1 being noncompetitive)

- (2.) How many hours, on the average, do you study a week?
- (3.) How many hours in your opinion, does the average Ithaca College student study a week?

The questions are general. They were devised to give an overall (academically socially), but limited, view of Ithaca College by a small sample of the colleges population.

The results are shown in table A, on page 6-7. The averages and totals are listed.


rated Ithaca Students College academically at 6.55 on a scale from 1-10.

To the extent that on the spot interviewing is accurate, the students in this survey average 17.5 hours of studying a week. The interviewers said, on the average, the average Ithaca College student studies 14.4 hours a week.

According to this data an average Ithaca College student goes out 2.53 times a week. (This is when the student is not It does studying. necessarily mean going to bars or downtown). Students seem to feel that the average Ithaca Student goes out 3.23 times a week.

The people questioned in this survey tended to think the average Ithaca College student goes out to the "pick-up" scene (130 of 164). 34 others

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
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
felt that people go out on dates or a combination of the two. when asked this question, a number of people stated something in this tone "many times people just go out with friends, not particularly to get picked up."


As far as Ithaca College sex life being any different than other colleges, most students seem to feel that the sex life is the same (144 of 164) for other colleges. Twenty felt that Ithaca was different as far as the sex life was concerned.


When asked if they agreed or disagreed with the 1978-79 issue of Insiders Guide to Colleges assessment of Ithaca College, the students desagreed to a great extent (138-disagreed, 26, agreed). However, of the 26 who agreed, many said "not to a great extent," or "somewhat in agreement." The students who disagreed were quoted as saying that the article was "Totally out of proportion," or "same at other schools," or "Ithaca was singled out."

In this survey it was interesting to find that the students tended to feel that they study more than the average student (17.4 hours). And that these students also felt that they go out less than the average Ithaca College Student (2.53 nights a week as compared with 3.23).

Outlook Not Good ann

If you are out job hunting, you've picked the wrong time. According to state labor analyst, Joe Kozlowski, unemployment rates are expected to climb in 1982, and won't get much better until next fall.

Tompkins county has always maintained a low rate of unemployment, yet in the past three months, unemployment of inworkers dustrial skyrocketed.

High interest rates, general economic conditions, and high energy costs have hit industry hard, especially in the Ithaca area. Wallace steel has cut em-

ployment 25 percent in the past four months. November and December were record .setting lows in which the company had to sell inventories at a loss. Because of the cutbacks, the export market fell substancially. Wallace Steel hopes for improvement in the next six months, and will rehire the majority of those laid off by summer.

National Cash Register laid off 60 employees in January, but has been undergoing cuts for the past twelve months. General manager Hoss says production is currently at its lowest. However, he feels NCR will be recalling laid-off workers sometime in

April. A new cash register contract with Sears Roebuck & Co. should stimulate business.

Thomas Seaman of Morse Chain doesn't expect to rehire laid-off workers until this sum-

Ithaca Gun Co. was closed from mid-December to February 1st to conserve capital. Approximately 160 laid-off workers are anxiously awaiting recall.

Downtown, Rothchild's is in a state of uncertainty. The parent company of Rothchild's has filed bankruptcy, leaving local employees doubtful of their future there.

David Strong, chairman of

Tompkins County Chamber of Commerce says small business will be undergoing some rough times in the beginning of this year. Similar to industrial plants, Strong sees an increase in business coming in the fall, but definately not in the spring.

Education workers will find little change in employment this year. Almost a third of the jobs in Tompkins County are related to service and miscellaneous jobs at Cornell and Ithaca College. Next year's student enrollment will be about the same as this year's.

Joanne Klausher of the Ithaca

the Small Business Council of the College Financial Aid Office states that there are the same number of students involved in work study as last year, which is about 370 students. Campus employment gives jobs to about 1600 students. Klausher sees no future cuts in student employment because the amount of jobs to be filled remains the same. For next year, each department will determine exactly how many hours are needed of student help by totalling all workers' hours for a commposite amount of hours. Student employment will remain basically unchanged next year, despite high inflation.

Haunt

Arguably, the Haunt is the king pin for the IC Community as far as happy hours go. It's convenient location, reasonable drink prices, foot stomping tunes, and attractive atmosphere make it a natural for any Friday afternoon elbow bender. One of the bar's weaknesses, though, seems to be the amount of business they attract. At times the Haunt can be a zoo parade; that, of course, is fine if you're in the right frame of mind . . . but if you're looking for a place to go and peacefully drink your vodka martini, this bar's not for vou.

Dunbars

What the Haunt is to IC, Dunbars is to Cornell. For the past 3 weeks this bar, located on Eddy Street in Collegetown, has been packing them in as though prohibition were just around the **Dunbars** corner. recent popularity may be due in part to their hefty \$1.50 pitchers of Pabst and in part to their atmosphere. The low dark ceilings and rectangular bar only add to Dunbars appeal. Oh, and yes there is free popcorn and yes, unfortunately, you will need an extra dollar to cover the deposit on your pitcher. Finally, claustrophobics beware . . . during Friday happy hours this tavern does have a tendency to get cramped.

Connection a cocktail lounge than a bar. This really isn't the place to visit if your only interest is to consume as many kegs as possible. It is, however, the place to go if you'd like to have a couple of quiet drinks with a few close mends, or friend. It's features include . . . a bartender who knows how to bartend properly (This man knows how to make a blue max!), draft beer that isn't line feed but comes straight from

the barrel, intimate seating, and finally the best popcorn in town. Having stated the advantages, watch for the set-backs. You'll find you'll have to bring some extra finances to handle the cost of your refreshments; to give you some idea . . . pitchers go for \$2.00 a clip.

Johnny's Big Red Grill

Around the corner and up the street from the Connection stands Johnny's Big Red Grill. A bar that attracts mostly Cornell clientel. But this is not to say that ICers can't invade the premises. Some of Johnny's drawing cards include: \$1.50 pitchers with no dollar deposit hassle, room to sit and stand depending on your particular preference, and an extensive menu for those hungry pubcrawlers.

Unfortunately, from an appearance standpoint Johnny's leaves much to be desired. The bars Dingy, dusty wooden floors, dark, beaten walls and unattractive furniture detract from an otherwise good drink special.

Pines

split you've no doubt visited the pect 50¢ off all mixed drinks and Pine Tavern. The Pines happy hours seem somewhat subdued Saturday night happenings. afternoon exodus. crowds enjoy specials such as 35¢ or 40¢ drafts depending on your order, and 40¢ Old Vienna splits. 
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
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
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








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
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BOMBERS GO DOWN, 98-75



The Ithaca College Women's Basketball team won its biggest game of the season on Tuesday as they upset nationally ranked St. John Fisher 58-46 at Ben Light Gym.

Coming into the contest, St. John Fisher was ranked 17th in the nation amoung Division II schools and second in New York state with an impressive 16-1 record. Coach Natalie Smith wasvery impressed with the way her squad came back on Tuesday after a tough weekend on the road.

"We had two tough ball games against Canisius and St. Bonaventure on the road this past weekend. The kids went through a lot, but were able to come back tonight and play exceptionally well. This is the biggest win of the season," said Coach Smith.

The Bombers controlled the tempo of the game from start to finish with fine defensive play being the key. IC built up a 30-25 halftime lead and went ahead by as much as 10 in the second half. Fisher was unable to come any closer than five points and had only one player in double figures.

"Defense was the key for us tonight, we played our best defensive game of the year," added Smith.

Robin Mortenson was the only Fisher player to reach double figures with 17 poin-

ts . Offensively, the bombers received a well balanced attack from their starting five lead by Sherri Didio's game high 23 points. Joy Bertram and Allison Bishop each hit for 10, while Kari Dalaker had 9 as IC raised its record to 9-6.

In return, the Reds will receive catcher Alex Trevino and pitchers Jim Kern and Greg Harris. Just before the 2 p.m. press conference, Lou Gorman, Director of Baseball operations told me, "We're not finished dealing, our need is to go for pitchers.'

What the Mets don't have in the way of pitching, they will try picking up when interleague trading starts next week. They have an overabundence of outfielders. and either Lee Mazzilli, or Joel Youngblood will be elsewhere before the season opens up.

When asked about the lack of left handed hitters Gorman said "Everybody seems to forget about Gary Rajsich. He had a great season in the winter leagues. Down in La Gauria, Venezuela. he hit .286 with 14 HR's and 52 RBI in 65 games. He has a very good shot at making the Mets.'

After years of tight fisted, conservative management, the Mets are doing something to give the fans in flushing a reason to come to the big Shea. Never before in their 20 vear history have they had a bonafide hitter who can hit for both average and power.

While the Mets were reluctant to spend the big money like Reggie for talent Jackson or Don Baylor, they were over enthusiastic about "pheenoms" brought up from the farm system. Remember such greats as Benny Ayala, who hit a homerun his first time at bat and was immediately compared to Hank Aaron, or Dave Shneck, last reported to be selling hot dogs in Central Park.
