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

Program Notes

In the summer of 1795, at the age of 63, Haydn returned to Austria to resume his post with the Esterhazy family whom he had served for three decades. Because Prince Nikolaus II's tastes were limited almost entirely to church music, a series of six great choral works were composed between 1796 and 1802. The *Nelson Mass* was the third of these late Haydn masses. He composed the work during a 53 day period in July and August of 1798. The original title was "Missa in angustiis" which is roughly translated "Mass in straitened times." This had to do with the political and economic stress caused by the Napoleonic wars. Two years later, the Admiral Nelson who had led the British fleet in victory over the French in the Battle of Aboukir visited Prince Esterhazy and attended a performance of the mass in his lonor. After that time, the mass was referred to as the *Nelson Mass*. The orchestration of strings, three trumpets, timpani, and organ gives the *Nelson Mass* a distinct sonority.
