

#### THE SCHOOL OF MUSIC

The Ithaca College School of Music has one of the largest undergraduate music programs of any private, non-doctoral degree granting institution in the United States. Long known for its emphasis on individual performing ability coupled with a practical approach to music education, many leading professional performers and music educators are counted among Ithaca College School of Music alumni, including members of the major orchestras of the world, such as Philadelphia, Chicago, Boston, Cleveland, and Berlin, and as artists with the Metropolitan and New York City Opera companies.

Most undergraduates at Ithaca College enroll in the Bachelor of Music program, majoring in performance, music education, composition, jazz studies, or music theory. One of the most useful and popular programs combines music education and performance. This nine semester course of study prepares the student for a career in music education while placing a greater emphasis on performance than in the regular music education program. The newest program, the Bachelor of Music in Combination with an Outside Field, provides the student with the opportunity for strong musical training while also providing sufficient time for an emphasis or extensive minor outside of music. Some of the more popular fields include business and audio production. Students desiring a large amount of liberal arts may choose a music major in the Bachelor of Arts degree. A degree program in Musical Theatre, offered jointly by the Department of Theatre and the School of Music, serves those students interested in both theatre and music. The Ithaca College School of Music also offers master's degrees in performance, music education, composition, conducting, music theory, and Suzuki pedagogy in strings or piano.

Throughout their course of study, music students perform in major ensembles chosen from the College Symphony Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Symphonic Band, Choir, Chorus and Women's Chorale. In addition, many participate in the Opera Workshop, Jazz Workshop, Percussion Ensemble, Guitar Ensemble, Vocal Jazz Ensemble, Madrigal Singers, Brass Choir and String Orchestra.







#### ABOUT THE ITHACA COLLEGE WIND ENSEMBLE ...

The Ithaca College Wind Ensemble was founded in 1981 and is the premiere ensemble of woodwind, brass and percussion players on the Ithaca College campus. Following in the rich wind band tradition of Patrick Conway and Walter Beeler, the ensemble presents over fifteen concerts yearly, performing works of composers from the 1500's to the present. The commissioning of new works is a vital aspect of the ensemble's education and philosophy, the most notable example being Piece of Mind by Ithaca College composer Dana Wilson, which went on to win the 1987 Sudler International Wind Band Composition Contest and the 1988 ABA-Ostwald Composition Contest. Other premieres include works by Roger Nixon, David Amram, Gregory Woodward, Malcomb Lewis and Peter Rothbart. Guest soloists perform with the ensemble on a regular basis and have included members of the Chicago and Boston Symphony Orchestras as well as twenty Ithaca College faculty artists. Guest composers/conductors are another important aspect of the ensemble's experience and have included, among others, Samuel Adler, Lukas Foss, Karel Husa, Warren Benson, Alfred Reed, John Corigliano, Joseph Schwantner, Carl St. Clair, Larry Rachleff, Thomas Lee, Mallory Thompson and Frank Battisti. In addition to a yearly tour, the Wind Ensemble has performed at the New York State School Music Educators Conference, the New York State Band Directors Symposium and the Music Educators National Eastern Division Conference. A new facet of the ensemble is a bi-yearly recording series that will feature works from the Beeler Commissioning Series/Composition Competition as well as standard repertoire for the wind band. The first record in this series included Piece of Mind by Dana Wilson, La Fiesta Mexicana by H. Owen Reed and Galop by Dmitri Shostakovich as arranged by Donald Hunsberger. The second recording is the most recent and the ensemble's first on compact disc. It contains From A Dark Millennium by Joseph Schwantner, Concertino for Piano, Winds, Percussion and Harp by Kamillo Lendvay, Illyrian Dances by Guy Woolfenden and Music for Winds and Percussion by Frank Ticheli. Of these seven works, all are premiere recordings except for the compositions by Reed and Lendvay.

Rodney Winther is associate professor of music and director of bands at the Ithaca College School of Music, where he conducts the Wind Ensemble and teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting and wind literature. Known for his championing of contemporary music, Winther has received praise for his interpretations from such composers as Karel Husa, Lucas Foss, Witold Lutoslawski, Gunther Schuller, Joseph Schwantner, Samuel Adler, and David Amram.

His guest conducting and teaching have taken him across the United States and abroad, most recently to the Republic of Malaysia as a cultural specialist sponsored by the United States Information Agency. His recordings with the Ithaca College Wind Ensemble has brought the ensemble national and international recognition, having been played on National Public Radio stations in the United States and in Europe. These activities and his research in wind literature have resulted in being selected as a clinician and music editor for the publishing firm of Boosey and Hawkes. Winther holds degrees from the University of Idaho (bachelor of music education and master of music) and was in residence at the Eastman School of Music for two years while working toward the doctor of musical arts degree in conducting.

In addition to extensive public school teaching, he has also taught at Walla Walla College, Purdue University, and Oregon State University. While at the Eastman School he served as assistant conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble and Wind Orchestra, studied privately with Donald Hunsberger and David Effron, and taught undergraduate conducting.

Gordon Stout is currently associate professor of percussion at the Ithaca College School of Music. A composer as well as percussionist who specializes on marimba, he has studied compositon with Samuel Adler and Warren Benson, and percussion with James Salmon and John Beck. As a composer-recitalist he has premiered many of his original compositions as well as works by other contemporary composers. Many of his compositions for marimba are published and have already become standard repertoire for marimbists world-wide.

His association with trumpeter Robert Levy led to the creation of "The Wilder Duo" for trumpet and marimba, which has gained extensive recognition through the creation of over 25 new compositions by American composers for this exciting new combination of instruments.

In May of 1983, Mr. Stout performed clinics and recitals in France, Germany, Holland and Belgium and was described as the "Rubenstein of the marimba." A frequent lecture-recitalist for the Percussive Arts Society, he has appeared at seven International PAS Conventions to date as featured marimbist. He has also appeared throughout the United States and Canada.
