### **Thesis Statement**

War is shattering, leaving behind gaping wounds in need of healing. Some require bandages, other wounds are psychological and not visible. Both leave a scar. These scars are an inevitable part of the human experience. The psychological and physical ramifications of war exist as long as strife pervades. This collection of works, depicting war from the French Revolution to present day Iraq, illustrates the scarring impact war has on the people and places within its grasp. Meanwhile, this chronological art analysis reveals the static outcomes of war throughout history: destruction and suffering.

# **Project Methods and Objectives**

Out of a long list of artists and works we chose nine exemplary works and series to include in our exhibit. These particular works were the best examples of the scaring effects war has on people and the environment. We created a paradox between the progression in art style and technology with the pervasive, timeless theme of war's destruction.

The complete list of works includes: the Los Desastres de la Guerra series by Francisco Goya, the Der Krieg series by Otto Dix, the Hiroshima Panels by Iri and Toshi Maruki, Vietnam II by Leon Golub, *The Rwanda Project* by Alfredo Jaar, *The Victor* Weeps by Fazal Sheikh, Bomb Ponds by Vandy Rattana, and the War is Trauma Portfolio by Justseeds and Iraq Veterans Against War.

### **Selection of Proposed Artworks**



Los Desastres de la Guerra by Francisco Goya

This collection depicts the hostile relations during the Peninsular War (1808-14). War, famine, and political turmoil are themes in the work, attempting to show the destructive effect war has on civilians and soldiers.

The gray scale contrast captures the horrific atmosphere of WWI. The series illuminates the fine line between life and death in times of war.






The Victor Weeps by Fazal Sheikh

Justseeds and Iraq Veterans Against the War collaborated to create the War is Trauma Portfolio – a campaign to stop the deployment of traumatized troops and win service members and veterans the right to heal.

*Vietnam II* by Leon Golub

Civilians are not always exempt from the bloodshed. Here we see soldiers aiming their guns at innocent Vietnamese civilians within this harrowing work.

New technology and art styles have transformed the way we see the world. We go from plate etchings in the earliest works to works responding to the impact of televised images during the Vietnam War, and photographs and abstract art responding to the recent conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq. Regardless of what way artists choose to depict war, war remains heartbreaking, psychologically and physically destructive, leaving an imprint on the world around us.
