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Germantown April 15. 1835

My dear Brother

When last at home I received your letter and was much pleased to hear from you and especially to hear of your health and work doing. I have had a particular desire to see you since conference, could it so have happened in the providence of God that my lot had been cast in the district of your abode it would have been an agreeable thing to me for I think I understand Mr. Joseph's & Mr. Finley administration, the happy scenes we have had together will not be forgotten by me I trust in time and in the good world I expect my memory will be fastened on those subjects - I am getting along so far well with Bro. William B. he is certainly a fine man and I suppose to a correspondent view on administration I as yet anticipate no difficulty and hope to have a pleasant year.

I am much pleased with my colleague he just said to me, he is a fine fellow and I think, he intend^s advancement let the girls alone
