Washington City
February 16th 1838

Brother Finley
Your favour of the 9th inst. enclosing two letters is at hand, and the Letters forwarded as desired. It is true, we have occasionally a little squall something like unto a storm; but they are very much like a shower of rain in a very dry spell of weather at the distant, makes a prodigious roaring but when it approaches us we find that it was mostly noise & but little rain. Congress makes a great deal of noise abroad without effecting much here.

You enquire after my religious enjoyments. when I come here I bro^t with me two certificates one of my church-membership and one of my election to congress, and having arrived a day or two previous to the meeting of Congress, I hunted up the National preacher of the city & procured & occupied my seat in the class room before before I ventured into the big House. I find a good society of Methodists here and when out of the Capitol, confine my associations principally to them. Some six or eight members of Congress meet regularly every Saturday evening & hold a prayer meeting. Brother Good and myself are of the number. so upon the whole I enjoy myself here in religious matters pretty well for me. I am glad to hear that you are making the "Whitney Bark" fly in your section
