Brother James Findley Sir Hoping the importance of the present business may plead me a sufficient apology for thus intruding upon your attention I have taken my pen to address you

My husband Mr Burdise has again obtained a number of letters from different persons to Governor Bell praying for the release of my son William. He was informed by Mr Smith representative of this county that Gov. Bell had said he would release William if he was convinced that he had reformed. By the conversation which I held with you when in Columbus in reference to my son I am convinced that you can assure the Governor of his reformation and trusting that you will interest you if that far for him I have written if it be practicable for you to see the Governor before he leaves Columbus for this place you would oblige me by so doing and stating the reformation which has taken place in William since his confinement but if you cannot see the Governor you will please address a letter to my husband William which he can present to Gov Bell we have had strong encouragement to proceed however been assured by the Judge who passed his sentence and his associates that they would exert their best influence for his liberation and deeming I word from you of much importance I have taken the liberty to address you if you should see the Governor previous to his departure and speak to him upon this subject please address a line to us what we may know how to proceed I would of been up but my friends advised me it would of be better to see the Governor there please to call on William tell him that you have heard from me we are all well at present and hope to see him soon. Mr Garrison called on us and told us that William was well. Nothing more at present from Burdise but remain yours in Christian fellowship
