Guyandott Augst 1830

Dear Uncle James

I have just crawled out from the ⁹⁴ of getting self
sufficiently thawed & recovered from a state of torpidity
to write you a few lines while it is with fear & trembling I shall
attempt to address you by letter. Conscious of my own inability to discharge
the duty I have taken upon myself in a most calculated to give you
the best pleasure or satisfaction. My Dear Uncle I believe for the
first time in my life I am trying to write to you, it was not for
a disposition to do so, knowing my imperfections in letter writing
I should rather decline hearing many witty things than write my
own stupid ones. I hope you will look at the ~~letter~~ before you
pass a sentence of condemnation upon the net,

With inexpressible pleasure we received yours while reading your
letter I thought for a moment I had the exquisite pleasure of
enjoying the delightfull converse of those that hold no ordinary
place in my affections. But alas I was doomed to meet with a
sad disappointment there was no uncle than.

Are anyone good health & are pleasantly situated in this village
Dear Sir we would not be inten that you should be phased
with a visit to this place I am certain of one thing that is to every
man admiring the pictur-esque scenery of Guyandott I can
assure you of one thing my admiration is most inexpressible
as per the streets are well paved with sand it is not necessary
to black our shoes & ge. We received a letter from John a few
days since that we no longer in Pigeon the 4 men of Deer with me
there first grand entrance in to the city of Lima had stock bare
