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June 22 A.D. 1838

Dear Uncle James:

I with pleasure embrace this present leisure moment to communicate my mind on matters and things to you as a venerable sage and father in Christ. In consequence of having no young company to associate myself with I get lonesome, though they are young society but they are as uncultivated and uncouth as the primeval of the Land they ought to be precipitated in the abyss of darkness, and their in nocturnal shades bring out their miserable and ignorant existence. My prominate object is to get myself well fortified with the Pecuniary matters - though I am not so much absorbed in this matter as to be entirely indifferant to the Great and important concerns that make for my peace and salvation I can see most indubitably that I am under the fostering and protecting care of Heaven every day of my life - The Lord has prospered me so far; and I believe if I devote I will prosper in my basket and my store, the saviour of the World is the grand Cardinal Mucalis about which I hang - I suppose that you recollect of giving me a piece of advice - if you do not I do, as follows - "It is better to suffer wrong than do wrong" I have since that time made it my predominate motto of action I find that every place I go I have friends but here in consequence of Bill Strain acting the deavile so that the peope have been set against me - some observations has been made that I was no better than Billy strain "My uncle Billy" but I take a plain independent course in life - seeking to know person I will not keep the hostlerias ^{of an man} ~~of an man~~ to associate myself

in their good graces I have made some money since
I have been here and ^{with} all probability I make as much
more this fall - It is generally a healthy time here now
I have a speculation in view and if I get it accomplished I can

have every thing to do with it - If I must give every
person a share in it I would prefer you - however you
can deliberate on the matter given me the answer; and if you
conclude I will be in this fall as soon as I can get off
that is if my practice will admit of it - I hear a from
