Dear Uncle James:

I with pleasure embrace this present  
earlier moment to communicate my mind on matters  
and things to you as a venerable sage and father in Srial  
In consequence of having no young company to associate myself  
with I get lonesome, though they are young society but they  
are as uncultivated and uncooth as the primeval of the Land  
they ought to be precipitated in the abysm of darkness, and their  
in nocturnal shades bring out their miserable and ignorant  
existence — My prommate objects is to get myself well fortified  
with the Pecuniary matters — though I am not so much absorba  
in this matter as to be entirely inefarant to the Great and  
important consurns that make for my peace and salvation I  
can see most indubitably that I am under the fostering  
and protecting care of Heaven every day of my life — The Lord  
has prospered me so far; and I believe if I associate I will prosper  
in my basket and my store, the servicer of the Lord is the grand  
Cardinal Meekness about which I hang — I suppose that  
you recollect of giving me a peice of advice — if you does  
not I doe, as follows — It is better to suffer wrong than do wrong  
I have ~~saw~~ seen that time made it my predominate motto of action  
I find that every place I go I have friends but heare in conse-  
quence of Bill Stearn acting the deavile so that the people have  
been set against me — some observations has been made  
that I was as bitter then Bill Stearn "my uncle Billiey" but  
I take a plain independent cose in life — marketing to now person  
I will not kip the hoolierar of <sup>one man</sup> 300 persons to anciate myself

in these good grases S. have made some money since

more this fall - It is generally a healthy time here now
