Dear Father Hinley I implore the present opportunity of writing to you on the subject of my departure from oxford. perhaps Dear sir you may think it strange that I have com to the conclusion that it is best for me to leave oxford but when you hear the reasons I hope that you will not think it strange or wrong to say the least I hav maid it a subject of much prayer to god. I need not mention my last years afflictions onely I would just say that these past afflictions has so completely shattered my constitution. that I fear it will be sometime yet before I get the better of them. I hav not tried to preach but 2. since our Quarter meeting and it was onely trying for I had not strength to preach. I can assure you that I have no alternative in going home & ankles to chusing my exercise and by so doing I believe by the blessing of God I shall regain my former health. and I further beleve that preaching is injurious to my health while I am thus afflicted. I am well aware that an itinerant life is one that calls us to make many sacrifices and this I think I am willing to do. but I am conscious that he does not require us to labour when we are not able and I can say of a truth that such is the state of my sister in thorne 15 months afflictions that I am conscious that I had better stop preaching until I regain my health again I have been sick 15 months from home and to lay sick much longer from home I cannot for I have no doubt but you know something of the difficulties of laying sick from home and as I am not a heil to preach I shall start home in a few days. I hope that you will agree with me in this course for I do not wish to do enything that is contrary to the laws of the church or your views. but I must go home until I regain my health. when I have health I stand ready to march at eny time but when sick and afflicted as I have been and still am I must have some of my own time and in some degree pursue that course

We very much regret the necessary arrangement ask<sup>d</sup> for in the above epistle we have no doubt of the reasonable ness of the request made by Bro<sup>t</sup> H. we hope therefore that you (whose right it is) may feel disposed if find it convenient to acquiesce in granting to that (worthy Officer of the M.E.C.) the necessary furlow as thareby (its possible) the Church may (in future) be efficiently serv<sup>d</sup> for years instead of a few months

At our last official meeting it was the General opinion; that if practicable for you to supply the vacancy (as man<sup>d</sup> in the above communication) that Bro<sup>t</sup> H<sup>r</sup> course was judicious It was also the wish of S<sup>r</sup> meeting (if agreeable to your views) that the Station be supplied (in the absence of Bro<sup>t</sup> H) by the Rev<sup>r</sup> W<sup>r</sup> Gates or Submitting at the same time with due deference to any arrangement made by those (having the right) of the Rule over us. During the interval the vacancy can (no doubt will be) acceptably fill by that mysterious talented & master Street from the Emerald Isle our esteemed & worthy Bro<sup>t</sup> Grieve who may with proper (Church Economy) & the blessing of Heaven; be made a bright & shining light in the M.E.C. — There are to be seen in the distance some good effects of our late L<sup>r</sup> & we hope by the co<sup>r</sup> working of the Spirit the Church & the Christian to see better days very soon for which help us by your prayers is the earnest solicitation of your (unworthy friend) of Brother in tribulation
