## Letter from William S. Hutt to James B. Finley

Dear Brother Stranger as I am personally to you, I take the liberty to address a few lines to you in charge of ~~Bro. W.~~ Mr. Fully - The subject is a very delicate one, but the more I reflect on it, the more I am persuaded, it is my duty, Conference is on the eve of their annual meeting, the Supply for the Circuits, involves a great and important trust - That duty can only be well discharged by the Bish[ops], when proper representations are made by the presiding Elders, and, how delicate the task, if they conscientiously discharge that duty, how often they may be charged with partiality. I have no fears of Bro. Young tho' I thus speak. I had a few words with him on that subject a few days before he left us, on the propriety of sending Mr. Baldwin to take charge of this Circuit. It was induced from considerations of the debt that is hanging over us on account of the church, to suggest, that it might be advisable to offend him, but on a more mature reflection I do not think it advisable that Mr. Baldwin should be returned to this Circuit again. I have recently learned there are ~~great~~ objections, and it seems increased objections with a number of our friends, that his labours among us might not prove as beneficial as could be desired - Reference may be had to Bro. Young & W. Fully in whom you may with confidence rely.

as respects the temporal affairs or debt due <sup>in consequence of</sup> the building our church in charleston - I presume hundred might be selected with equal or greater certainty of attaining that much desired object - I therefore solicit your interest (coupled with your long experience) in selecting some well experienced (what Method?) Preacher, well experienced in word and doctrine. No. It has been in contemplation to make some alterations in our Circuit, making charleston something like a station connecting however the Chapel at the Salter & Welch's church together, a very agreeable station - I am almost prompted from my feelings, and great good that might grow out of a connection

of Pastor and Clerk, to wish you would, or could be prevailed upon if consistent with your duty & inclination to spend at least one conference year in Charleston. Consider - your knowledge of Methodism and especially a deputation I think would be blessed to our growth in grace &c.

I was somewhat flattered with the hope that you would have invited us during the Conference year just expired,

I still hope you will make it convenient to come to Navarre  
we should be much rejoiced to have with us a father in Christ  
so well able to instruct and confirm

Parson the liberty I have take in addressing this imperfect  
epistle to you but believe me - in the sincerity of my heart
