Editors' Note

The editors felt that the occasion of our graduation from Touro should not pass without some record having

been made of our class and its experience here.

Although this yearbook was hastily conceived, it is our hope that we have come up with more than just the normal grouping of pictures and platitudes. The concept of allowing each student to provide the material for his own page stresses the uniqueness of the individual, an integral component of Touro's atmosphere. Around this core of student pages may be found the required features of the average yearbook.

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Coming in for that first orientation program one wasn't sure how many fellow "intrepid" classmates he could expect! How did they (we?) all arrive at this place and time? Some speeches, movies, a trite composition—and a registration which set the tone for all subsequent ones. After the weekend the first year began.

Classes—and, almost immediately, meetings. Curriculum committees, evaluation committees, liaison arrangements; the famous statement, "I am chairman of *all* committees!" What did these really accomplish? They showed us there was an open door—someone who could accept what we felt and said, and just maybe do something about it. Hour-long sessions with Dr. Cohen—dinners, at which we tried to define Touro. (Aren't we still?) Impossible labs, lousy building, no facilities—but it didn't really make *that* much difference. Sure it was uncomfortable—but we were in it together and thought there was room and opportunity there for change. We could mold this place!

Characters emerged. Hasidim, Flatbush "goyim", the MTA clique-the out-of-town guys, who had their own set of "in" jokes. The faculty had their own set of characters too. Professional smokersthe Plato that could be acquired at the bookstore near the "Gah-den"-"the animal has no consciousness"-a history class consisting of a lecture on diesel engines-the wrench of being in a math class whose subject matter was totally incomprehensible-Judaic studies A&B-"you thought you knew how to write, ha? Unity!"-a quest for which sustained us over that summer.

It was good coming back-seeing new beards on familiar faces-seeing familiar faces altogether! No renovations, of course, but we were probably resigned to that. Administration doors were still open-and administration ranks had grown. Aunt (sister?) Deena available to lend a shoulder and an ear-some sort of bookkeeping. Is it *really* commonplace to advert to the entrenched apathy and circulating melancholies. . .? A greater variety of courses including those in the Judaic studies program-more flexibility. The opportunity to postpone the second year of Humanities. "Will they really catch up with me if I don't take it now?" A chance to check out the incoming class and compare ourselves to them. The place is getting too big-already we're afraid that the spirit of that first year is being lost. The pre-med faction solidifying, taking all their courses together; at least *they* know what they are doing. Recruitment, Thursday night speed reading, academic advisement, career planning (?) A Touro bulletin!! Can this place really be shaping up? The move to Seventh Avenue put us in touch with another side of Midtown. At least this was a building-even though not ours. Water fountains yet! Three classes now-a define hierarchy emerging. Some sophs emerged as leaders but we still had the power. Speaking of which-how about our comptroller, the major? Ha-we outlasted him, too. Signing over work-study checks with the emphasis on study. A good place for chagigas, as the truly successful Chanukah get-together illustrated-were the rumors of a women's branch of Touro a result? People jumping for spots on admissions interviews: What kind of student body do we want? The spring foreshadowed our exposure to Stan Kaplan, MCAT's, LSAT's, GRE's, MAT's-something for everyone. We were hitting the big time-our first med and law school acceptances-Touro might just be becoming a legitimate venture after all.

Stein's commission tried to tamper with that, but we've become resilient enough to weather his people—a big embarrassment to start our last year with, but a replacement at the top and on we go. Guy's coming in with ties and jackets—"Hey, you getting married, or did you have an interview?" Sweating out med and grad schools—the big test—here's what the four years come down to—it's hitting the fan now. A full four year college—and we are definitely at the top. But is anyone listening to us? You bet they are—our acceptances are strengthening Touro—the feeling of having "arrived". The hell with anyone who'll put us down—we were right four years ago. And that great Spring of '75. Going to classes, but with our heads in Mt. Sinai, U of P, Harvard, NYU, U of Mass, Columbia, Wharton, Downstate—we have made it. The Women's Division proving itself a viable entity. Problems looming on the horizon: Are they revamping Judaic Studies again? Caps and gowns at Graduation? Accreditation already? Time to let someone else worry about all that—we've done our share and more, We are Touro!!

The world outside facing large problems as well. The waste of ten years of U.S. involvement in Vietnam. 55,000 lives, dissent, and polarization—and for what? Compassion for refugees—and profound disillusionment when one remembers the plight of our Jewish refugees of the Holocaust. Kissinger defends Thieu and his cronies, but pressures Israel for concessions. In the final analysis, a Jew can rely only on his fellow Jew. As Jewish college students involved in the creation of an institution, we, too, rely on each other. It's as if the world of 1975 is being seen through the looking-glass. The old norms are no longer, and a vacuum exists. This is the world we enter—our experience in shaping Touro's growth has provided us with the ability to help shape the forces which will fill that vacuum. Let's get on with it.

Writing a message to the first graduating class of a new college is like nothing else. Analogies just do not seem to work. Here, finally, is an event which stands alone. It is singular, unique, uncharacteristic, like the class itself.

I was part of the recruitment team (with Dr. Lander and whoever else would come along) that sping of '71 when we met with students and tried to convince them to come to Touro College.

I remember assuring the young men that at Touro, in addition to academic excellence, students would also be closely involved in problems of growth, development of college programs, the formulation of college governance, and the determination of parietals.

We promised that at Touro, students would be in small classes. "You can't get lost at Touro", I remember saying, "there's no place to hide." We also told the young candidates (or those we hoped might become candidates) that they would enjoy the finest professors, and we rattled off a list of rather impressive names.

Out of the hundreds to whom we spoke, we finally convinced thirty-five young men who were imaginative and brave enough to take the chance and go with this new experiment. This was not only a group of bright young people with high academic expectations, but also a daring group, young people ready to make, not simply be spectators of, history.

Now, four years later, I think we can say that we missed many opportunities we should have seized; we lost students whom we might have saved; but we kept our word on fundamental issues. Classes have been small. The faculty is more like a boutique collection than a supermarket display—each one selected in good taste guided by the highest standards of academic excellence. If an error was occasionally made, rectification was generally quite swift, and most of the people who were with us in '71 are still with us in '75.

The rare combination of bright young people and a challenging, demanding faculty made it possible for just about every graduate who wanted it to be admitted to the professional or graduate school of his choice. But more, the Touro experience for this class has established a base for lifelong experiences. Most members of this graduating class have been transformed, metamorphosed as a result of what has happened here during the past four years. If the students changed during these fateful four years because of their Touro experiences, Touro was modified because of its students.

Time will evaluate the quality of the Touro product, but I can say without bias that this is surely FIRST CLASS.

Four years ago Touro College was a dream and hope for the happy few. Today it is a school that has experienced both enormous success and more than its share of difficulty. In its original conception, Touro College flew in the face of prevailing trends in American higher education in 1971. While educators throughout the country were reducing the requirements and easing the academic burdens of students, Touro College increased the academic requirements and demanded more intensive effort of its students. While other colleges founded "ethnic studies departments" which neatly categorized separate cultural programs which reduced themselves to the lowest common denominator, Touro College opted for a more intensive study of Jewry and its culture while demanding the fullest integration of the Jewish cultural experience into the general academic program. In effect, Touro expected its students to receive an integrated study of Jewish culture, the classical Greco-Roman heritage, the European development of the Middle Ages and Renaissance, as well as the scientific modern world as part of their general education. Students were not expected to be masters in all of these areas but to specialize in only one, provided they had first completed the general education sequence which was to mark off the Touro graduate from other American undergraduates in his scope and breadth of learning. To accomplish this task Touro provided limited size classes and the option of specialization in classes which might, and often did, consist of only one student pursuing a particular subject of all-consuming interest to him.

Touro College has actually achieved phenomenal results in this program as shown by the success of its graduates in securing entrance into the finest graduate and professional schools at a time when the competition is keenest. We can all look back with pride to the early years of the college when the relationship between faculty and students was so intimate, and when the small band of faithful students worked in unusual harmony with the faculty from early morning to late at night under trying physical conditions. Non-credit seminars bringing faculty and students together in an informal setting that included a common meal and most interesting conversation were a part of the Touro scene.

Touro, however, has grown and expanded. It now includes a woman's division, a professional school, adult education program, and more. It is for those of us who remain at Touro to organize and to fashion the school so that the expansion of the student body and the increasing problems of administration do not irreparably damage the vision of its founders. That will be a difficult task, but it can be achieved, and with the combined efforts of all, including the alumni, it will be achieved.


I often wonder what makes a man truly great. I believe the answer lies not in acquisition nor power, but rather in the way that a person influences the lives of those with whom he comes in contact.


I'd like to dedicate this page to all those friends, both my peers and professors, who, have shared such moments with me and impressed themsleves upon my life.






Dark, lit by two fires candles trimm'd and glowing bright sputtering, dead, dark.

Touro College is a fine idea, and I am glad that I got my college education here. It was more than a factory, it was more than simply custodial care. It was of great benefit to me, because I came here at a time when I was in need of a type of education and the sort of atmosphere which, I am sure, only Touro could have provided. More importantly, Touro was a college where there was no artificial and indefensible separation between the most basic components of our lives–our Jewishness–and what is supposed to be one of the most important stages of our lives–college education. In summary, I am absolutely certain that I made the right decision in coming to Touro.

BUT . . . as in every country, at every time, Jews are not free to make decisions and evaluations so simply and smugly. The outside world intrudes, and other forces come into play. Now, thirty years after the Holocaust, twenty-seven after the birth of Israel, and only months after the Yom Kippur War, is no different. We must view Touro College in the totality of the world Jewish situation. In that view, I am afraid, Touro fails on a number of counts.

Touro is predicated on the belief that there is merit and reason to attempt to strengthen the American Jewish community, that there is validity in its future survival, and that it is good to equip young Jews for a future here, based on their background in the values of both Judaism and Western civilization. I believe with all my heart that this is both a futile and dangerous endeavor, because, quite simply, the American Jewish community is doomed.

There is no Jewish life in America. There are the remnants of European Jewish life, and there is a parasitic adaptation of Israeli culture, but there is no American Jewish achievement. The vast majority of Jews here feel absolutely no commitment, and those who do, feel it only through the existence of Israel. And it gets worse as they get younger. The *dati* community is a joke. It is a pitfully small group, a footnote to the community at large, without leadership, without purpose, without direction, without unity. Jewish education has failed when the majority of its products fall victim to the same vices as the rest of the community. Demographers agree that because of high rates of intermarriage and assimilation and a low birthrate, the Jewish population will decline to only *two million* by 1995, out a total American population of 300,000,000–i.e., it will be reduced to another freak subgroup, like the Dutch Amish, or Quakers. Spiritually, there is no future here. *AND PHYSICALLY THERE IS NO FUTURE HERE EITHER*. America is *galut*, and like all others, this *galut* will be ended. The blueprint is clear, the forces are already at work, and there is nothing to stop them. The American Jewish community will be destroyed. To strengthen the ties which keep Jews in America is to be an accomplice in their destruction. The only legitimate activity for Jewish institutions to engage in is mass *aliya*, both to save themselves, and the State of Israel.


The State of Israel. Only thirty years after the American Jewish community's collaboration in the destruction of European Jewry, it is calmly prepared to witness another Holocaust with equal self-righteousness. Israel, the only reason for any kind of moral existence, the sole light in the world after the Holocaust, is endangered, and only because of the failure of American Jewry to do what it should-go on *aliya*. Israel *WILL NOT* survive without mass *aliya*, and if Israel should fall, it will be because of American Jewry-because of institutions which enabled and encouraged American Jews to stay.

What kind of Jewish education is it, anyhow, which does not lead its recipients to do the only Jewish thing possible-*aliya*-but rather encourages them to persist in immoral and indefensible pursuits here, thereby negating all of the values of Judaism? More Doctors, more Accountants, more Scholars to sit in arrogance as they view the disintegration of their people?

No, No, No. A Jewish education should have taught us to live as Jew, to live in Israel.

Touro College has failed because the American-Jewish community has failed. Touro College would succeed if it were in Israel. Just like the rest of us.

I want to thank many people at Touro-My friends, and teachers, and the administration-so, take my thanks. I only want to single out one person for his concern, and care, and selflessness-Rabbi Feivel Wagner-for doing all he could.
