



As I complete my term of service as Dean, I look forward to further cooperation, probably on a more limited basis, with the College. I also venture to extrapolate my experience into the years to come. Touro College has managed to exist against all forms of discouragement. I trust that it will continue to exist and make even higher contributions to higher education.

Robert Goldschmidt Dean of Students

We live in an age of challenge and change. Traditional values and the value of a traditional liberal arts education are being questioned as never before. Critics never tire of repeating the quotation attributed to Mark Twain, "Man is only born ignorant. It takes four years to make him stupid." Most recently, Caroline Bird, in her book, *The Case Against College*, has sought to demonstrate that an investment in a college education is not costeffective — the financial worth of a B.A. has been diminishing gradually.

Another school argues for the survival of the university on purely utilitarian grounds. Daniel Bell, John Kenneth Galbraith and others who have written about the post-industrial society, stress the role of the university as a "knowledge factory," producing skilled technocrats who are rapidly becoming the new power elite. In this view, the worth of a college education is a function of the relevance of the curriculum — its emphasis on career education and vocational training.

The philosophy of the Touro curriculum incorporates a firm commitment both to a liberal arts education and preparation for career and professional education. We have refused to define education as simply the transmission of information and bits of data that must surely become obsolescent with the passing of time. Rather, we have sought to encourage the quest for intellectual growth by presenting to the student the tools and concepts that will enable him or her to make the search for knowledge a self-perpetuating and continuous process. We believe, as C. Wright Mills so aptly put it more than two decades ago, that "the aim of the college, for the individual student, is to eliminate the need in his life for the college; the task is to help him become a self-educating man."

Most of you have spent four years at Touro. You have shared with us the travail of growth. You have basked in the benefits of informality and profited from closeness to faculty that is possible only in an institution of small size. Despite our growth, what has remained immutable is our concern for the student as an individual and our belief in a pedagogic mode that abjures conformity and assembly style, depersonalized teaching methods.

Social scientists have long studied the cognitive and behavioral correlates and consequences of education. As you enter graduate and professional schools, and the job market, you will be exposed to new experiences and new vistas. You will carry with you what I deem to be the most important by-products of a Touro education: a set of age old values drawn from the rich heritage of Jewish tradition, a knowledge of your history and culture; a sense of civility and a passion for rational discourse.

Ultimately, the greatest resource of an educational institution is the quality of its student body. Our successes are due in no small measure to the dedication and devotion of the students to the institution that has nurtured their intellectual growth. At Touro we shall miss you.

Grandeur. It's a word that seems to apply not at all to Touro College. And yet, when one gets to the heart of the matter, it's a word which describes what Touro is all about. I am confident that we have the fortitude to build upon the foundation which we have laid. I am confident that future generations of students will have an opportunity to benefit from an educational process which has so enriched our lives.

The cycle is ended — our undergraduate careers are complete. In the words of Robert Frost we "have taken the road less traveled and that has made all the difference."

Years from now, when attempting to recall what Touro was all about I suppose many people will share somewhat common thoughts. 



Every Jew has a duty to make a reckoning about the life he is living, to see that all the roads he takes and follows should be in accord with a knowledge or awareness of the Lord — that his main work should be stamped with the seal of the Torah and the reverent fear of Heaven: with the purpose of giving his children an education to learn the Torah and cling firmly to it. With sixty seconds' worth of distance run, Yours is the Earth and everything that's in it,


