

22nd Commencement Spotlights Two Flatbush Honors Students


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

Eminent History Scholar In Residence At Flatbush



rofessor Monty Noam Penkower is an internationally recognized scholar of the modern Jewish experience. After completing his M.A.

FACULTY PROFILE and Ph.D. degrees at Columbia University, he taught at Bard College before joining

Touro College as an Associate Professor in 1974. In 1980, he became Professor of History, and in 1996, the Victor J. Selmanowitz Professor of Modern History in the Graduate School of Jewish Studies.

At Touro, Professor Penkower is chair of the history department and director of the social sci-

ences division. He teaches required survey and advanced history courses at the Flatbush Campus. "I have always emphasized to students the need for intellectual honesty, judicious expression, and the importance of expanding one's horizon," he says.

Professor Penkower is a prolific author on American and modern Jewish history. His extensive publications include: The Federal Writers' Project: A Study in Government Patronage of the Arts (1977); The Jews Were Expendable: Free World Diplomacy and
