The official statement from London that a war of at least three years is expected has a vital bearing on the American economy. From now on, business in the United States, which has been gradually moving ahead, propelled by domestic factors largely, can expect to feel an added impetus.

Stocking up by the individual, which can be adjudged foresight in normal times, becomes a form of selfishness when war appears on the horizon. Pushing up prices by corporations in peacetime under plea of increased costs may be defended, but the practice becomes suspect when guns begin to thunder. Already several governmental departments are studying reports of profiteering. Secretary Wallace seems undisturbed by present levels of commodity prices since he points out that they are not so high as prices received before the World War and in many cases in 1934, 1935, and 1936.

The people, through Congress, can be expected to demand the lopping off, by drastic taxation, of inflated profits arising out of war. AN ORDINANCE ADOPTED IN RESPONSE TO REQUESTS AND PETITIONS FROM CERTAIN CITIZENS OWNING PROPERTY ADJACENT TO THE CITY OF BENTON, MARSHALL COUNTY, KENTUCKY, ASKING THAT THEY AND THEIR PROPERTY BE ANNEXED TO AND INCLUDED WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BENTON AND FURTHERMORE PLEDGING THAT IF AND WHEN THAT IS DONE THEY WILL NOT FILE PROTEST AGAINST SAME, AND ANNEXING SAID TERRITORY TO BE DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: "Beginning at the north side

of the Benton-Mayfield Highway and following said Highway to a point on the South line of the property of Ray Klumb and including his property; thence running in West to the West Fork of Town Branch; thence following the Eastern side of said Branch with its meanderings to its junction with the main Town Branch; thence following Town Branch to a point running west with North Fifth Street when extended."

All the property included within this boundary line is now included within the corporate limits of the city of Benton and is a part of said city, subject to the laws and ordinances of said city and entitled to the protection of and advantages of said city.

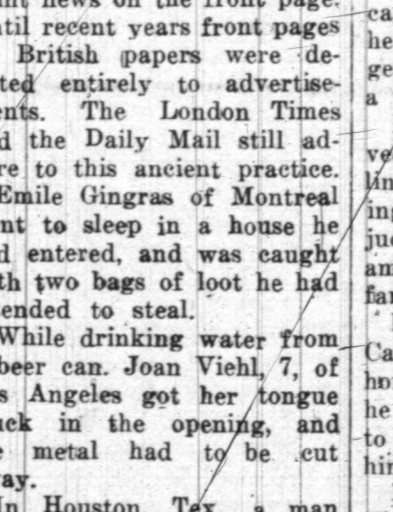

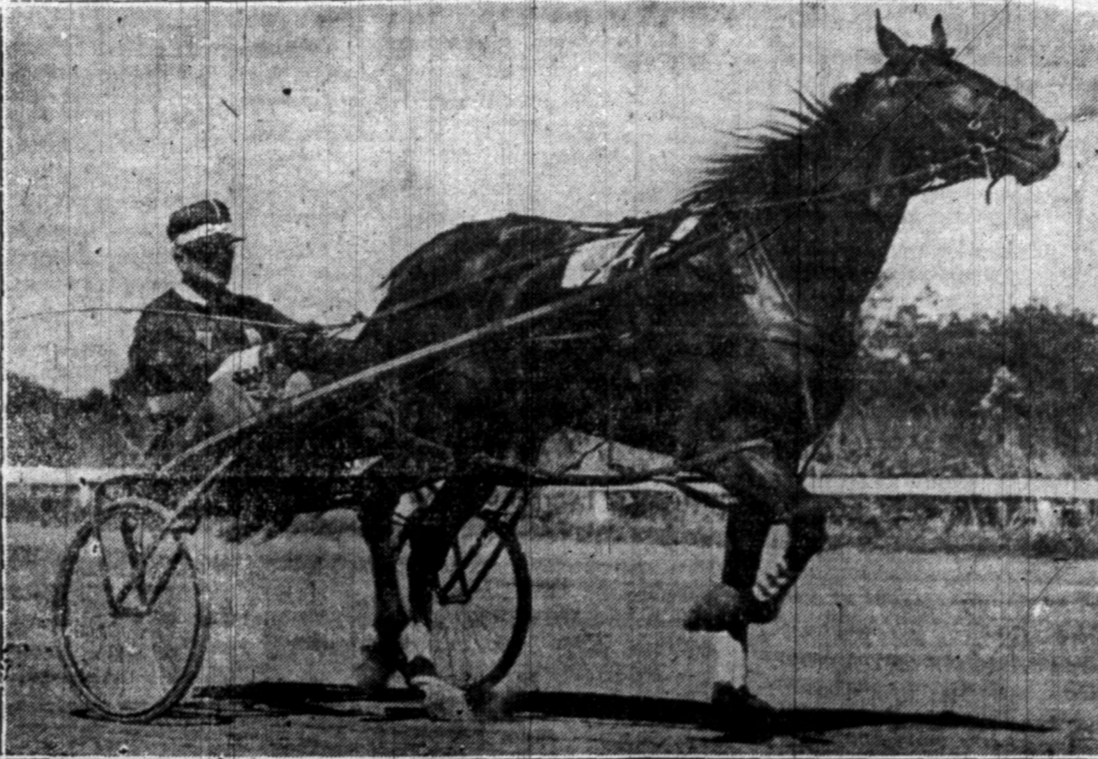

10,646 KENTUCKIANS ON U. S. PAYROLL

Washington, Sept. 18.—The Federal Government, with a total of 923,856 civil employes, has 10,646 on its payroll in Kentucky. The Civil Service Commission, making these figures public, emphasized they had no relation to the number of legal residents of the State employed by the Government, some of whom may hold jobs in other States, many of them among the 101,401 Federal employes in Washington. Kentucky's population of 2,920,000 was 2.01 per cent of the estimated national total of 144,985,000 in July, 1937. The Federal workers in the State constituted 1.15 per cent of the total Government employment.

The number of pedestrians killed by automobiles makes the problem one that each community should carefully consider. When we realize that over 40 per cent of the people killed by automobiles are pedestrians, we should readily appreciate that it is a real problem. The first thing the pedestrian should do is abandon the old idea that as a pedestrian he can use the streets in any way he pleases. This he can not do. Stresses Greater Use of Phosphate

A wider use of phosphate is one of the most important problems in the fertilizer field, according to a recent report of a committee of the land-grant agricultural colleges in the seven Tennessee Valley states. The report deals with the testing of concentrated phosphate fertilizers by thousands of farmers under the guidance of the agricultural extension services of the colleges. "Phosphates are increasingly necessary to grow cover plants to protect farm lands from erosion and to rebuild the fertility of older areas to profitable levels of crop production," says the report. Kentucky farmers last year

Received 50,000 tons of triple super phosphate from the Tennessee Valley Authority, in lieu of benefit payments in the Agricultural Conservation program, and so far this year have secured for nearly 50,000 tons of this high-test phosphate. Nearly half of a million acres in Kentucky were treated with phosphate last year.

GOV. CHANDLER SETS NOVEMBER 30 AS DATE FOR THANKSGIVING

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 18.—Gov. A. B. Chandler, declaring "it is unfortunate to foment a controversy over the date of Thanksgiving," today proclaimed it for November 30—seven days later than the date favored by President

Roosevelt. "Since the days of Abraham Lincoln," Chandler's proclamation read, "the last Thursday in November has been designated as Thanksgiving Day." He added "many plans have already been made that would seriously be disrupted by a change of date."
