

WHERE THE MOUNTAINS MEET THE PLAINS

The 2003 Annual Meeting will focus on the narrow band along the Front Range at the intersection of the lower montane and prairie ecosystems that includes the lower foothills, hogback and western edge of the prairie. This transition zone contains a mixture of mountain and prairie plant communities, including relict xeric tallgrass prairie and other uncommon communities. Rare plants and animal species, such as Preble's meadow jumping mouse and American currant, are found within this narrow band. Humans have heavily impacted this transition zone by suppressing fire and changing the characteristics of the forest, promoting weeds, and changing large portions of the prairie to urban landscaped lawns.

Field Trip Report Fifth Annual Weed Survey Backpack, 2002 Pat Butler

Once again last year, seven weedwackers representing the Native Plant Society, the Colorado Mountain Club, and the U.S. Forest Service backpacked into the Indian Peaks Wilderness Area along Middle St. Vrain Creek on August 24, 2002 to survey and pull several infestations of Canada Thistle (Brea arvensis, Asteraceae) that we had been tracking over the previous 4 years and one very high altitude population of yellow toadflax (Linaria vulgaris, Scrophulariaceae). We hiked five miles and set up camp west of the junction with the Red Deer Lake trail, observing on the way two of our native cirsiums (C. centaureae and C. eatonii) and a small population of tiny lanceleaf moonwort (Botrychium lanceolatum, Ophioglossaceae). On a leisurely hike to Lake Gibraltar, despite the drought, a number of late summer flowers were still blooming, including arctic and bottle gentian (Pneumonanthe affinis and Gentianodes algida, Gentianaceae) yellow monkey flower (Mimulus floriundus, Scrophulareacea), alpine avens (Acomastylis rossi, Rosaceae), and ground-pine (Lycopodium annotinum, Lycopodiaceae). Fading fast were Senecio triangularis and S. spartiodes (Asteraceae) and cow parsnip (Heracleum sphondylium, ssp montanum, Apiaceae). We pulled toadflax and Canada thistle on our way back to camp.

Sunday morning we hiked out, pulling thistle near our campsite and at the other locations down the trail and meeting up with tw other CoNPS members and two more CMC member. Perhaps du to the drought (but also, we hope, to our previous efforts), we observed that the infestations were not as populous as in past years. Unfortunately, we did find another small stand of thistle that we had not seen before, making a total of 7 we'll be working on in August, 2003.

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2003 Annual Meeting Agenda

Sunday, September 28, 2003

9:00 AM - 3:00 PM Meet at Cold Springs Park and Ride for field trips to Roxborough State Park or xeric tallgrass prairie near Boulder. Cold Springs is located at W. 4th Avenue and Union St in Lakewood (just south of the Sixth Avenue Freeway). To reach the meeting place, take West Sixth Avenue west from Denver toward Golden and exit at Simms/Union. Head south on Union (heading north you will be on Simms) two blocks to W. 4th Ave. Turn left (east) on 4th Ave and then into the Park and Ride parking lot.

DIRECTIONS:

To the Tivoli: The Tivoli is located off of Auraria Parkway in downtown Denver one block west of Speer Boulevard (one long block). To reach the Tivoli from I-25, exit at Auraria Parkway heading east. Make a right at Ninth Street. This will take you to the Tivoli parking lot. From Speer coming from either north or south, head west on Auraria Parkway and turn left at first stoplight (Ninth Street). From W. Colfax Ave, go north on Seventh St across the campus to Auraria Parkway. Make a right on Auraria Parkway and another right on Ninth Street.

To Denver Botanic Gardens from I-25:

Take the 6th Avenue East exit (Exit 209A). Go east on 6th Avenue to Josephine Street (about 2.75 miles). Take a left (north) onto Josephine Street, go 3-1/2 blocks. Take a left into Denver Botanic Gardens parking lot between 9th and 10th Streets. The entrance to Denver Botanic Gardens is at 1005 York Street.

To Denver Botanic Gardens from the hotels:

Take Speer Boulevard south to W. Colfax Ave. Take a left on Colfax. Go two miles. Make a right on York Stree DBG is ¹/₂ mile south of Colfax. 1005 York Street.

To Las Margaritas from Denver Botanic Garden:

Turn left on Josephine (east side of parking lot), then left on to Colfax Avenue. Go $\frac{1}{2}$ mile on Colfax, then make slight right on to Park Avenue. After $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, make sharp left on to Ogden Street, then left on to E 17th. Las Margaritas is at 1035 E 17th Ave.

LODGING: A block of rooms is being held until August 26 at the Budget Host in Denver, 1-800-BUD-HOST, \$44.99/night/2 double beds, 2747 Wyandot Street and until September 5 at the Residence Inn by Marriot, Denver Downtown, 1-800-331-3131, \$99/night (studio suite) or \$129/night (penthouse suite), 2777 Zuni St. The suites at the Residence Inn come with fully equipped kitchens, and the cost includes hot breakfast, hospitality hour M-F, and free shuttle service anywhere within 5 miles. If you stay at the Residence Inn, you will NOT NEED to buy a parking permit, as their shuttle can drop you off and pick you up at the Tivoli (and anywhere downtown) for free. See their website for suite details http://www.residenceinn.com/viewasuite.asp. Both hotels can be reached by taking the Speer NORTH exit off of I-25 and turning immediately to the right on Zuni Street. If you look elsewhere for rooms, keep in mind that most hotels downtown will charge you up to \$20+/night for parking. Parking is free at both these hotels.

CAMPING: Nearest camping is at Cherry Creek State Park, about 10 mi SE of downtown http://parks.state.co.us/ or call (800) 678-CAMP for reservations.


