

2007 ANNUAL MEETING

Botany Goes Buggy in Boulder

September 7th to 9th

The Colorado Native Plant Society will hold its annual symposium from Friday, September 7 to Sunday, September 9, 2007. This year's theme, "Botany Goes Buggy in Boulder," will highlight native plant conservation and plant-insect relationships through a variety of presentations. The schedule will follow the traditional format with warm-up events on Friday, speakers on Saturday, and field trips on Sunday.

CONPS members are invited to a social at the University of Colorado National History Museum on Friday night. Hor' dourves, wine, local beer, and soft drinks will be enjoyed in the dramatic Paleontology Hall. A botanical exhibit, "What's in a Name? Understanding the World of Plants," will also be open to explore the development of naming flowers, grasses and trees.

On Saturday, we will gather for presentations by local experts at the Eaton Humanities building at the University of Colorado. Dr. Deane Bowers, CU Professor and University Museum Curator of Entomology, will discuss "Eating and Being Eaten: Plant-Insect Interactions in the Colorado Front Range" in the keynote address. An additional six speakers will discuss more native plant and insect topics, including the interactions of *Monarda fistulosa* and specialist tortoise beetles, Front Range plant communities and butterflies, Colorado bark beetles and host trees, biological control insects and native plants, and more. Presentations will be followed by a visit to the CU Herbarium and a campus tree tour.

Sunday field trips will bring Saturday's presentations to life.

Mountain pine beetle infestation investigations and visits to south Boulder tallgrass prairie and Heil Valley Ranch will provide an opportunity to view native plants and insects in action. If hearty hikers have not had enough, a self-guided tour to area native gardens will also be offered.

Prior to the annual meeting, everyone is invited to attend the Rare Plant Technical Committee meeting. We will gather at the beautiful Butterfly Pavilion in Westminster to discuss G2 and G3 species of northeast Colorado on Friday. A slide show will include all species from 2004-2006. Attendees are encouraged to tour the pavilion's many exhibits (free of charge), including a tropical conservatory, moving giant insect sculptures, butterfly habitat gardens, and a native plant and insect nature trail. 

Local area gardens including Harlequin's Gardens, a commercial garden, on a self guided tour via map provided at meeting or at www.conps.org by mid-August.


