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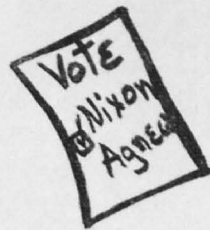

EDITORIAL

The difference between the campaigns of Richard Nixon and George McGovern is the difference between a campaign of rhetoric based on popular fears and misconceptions and a campaign which combines compassion with a realistic appraisal of problems and solutions to problems.

Nixon plays on the fear of crime in America but offers few solutions. He shallowly

attributes the rise of crime to permissive judges. So his solution is to appoint judges "against permissiveness in our country." Beyond that his only program is to "let peace officers know they have the backing of the President." McGovern on the other hand has a more far-reaching program which emphasizes criminal rehabilitation, gun control, and the initiation of more federal support for crime prevention.

Nixon proclaims his support for full employment while his economic advisors accept a high

unemployment rate in their plans. Nixon says he will rely on the private sector to take up the job slack--which it has so far been unable to do. McGovern's commitment to full employment goes beyond rhetoric. He has pledged public programs for jobs the private sector can't provide.

Nixon plays on popular misconception about welfare. He complains about the large number of lazy recipients. He proclaims a "work ethic" that most could find jobs if they wanted to. He encourages the opinion that welfare costs are one of the major reasons behind high taxes. Yet in reality only 1% of welfare recipients are able-bodied men (and where will they get jobs when Nixon's advisors accept high unemployment?). Also welfare programs only take 1.9% of the federal budget. Still Nixon prolongs the suffering of deserving recipients by letting his own Family Assistance Plan flounder so as not to destroy his "anti-welfare" image. McGovern has an equitable welfare program while backing his "work ethic" with a guarantee of jobs for the unemployed.

Nixon tries to arouse patriotic fervor by saying draft evaders "must pay a price for their choice" in deserting their country. He ignores the problem of real conscientious objectors among many of these evaders in search for political fodder to insure his re-election. McGovern proposes "a general amnesty for those who evaded the draft by either going to jail or going abroad because of conscientious objections" as has been done after every war America has been involved in. He has a respect for freedom of conscience as well as the principle of "malice towards none and charity for all."

Four more years of Nixon will be four more years of rhetoric, fear and devious politics. Only George McGovern can offer hope for a better America.

During these last two weeks of the campaign, the Perc has been literally invaded by posters, bumper stickers, and campaign buttons. This invasion of propaganda has been an attempt on the part of a few interested individuals, Carol Turner among them, to get the Marian community interested in the coming election. I sincerely hope it has done some good.

There are students, however, who either don't have the time or who simply don't care who have nonetheless become involved. To the detriment of all, there is a very small number of students who can get involved only by putting little witticisms on the abundant political posters. Some of these are amusing, no matter who you are for. Unfortunately some are quite vulgar. Since most of the vulgarity is seen on the Nixon posters, it must be assumed that the McGovernites are responsible for most of it. Fortunately, Carol Turner keeps a watchful eye out and removes posters which tend to be overly expressive. At least visitors to the campus are spared these rude inscriptions, written by people who are, in my estimation, very immature.

We have all heard the old saying "like father, like son." I would like to use this as the basis for the following observation: "A politicians' constituents reflect the candidate's attitudes and views on the issues at hand." If this is true, as it seems to be from observations of the political campaign both on and off campus, then the inference to McGovern is clear. Fioretti Budget Cut Proposal

Discussion at last Sunday's Student Board meeting was largely centered around a possible cut of the Fioretti budget which was originally by the Board at \$1400. Fioretti editors Ellen Dugan and Sherry Meyer were present to defend the present budget. They expressed concern about maintaining the quality of the Fioretti, as can be achieved in the printing, binding, and special techniques of a professional printer, and which necessitates a higher cost. Suggestions were made to reduce costs especially by using printing facilities available on campus. One viewpoint was that quality consists in the material printed, not in how it is printed. There seemed to be a consensus that the budget should be cut at least some amount. Finally a motion was made to cut the Fioretti budget to \$1100. However, being a money motion, it was tabled and it will be voted on at this Sunday's meeting, 7:30 in the Social Council Room.

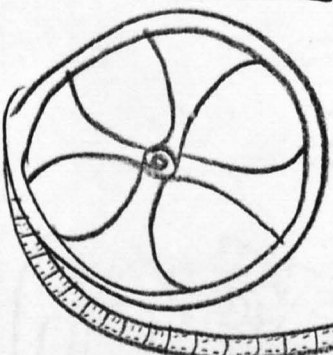
