Your letter of September 17 was received with joy and happiness. I am glad to hear that the Downtown congregation continues to grow. I pray that God will bless your efforts and that He will give you the special wisdom and physical strength and Biblical understanding that is needed for the great task you face. Please be assured of my continued prayers and interest in what you are doing there.

I talked at length on the telephone with Roosevelt Wells last week. He indicated great concern over a recent letter he had received from brother Gipson. Brother Wells did not understand an offer about which brother Gipson talked about "white brethren" buying property where the Sinkor church is. I am sure he has already communicated to you about it. If you have further information that will help put Roosevelt's mind at ease, or if you have recommendations either for or against this move, you might send it along to him in the next mail.

I don't want you to feel the necessity of answering my letters. I write to encourage you and to let you know of my love and esteem for you as a brother in Christ and a fellow laborer in the Gospel.
