It will serve the purpose of encouraging such preachers to keep up their own study and to keep abreast of the times and to maintain good habits of scholarship and research. Some 1962 graduates we hope will also be eligible for admission to this program.

In addition to the course on Restoration Biographies, taught by J. W. Roberts, and a course in Contemporary Religious Thought, taught by J. D. Thomas, the fellows in the program will be expected to audit at least one Bible text course and also to attend special lectuers which will be provided during the six-week period.

COOPERATION OF ELDERS

Summer Session Again Being Stressed * 1150 Students Sought for 1962 *

In this uncertain age of conflict between Christianity and materialism, it seems almost necessary that young people speed up their educational programs as much as possible.

Abilene Christian College is contributing to such a speedingup process by putting more emphasis on its summer session. Students already enrolled and also prospective freshmen are being urged to consider more seriously the advantages of summer study.

In the first place, summer school permits a students to earn college hours in a shorter length of time than during the long session, and by attending several summer sessions, a student often can obtain the bachelor's degree in three years rather than four, thus gaining a full year of fulltime earning power in his profession. Both these factors make summer study economically sound.


Another important reason for taking advantage of summer school is that Abilene Christian College has millions of dollars in buildings and equipment and a highly-qualified faculty which are not being used to their fullest during the summer months. In other words, if more students will atend ACC during the summer months, the college can actually accommodate more total students during a twelve-month period.

The College has experienced significant gains during the past few years in summer enrollment. Here are past figures and the goals for 1962:


