SOLDIER'S BOUNTY.

The States of New Hampshire and Massachusetts have given their soldiers, sailors and marines the sum of \$100 each. The State of Minnesota has allowed each soldier toward his education the sum of \$200. The State of North Dakota has allowed each of her loyal sons the sum of \$25 for each month of service with which to purchase a farm or go into business. The State of Oregon allows each of her defenders the sum of \$25 a month toward his education. The State of Wisconsin has given each of her fighting men \$10 a month for each month's service, but not less than \$50 in any event. The United States Government, according to Representative Emerson of India, "squandered millions on this war, paid the contractors all they asked, loaned money to Europe by the billions, and extended the time of the payment of interest; and squandered millions on ships and millions on flying machines." But we have not matched up with other progressive countries in appreciation of our soldiers. The Dominion of Canada, impoverished by the war, pays each private soldier from \$230 to \$600. France, who lost her sons

by the thousands, and had the enemy upon her soil for over three years pays her private soldiers from \$32.99 to \$235.33

On the face of the returns it is quite evident that the United States has lost a lot of its war enthusiasm.

STORY OF THE WEEK

SHOWING THE PROGRESS OF EVENTS IN OUR OWN AND FOREIGN LANDS.

WESTERN All public school teachers in Omaha will get an increase of \$400 each next fall, instead of \$300 previously agreed upon, by the Board of Education.

A demand for resubmission of the eighteenth amendment is made in a resolution adopted by the license committee of the Milwaukee common council. Coupled with the resolution is also a request for the repeal of the Volstead enforcement act.

David and John Goertzen, cousins of Henderson, Neb., are held at Fort Omaha as deserters. It is alleged they obtained permission to visit Canada in 1918, before being called in the draft, and didn't return until recently. They are members of a Mennonite colony.

Damage in California from incendiary fires and other forms of sabotage attributed to radicals and advocates of "direct action," was estimated at \$50,000,000 by S. J. Shannon, deputy United States marshal at Fresno, testifying at Los Angeles, at the trial of Nicholas Steinhilber, alleged Industrial Worker of the World.

As a result of charges made in Superior Court at Spokane by two prospective jurors in the case of James Stevens and Charles Butts, alleged Industrial Workers of the World, on trial there charged with criminal syndicalism, that efforts had been made to influence their opinions regarding the case, an entire special venire was dismissed and the case was continued.

The annual meeting of the National Education Association will be held at Salt Lake City July 4 to 10 and will be featured by extended discussions on the shortage of teachers and the necessity for the profession to unite for legislation to obtain wage increases. The council of state school superintendents will hold a two days' conference preceding the general meeting. All sessions will be held in the tabernacle of the Mormon church.

A skeleton, believed to be that of a mastodon, has been unearthed at Penawawa on the Snake river near Spokane, Wash. It is announced by the Rev. M. W. Fink of Penawawa. The gigantic bones were discovered by a road construction crew. The skull of the animal is reported to be two and a half feet between the eye sockets, the tusks to be eight inches in diameter at the base and the teeth four to five inches across. An effort will be made Wednesday to unearth the hindquarters of the skeleton.

WASHINGTON

The population of Hawaii is 249,992, the Census Bureau at Washington announced this week. This is an increase of 58,083, or 30.3 per cent as compared with 1910.

The Pacific and Atlantic fleets will meet off the Pacific coast of Panama next January in their first joint maneuvers, designed to keep the navy "on its toes" during peace time.

A peace-time army of 296,000 enlisted men and 17,800 officers has been approved by the House, in passing the army reorganization bill by a vote of 246 to 92. The measure now goes to the Senate.

Fuel oil bids opened by the Navy Department covered less than one-fifth of the 5,000,000 barrels asked for and prices quoted were more than 100 per cent above those in current contracts.

Living costs in February were six-tenths of 1 per cent less in January, according to figures made public by the Labor Department. The figures are based on reports from retail food dealers in fifty-one cities.

Wholesale cancellations of deportation warrants against Communists and anarchists have been ordered by the Department of Labor. More than 100 of the agitators arrested during the recent raids conducted by the Department of Justice have been turned loose during the last few days.

Decided decrease in exports is shown by the February-foreign-trade statement issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, exports for the month amounting to \$845,000,000, the smallest monthly total since October, 1919. Imports also decreased from \$474,000,000 in January to \$467,000,000. Imports of gold during February were unusually small, amounting to \$4,473,000 against exports of \$43,000,000.

Seeing in increased production a means of restoring normal business and price conditions, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, it was announced, will make its eighth annual meeting, to be held at Atlantic City, April 27 to 29, an "increased production convention."

Mexican federal troops have brought about the release of Peter W. Summers, American ranch owner, who was kidnaped and held for ransom by rebels in the vicinity of Salina Cruz, Mexico, according to advices reaching Washington.

FOREIGN

Japan has placed orders in France for 300 aeroplanes, it has been learned officially in Paris.

A sapphire eight inches long and weighing more than five pounds is reported to have been found at Mogok, India, by a Burmese. Its value is estimated at between \$175,000 and \$250,000.

American troops along the Rhine "are ready for any emergency" that may arise from the chaotic situation in Germany, Major General Allen, their commander, declared in an interview at Coblenz.

The movement recently launched in Tokio by university students for universal suffrage in Japan has spread to all parts of the country and to Korea and Manchuria as well, according to advices received.

An increase of \$103,026,832 in Canadian trade, both imports and exports, was made in the eleven months ending February 29 over the same period a year ago, according to statistics announced by the Customs Department.

Grand Duchess Olga, sister of the late Czar Nicholas of Russia, has been found by American Red Cross workers living in a boxcar near Novorossisk, south Russia, it was announced at the headquarters of the American Red Cross in Washington.

Evidence that an extremely close guard has been placed by the Dutch government over former Emperor William has been obtained. Police officers were detailed to follow him, a few steps in the rear, as he walked about the garden of the Bentinck castle.

An international conference on the exchange question will probably be held at Brussels in May, according to the Solr of that city. M. Hymans, Belgian foreign minister, has endorsed a suggestion to this effect, made by A. J. Balfour, president of the executive council of the League of Nations, the newspaper says.

There has been much feasting and other celebrating within the quarters of the former crown prince at Wieringen, Holland, since the news of the new developments in Germany began to reach Wieringen. William is reported to regard the situation joyfully, but is said to have assured the burgomaster that he will not attempt to leave Holland.

President Deschanel of France is advertising for a first-class chef. It has been revealed that the former famous cook at the Elysee palace was discharged by ex-Pres. Poincare because he was too expensive and was replaced by a second rate "maitre d'cuisine," who was able to prepare simple meals at a minimum cost. M. Deschanel, who, like his wife, is wealthy in his own right, purposes to spare no expense to make the palace menus the most exquisite in the land.

GENERAL

Declaring he had reason to believe that intoxicating liquors are being sold "openly and brazenly" to members of the Legislature, Maj. W. Calvin Wells, federal prohibition commissioner for Mississippi, appealed to the lawmakers as law-abiding citizens to reveal the source of their "supply."

Incomes of \$1,000,000 or more for 1919 were reported by 731 individuals and corporations in the Chicago district, officials of the Internal Revenue Department inspecting income tax returns announced. Thirty-one Chicagoans were added last year to the ranks of those whose incomes exceeded \$1,000,000.

Mrs. Margaret Carrere Reid was today granted an interlocutory decree of divorce from Daniel G. Reid, known as the "tinplate king" by Judge Finch in Supreme Court of New York. It was brought out during the brief hearing that Reid had made a financial settlement on Mrs. Reid of \$200,000 in cash and \$30,000 a year allowance.

The estate of Harris C. Fahnestock, banker, who died in June, 1914, is valued at \$17,775,667, according to an accounting filed in New York with Surrogate James A. Foley, by executors of the estate.

The Kentucky Senate passed the bill granting presidential suffrage to women in Kentucky, thereby opening the way for equal suffrage in the South. The House already has passed the measure.

A verdict of not guilty was returned by a jury in the Federal District Court at New York in the case of Jay A. Weber, secretary of the Pictorial Review Company, who was charged with attempting to bribe an agent of the Internal Revenue Department to falsify the income tax return of the corporation.

Antonio Lopez Gutierrez, brother of the president of Honduras, has been reappointed minister to the United States, the Honduran consulate has announced. Mr. Gutierrez was envoy at Washington during the Bertrand regime, but resigned when his brother headed the revolution which deposed that government.

Salaries of the teaching staff at Harvard will be advanced from 40 to 50 per cent Sept. 1. President Lowell announced to the faculty that the results of the Harvard endowment fund campaign had enabled the governing board of the university to draw up a new scale of salaries.

One man was shot and several others received minor injuries when a number of aliens held at Fort Wayne army post for deportation hearing attempted to overpower their guards. The arrival of military reinforcements restored order.

SING GLADNESS AND PRAISE

Carols Have a Distinct and Beautiful Meaning When Rendered at the Easter Time.

It seems as if the Easter-erthide was a particularly appropriate time for the carolling out of our joy. The spring has come, the birds are singing again after the long winter of ice and snow, and we mortals wake to joy again with them. Let us see how the people of ancient times observed Easter. "Carol," the word which we use in speaking of Easter music, means a song of praise, between a hymn and a ballad, a song which was used first to accompany a dance. One of the most beautiful of these old carols had its origin in the southwestern part of France, and is called "The Carol of the Flowers." It runs thus:

Come with us, sweet flowers, and worship Christ the Lord; Let your perfume hover round the Babe adored.

Modest violet, hiding in the grassy shade, Thou canst say how humble He is made.

Lily fair, low bending in the sun's warm light, Thou dost tell that He is pure as thou art white.

As thou, pansy, shinest forth in bright array, So doth He his majesty display.

As thou, rose, wide opening, do thy scent impart, So His love expanding, draws each sinful heart.

Easter time seemed especially the season that the ancient people were moved to compose folk songs, which were not written down as music is



written now, but which were sung from generation to generation of people. In this way they were kept alive, as surely as if they had been printed, or written on parchment, according to the custom in ancient days. These folk songs depicted scenes in the garden of Gethsemane where the Saviour walked, or of the women who went to the tomb hearing precious spices of their finding the empty tomb, of the white-robed angel, and of Mary, the virgin mother.

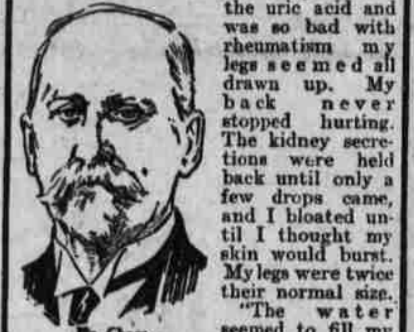

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

A new mail route is now in operation from Mountfahar to Manzano with some twenty mail boxes en route.

The Bank of Florence, at Florence, Ariz., was robbed recently. The message said a safe had been broken open and several hundred dollars stolen.

The Masonic temple at Albuquerque is to be remodeled and refinished, the lobby is to be enlarged and the club rooms made more commodious. Some \$10,000 will be spent.

The apportionment of \$148,376.44 among the counties of New Mexico for school purposes has been announced by the department of education. The apportionment was made on the basis of \$1.46 per capita. The school census is 120,658.

A rich vein of \$40 ore, chiefly silver, partly sticking out of the ground, has been discovered by Dr. M. M. Crocker on one of the Foster claims, recently leased by him, immediately south of the proved Bonney properties, near Lordsburg, N. M.

The state treasury of New Mexico, at the close of the quarter year ending on February 29, had a balance of \$2,100,000.29, according to Treasurer Charles U. Strong's report. At the same time last year the balance was \$1,408,042.73, showing an increase of \$834,047.56.

Fort Sumner, New Mexico, is making progress with the new dam. The secretary of the irrigation district turned over to the county treasurer 150 of its \$100 bonds and the drive for the sale of the bonds among local people has been very successful. It is desired to get the dam finished before high water.

The county supervisors at Nogales, Ariz., have authorized a reward of \$500 for the capture of Ezequiel Lara and unidentified companion, supposed to be Manuel Garcia, charged with the murder of Alexander and John Frasier and the robbery of the Frasier Brothers' store and postoffice at Montana Camp.

The Arizona congress of mothers, in convention at Phoenix, passed a resolution pledging its influence to stamp out what it termed as gambling at the state fair. While the resolution was so worded as to cover all alleged gambling devices at the state fair grounds members said it was aimed chiefly against betting on the races.

Albuquerqueans may continue to view their favorite screen stars Sunday afternoon and night. Recently the ministerial alliance started a move to close movie shows on Sunday. The matter was presented to the grand jury, which body reported to the court that there is no statute in New Mexico prohibiting Sunday movies.

A scientific club known as the Cooney Mipers' Club has been organized at the State School of Mines at Socorro, named in honor of the late Captain M. Cooney, who perished in a blizzard in the wilds of the Mogollons in 1914. Charles E. Williams was elected president. It will affiliate with the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers.

United States District Judge Dyer has dismissed the suit of the Standard Oil Company of California vs. Charles Howe and others on stipulation of counsel. It was a suit of the Standard Oil Company against the Arizona State Tax Commission with thousands of dollars of taxes contingent upon the outcome and it was announced the case had been settled out of court.

The Las Animas Peak Gold Mine Company is about to resume operations soon in Sierra county, N. M., install an electric plant and sink the main shaft 1,000 feet.

Mystery surrounds the death of James Daly, formerly a well known Nogales contractor, whose body was found badly crushed at the foot of a precipice near Magdalena de Jalisco. A piece of a mule's bridle was found in the dead man's hand but there was no trace of the animal. The Mexican authorities, after holding an autopsy and ordering a judicial investigation, had the body buried near where it was found.

The New Mexico state land office has just arranged to hold three sales of state land in Luna county at Deming on June 22, 1920. The first tract contains 240 acres and the improvements are valued at \$730; the second contains 5,500 acres and improvements as far as known; and the third tract contains 23,000 acres with improvements valued at \$2,975. The minimum price per acre of all three tracts is \$3.

Arizona is going into the farming business now, according to announcement at the governor's office, the farm idea being in connection with the needs of the inmates of the State Hospital for the Insane. The tentative plan for the farm calls for a ten-acre orchard in the hospital grounds and a cow-pasture. With the fruit bill for the hospital inmates amounting to \$12,000 a year, Governor Campbell believes that the inmates can maintain an orchard and hogs at no expense to the state while at the same time having pleasant outdoor occupations.

REDS CONTROL RUHR DISTRICT

REPORTS FROM DUISBURG SAY SOVIET GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED.

PUNISH KAPP LEADERS

PRESIDENT EBERT SAYS "SPARE THOSE WHO ACTED THROUGH IGNORANCE."

"Coblenz, March 22.—The Spartacus have gained control of the Ruhr district. The red army took possession of Duisburg, Ganhern, Mulheim and Mettmann, west of Elberfeld. A direct report from Duisburg says that a soviet government has been set up there. No private telephone conversations are permitted except for the procuring of food and coal.

The red army in the Ruhr districts is reported to have available a force estimated at 70,000 men, all of whom probably are armed. The situation is considered extremely critical because of the rapid growth of the red army and their mobility, which was displayed in the taking of Essen.

There are about 6,000 troops of General Von Watter's command in that vicinity, but of these 1,500 are said to have been forced to retire across the boundary into the broad area.

Stuttgart.—Regarding punishment of the Kapp leaders and the expectation by some that the state of siege would make necessary the execution of all the guilty, President Ebert declared today: "Those guilty shall feel the full weight of the law. All officers of responsible position and all leading civilians who joined willfully will be regarded as guilty, be charged with high treason and might be punished with penal servitude."

Regarding executions under martial law, Herr Ebert said: "The lawyers will determine. Perhaps some will be executed besides the confiscation of their property. We want to punish the leaders, but to spare those who were forced into the movement or acted through ignorance."

In the Cyclone Belt.

Newark, N. J.—Two gangs of "gun men" clashed in a restaurant here and when the smoke cleared away the leader of each faction was found dead and another man, said to have been a participant, was taken to a hospital in a serious condition. One of the victims was shot twelve times.

Bolsheviki Reach Kuban River.

London.—A Bolshevik communication received here says, "In the direction of Novorossisk we have reached the river Kuban and captured 6,000 prisoners and twenty guns. In the region of Ekaterinodar we have taken 1,500 prisoners and a large number of guns and much booty."

Precious Gems Stolen in Ohio.

Columbus, Ohio—More than 1,750 gems from the private collection of William C. Mills, curator of the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical society, were stolen from the society's museum at Ohio State university. It has been reported to the police. The most valuable gems stolen were five cameo rings, a number of garnets and moonstones, two skeletons, set with Siberian amethysts, a large tourmaline, and many fine cut topazes.

France Plants Trees on Yanks Graves.

Washington.—On the battlefields where American soldiers gave their lives when the call from humanity came, France is planting trees sent by the American Forestry Association. "In the years to come," said Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the association, "America will have the finest of all memorials on the battlefields where her sons answered the call of humanity—the living, growing trees of America."

Lansing Chairman of Inter-Church.

Washington—Robert Lansing has accepted honorary chairmanship of the National Inter-Church board, which has affected a strong alliance of more than a score of church denominational organizations to fight the "Red" menace. Franklin K. Lane, Atty. Gen., A. Mitchell Palmer and Secretary Wilson of the department of labor, have joined with Mr. Lansing in warmly commending the plans of the inter-church board as an important move to combat radicalism.

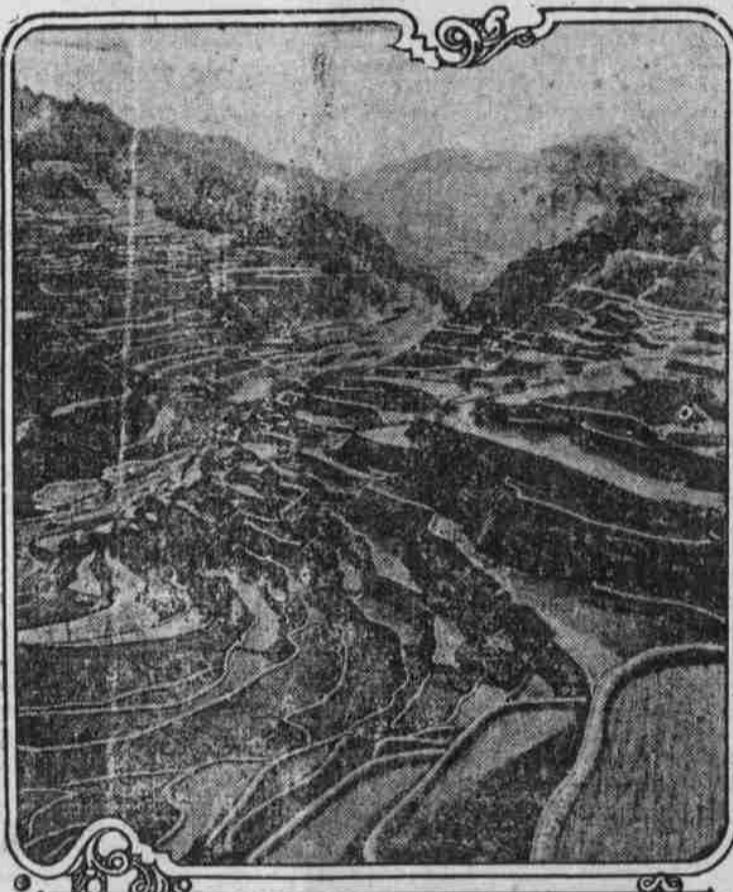

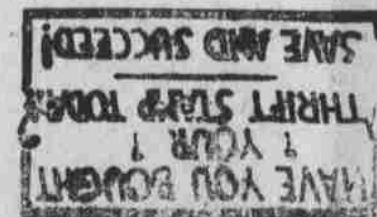

Rice Terraces Are World's Masterpieces



This is a photograph of the Ifugao Igorrot rice terraces, which are among
 the most remarkable of their kind in the world. They are one of the many
 marvelous sights for the tourist to see in the Philippine Islands and are to be
 found in the Ifugao district of the Mountain province, Northern Luzon.
 The height of these terraces, which are held up by stone walls, is from 4
 to 18 feet, averaging 8 feet high. It is estimated there are 12,121 miles of
 eight-foot stone walls in the Ifugao terraces, which is approximately half
 the distance around the world.
 These terraces are skillfully irrigated by water brought in troughs along
 the precipitous mountain sides over long distances.
