### FARMERS MUST PREPARE TO STORE GRAIN

Bumper crop prospects are especially good in western states. Another cause for rejoicing on the part of the farmer is the highly improved labor situation. From nearly all districts come reports of adequate farm labor for harvesting in the large crops with urgent demands for food stuffs.

A note of optimism adds to the joy of life for our great citizen, the American farmer. But it is only good common horse sense to look ahead and prepare for difficulties which may arise before the crop is marketed.

The only visible cloud on the horizon is the transportation situation. The railroads are deplorably in need of equipment. Further, congestion, due largely to strikes, past and present, not only of railroad employees, but of longshoremen, truck drivers, etc. has tied up large quantities of cars.

The car building companies of the country have an order for the railroads, 48,000 cars. Few of these will be delivered in time to help in the grain movement. There is a shortage of at least 250,000 cars.

Farmers must consider the temporary storage of grain. Because of the high cost of sacks and handling, the sacking of grain is rapidly being done away with.

Terminals, elevators, railroad equipment, etc. are equipped for bulk handling of grain. Progressive farmers either already have or are now preparing to handle their grain in bulk.

To aid the farmer in economically equipping himself with temporary bulk storage the bureau of markets of the U. S. government, has, after a detailed study of the farmer's needs, prepared plans for a temporary grain bin which may be built for various capacities.

These grain bins are moveable and so simple of construction that any farmer with ordinary tools on the farm can build one in a day without skilled help.

The material can be purchased at any retail lumber yard and can be paid for out of saving on sacks the first season.

The U. S. government bureau of markets or the nearest lumber yard will furnish plans free of charge, showing the construction of one of these bins. These cuts and accompanying explanations are so simple and explicit that it is not necessary for the builder to be able to read a blue print in order to construct his grain bin according to government plans.

### THE OUTLAW STRIKE

The outlaw strike is, without question, the most effective weapon, and so at this time the favorite weapon of "red" propaganda in the United States.

## NEWS TO DATE IN PARAGRAPHS

### CAUGHT FROM THE NETWORK OF WIRES ROUND ABOUT THE WORLD.

### DURING THE PAST WEEK

### RECORD OF IMPORTANT EVENTS CONDENSED FOR BUSY PEOPLE.

#### WESTERN

Albert W. Blancett, convicted of the murder of Clyde Armour, was hanged in the jail yard at Santa Fe. The crime was committed October 23, 1916.

Two well-dressed boys held up the bank of Waterloo, Neb., twenty miles west of Omaha, bound and gagged Cashier W. T. Stratton, robbed the bank of \$1,500 and escaped in an automobile.

Pure-bred cattle come high in Iowa. At a recent sale of forty-odd head of the Angus variety near Ottumwa, an average price of \$3,210 was paid for each animal. "Elluna E," a prize cow, brought \$10,000.

Fred Canafax, an escaped negro convict, was shot to death by a mob of whites near Centerville, Mo., yesterday. Canafax is alleged to have assaulted a daughter of Frank Simmons, a farmer residing near Ellington.

In a race riot in Denison, Texas, the outgrowth of a dispute between a negro and white boy, seven negroes were beaten and injured by mobs of 200 or more white men and boys. The trouble started over an argument at a baseball game. None was injured seriously.

Francis H. Cook, aged 79, publisher of the first newspaper in Spokane and owner of the first street car in that city, died there after a lingering illness. He was born in Marietta, Ohio and came to the Northwest in 1874. He left a widow and eleven grown children.

John Neff, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Porter J. Neff, fell out of a cherry tree at Medford, Ore., and was impaled upon the thinning shears which had dropped out of his hands, one blade driving into his chest and piercing his lung. He died an hour later.

A force of government hunters under direction of J. S. Ligon and including J. S. Lilly, noted lion hunter, has completed a three weeks' drive in the Black range in western New Mexico, whereby they bagged fourteen bear, five lions and two gray wolves. This catch is said to be the largest in several years.

Gertrude Kistler, 12-year-old daughter of Sedgwick Kistler of Lock Haven, Pa., a delegate to the Democratic national convention, was drowned in the Merced River at Yosemite, Calif., and H. J. Pink of Los Angeles, who went to her rescue, slipped on a rock as he entered the stream and fractured his skull, death resulting instantly.

#### WASHINGTON

Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, chief of the Bureau of Transportation in the War Department, has been designated by Secretary Baker to head the inland and coastwise waterways service, established under the new transportation act.

Guided entirely by radio compass signals, navy seaplane F-5-L left Norfolk and flew ninety-five miles on a "bee-line" to pick up the battleship Ohio at sea, with no knowledge at the time of taking the air of the vessel's location. The airplane then navigated its return to Norfolk entirely by radio compass.

Lord Abernethy, the newly appointed British ambassador to Germany, presented his credentials to President Ebert at Berlin. He declared that the "world crisis will be overcome only by general collaboration of which the basis is maintenance of firm, friendly alliances and strict execution of the peace treaty."

The United States must turn to the oil shales of Utah, Colorado, Wyoming and Nevada as sources of oil supply for the future, according to Martin J. Gavin, refinery engineer of the Bureau of Mines. "These states contain enormous deposits of oil shales which by proper treatment yield gas, oil, and also, if desired, ammonia, of value as a fertilizer," said Mr. Gavin.

The first settlement with a railroad company of all claims arising out of federal operation has been announced by the railroad administration, which has agreed to pay the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad \$1,600,000 in cash, the sum remaining after the balancing of the claims of the railway company against the government and of the government against the railroad company.

The federal trade commission has cited Montgomery, Ward & Co., Chicago mail order house, in a formal complaint of unfair competition in the sale of liquid roofing cement. The charge is made that false representations were made by the company in its catalog when liquid roofing cement was advertised as containing no coal tar. It is claimed it did contain coal tar.

Representative Dick L. Morgan of Woodward, Okla., died at Danville, Ill., from lobar pneumonia. He had represented the Eighth Oklahoma district in Congress for the last twelve years.

#### FOREIGN

Turks are beginning to re-evaluate the critical situation created by the triumphant Greek advance into Anatolia, and what they regard as a complete rupture of peace negotiations.

Keeping pace with the times, the London Daily Mail has installed its own wireless receiving plant for the receiving of news dispatches on the roof of Carmelite house, home of the Northcliffe papers.

Police Inspector Turner of Barcelona, Spain, was killed in a saber duel with Police Captain Toro, according to advice from that city. The quarrel arose over a question of service in the police force, it is said.

Dumb for three years as the result of shell shock, Trooper W. Hart suddenly recovered his speech in the excitement of a bowling match. He was playing with the Davisville military team at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont.

President Wilson has accepted the invitation of the League of Nations to call a meeting of the assembly of the league early in November. It was announced in the House of Commons in London by Cecil M. Harmsworth, undersecretary for foreign affairs.

The French Chamber of Deputies voted an additional 20,000 francs a year for cabinet ministers and 15,000 francs for secretaries of state, in recognition of the increased cost of living. The vote, which was taken by the raising of hands, was almost unanimous.

A dispatch to the Vossische Zeitung from Tilsit says that after fighting the Bolsheviks have broken through the Polish northern front and crossed the Beresina river at three points. The dispatch adds that panic has broken out in Vilna, from which the Polish occupation authorities have fled.

Marie Anne Boudé Gagnon, under sentence of death at Quebec for the murder by cruelty and neglect of her stepdaughter, Aurora, gave birth to twins, a boy and a girl in the jail infirmary. The father, Telephore Gagnon, is serving a life sentence in St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary for complicity in the murder of his daughter.

Fire has swept the entire fishing district on the western shore of the sea of Okhotsk, which was leased to Japan under the treaty of Portsmouth. The area burned includes the city of Okhotsk, according to a wireless report received by the Hokkaido Fisheries Company from the steamer Kamchatka. The financial loss is estimated at \$4,000,000.

#### GENERAL

The estate left by Ohio C. Barber, the late match manufacturer, was appraised at \$5,081,115, in an inventory filed in Common Pleas Court at Akron, Ohio.

Six dead and twenty-four injured is the toll in Chicago from accidents caused indirectly by Fourth of July celebrations. The accidents varied from automobile collisions to aeroplane mishaps. No fatalities are attributed by the police reports to fireworks.

A report just completed by the Phelps Dodge Mercantile Company at Tombstone, Ariz., showing purchases of agricultural products which it made in Arizona last year, proves that farming and ranching in that state are steadily becoming the rivals of mining and stockraising.

Newcomb Palmer, a young farmer of Mokena, Ill., is being held at Chicago, and Byron Caudwell, a former employe of Palmer, is in jail at Kankakee, Ill., charged with an attempt to extort \$40,000 from Lem Small, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of Illinois.

Sam Cardinella, alleged ringleader of a gang charged with the murder of Arthur P. Bowman, a Chicago saloonkeeper, has been sentenced to hang. Three other members of the band already have been sentenced to death and a fourth found guilty and awaiting sentence.

The Big Four Railroad Company suffered a loss estimated at between \$100,000 and \$200,000 at Elkhart, Ind., when fourteen freight cars piled up on a curve. The cars contained coal and merchandise. No one was injured.

In a pistol duel at Spartansburg, S. C., William P. Cooper, a blacksmith, and Oscar Godfrey, a horse trader, killed each other. Each man emptied the six chambers of his weapon and when the police arrived Cooper was dead and Godfrey, though dying, was still snapping his empty gun at the body of the dead man.

Georges Carpentier, the French champion, has returned to New York to make preparations for sailing home. Jack Curley, who has been in charge of Carpentier's tour, announced that Carpentier will positively return to America to fulfill his agreement to meet Battling Levinsky. The match has been set forward to Oct. 30. Curley added that he has received word that Jack Dempsey and his manager, Jack Kennan, would be in New York shortly. "And it looks very much as if articles will be signed and sealed for a Dempsey-Carpentier match before George sails," Curley concluded.

In a collision between three cars on the Lackawanna & Wyoming Valley railroad, near South Plinston station, eighteen persons are reported killed and 100 injured. The accident occurred when lightning struck a telegraph pole along the line of the track and the pole fell over on the tracks in front of a car bound for Scranton.

Provisional President de la Huerta of Mexico, has abolished the moving picture censorship and the censorship department of the ministry of the interior will hereafter be used "to foster rather than hinder the industry."

## BUSINESS CONDITIONS IMPROVE

### CREDIT SITUATION SECOND HALF OF YEAR IS STILL UNDER STRAIN.

### CAR SUPPLY BIG FACTOR

### BANKERS WORKING TO PREVENT CRISIS IN AUTUMN; BUYERS WARY.

New York, July 12.—The turn into the second half of the year has been accomplished by some cheering events for business and finance, although many difficulties, long present, have not been lessened. The general credit situation remains in a state of strain, and it is certain that throughout the summer bankers will act with a single eye to the prevention of a really acute position in the autumn.

The very fact that the loan market of all varieties of accommodation will be guided conservatively speaks for the avoidance of some tension in the crop moving period, and the hope is expressed in banking quarters that the taking of time by the forelock may avoid so extreme a burden upon credit as was feared a month ago.

Knowledge that the underlying situation of credit had not been altered at all by the satisfactory completion of the midyear settlement seemed last week to warn the speculative following of stocks that surface conditions should not be trusted too far.

Sentiment favoring a relatively easy money situation was not sufficiently strong to lull the lurking idea that there might be numerous occasions during the summer when a quick "run up" of the call rate would be embarrassing to persons carrying long lines of stocks.

The business and industrial outlook is decidedly mixed, considering the major lines of production and distribution. Commodity prices, as a whole, declined in June, as compared with the May level, but the movement was highly irregular. Textiles, breadstuffs, live stock, hides and leather declined, while coal, coke, building materials and chemicals, together with important provisions which play a vital part in the cost of living.

To a degree recessions of activity in some directions are offset by a heavy demand in others, which tends to confuse the outlook. Thus, the evidence supplied by closing textile mills tells of a depression in this field far more important than seasonal slackening would bring about, while at the same time the consumption of articles used in construction work, steel, cement, lumber, etc., is overtaking the producers.

A survey of current conditions require allowance by reason of persistent railroad congestion. Pig iron production in June was at a rate of 5,000 tons per day in excess of the May output, which indicates active operations of steel plants, but lack of adequate transportation facilities is causing a great amount of finished material, and iron as well, to be piled in mill yards until it can be moved.

Whether or not July reinvestment funds, derived from interest and dividend payments, is the main factor in the market just now, the demand for investments has been substantially more active this month than last. The Swiss government loan of \$25,000,000 and the offering of \$80,000,000 Armour & Co. bonds last week were quickly taken up, and the success of the undertakings foreshadows more in the near future.


It is expected that the requirements under which railroads may obtain permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission to float loans will shortly be clarified, for several of the leading companies have new borrowings under consideration.

Protests Innocence on Gallows. Santa Fe, N. M.—Elbert W. Blancett, convicted of the murder of Clyde D. Armour, went to his death calmly and still protesting his innocence. The gallows trap was sprung, Blancett's neck was not broken by the fall. He was unconscious immediately and pronounced dead in ten minutes. Blancett was convicted of the murder of Armour, Oct. 23, 1916, while the two were on a motor trip in Armour's car from Denver to the Pacific coast.

Negro Clears Innocent Man. Dallas, Texas.—Green Hunter, alias James Brown, negro, who was legally hanged here for attacking a white woman at Hale station, Friday, May 28, confessed and admitted that he was guilty of another attack on a young white girl for which Ben Perry, negro, is serving the eighth year of a life term imprisonment sentence.

### Offer Poles Protection.

Spa, Belgium.—If the Poles consent to retire within the natural frontiers of Poland, the allies will give them all possible assistance in the event of their being attacked by the Bolsheviks. This announcement was made here. The allies have sent a proposal to the Russian government for an armistice with Poland on condition that the Poles retire within their natural Polish frontier and that, if the Bolsheviks attack the Poles within these frontiers the allies will come to Poland's aid.

Youngsters Have Thrilling Experience in Row Boat on Lake Erie.

BOY OF 9 IS HERO

Prayers of Male Passengers Mingle With Sobs of Women as Steamer Picks Tots Up 30 Miles From Shore.

Detroit, Mich.—With the prayers of 1,500 male passengers mingled with the sobs of hysterical women, four children who had been adrift in a small row boat for more than twenty-five hours in Lake Erie were rescued by the steamer City of Toledo 30 miles from shore.

The children drifted from Lakeside, Mich., at 9 o'clock Saturday morning, and while they were far from land two of them who got out of the boat were rescued by 9-year-old Merwin Daso, one of the party.

The children are: Robert, aged 3; Richard, 6, and Merwin, 9, sons of Merwin Daso of Toledo, and Violet Sperry, their first cousin, 11 years old.

Tells of Experience.

Squatting on the second deck of the steamer, the hero of the adventure told the passengers just how it happened. They started out from Lakeside with a broken oar and two sticks, intending to push themselves along the shallow shore. Soon they were a long way out, he told the passengers, and with a wind blowing they could not get the boat headed back for Lakeside.

Late in the afternoon Violet conceived the bright idea to get out and push the boat.

She could not touch the bottom, of course, and Merwin was afraid she was going to drown. He finally succeeded in pulling her back into the boat.

Saturday night "Boh" got into trouble. He insisted in prowling about the flat bottomed craft and fell overboard. Merwin at once plunged into the lake and keeping one hand on the boat caught Bob by his rompers and pulled him back in.

Merwin Takes Command.

As it began to get dark they all became frightened, but Merwin decided to take "command," and ordered the others to go to sleep, telling them he would wake them up after he had "done the watch."

During the night "Dick," Violet and little Bob took turns at watching for ships.

With the rising of the sun Sunday Merwin decided to take off his under

Their cries for help were unheard by passing motorists on the Long Beach-Seal Beach road, 500 yards distant, and it was only when Howard and Stephen Henderson, fishermen, saw the overturned canoe and heard faint shouts that rescue came.

SOLD TWO PINTS, HIT HARD

Virginia Judge "Makes Example" of Business Man, Fining Him \$3,000.

Danville, Va.—Recorder P. J. Haizlip of Spray found himself a prominent man after fining J. S. Martin, a business man of that township, just across the Virginia line, \$3,000 for selling two pints of liquor a few days ago.

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

All mining claimants in Arizona who expect to make application for surveys and patents this year with a view of obtaining final receipt before the end of the year and avoiding annual assessment work should make application to the surveyor general without delay.

At a regular meeting of the Tucumcari, N. M., Chamber of Commerce, Mr. McGee suggested that a bonus be given to the first oil company bringing in a well in Quay county or within thirty miles of the city. No final action was taken but it is believed the bonus will be raised.

A civic organization at Albuquerque has started a movement to change the name of the state of New Mexico. A resolution was passed saying that in view of the turbulent conditions in Mexico and association of names, the Legislature be asked to rename the state. No name was recommended in the resolution.

Federal aid for Arizona, and there is no possibility that any money originally allotted to that state will be withdrawn because of failure to match the funds. This is the import of a wire received by the State Highway Department from Assistant State Engineer F. M. Holmquist.

Indications are that mining operations will be resumed at Tyrone camp in New Mexico, about August 1. The new Marcey mills have been received and are being installed and there is more machinery in transit so it is expected that another month will put the big concentrator in working order.

W. C. Churchill of Hazelton, Pa., was found dead in his berth on a special train of Shriners of Rajah temple of Reading when it arrived at Albuquerque. His death was said to be due to heart disease. The train made a stop of two hours while brief services were held and the body prepared for shipment to Hazelton.

The Universal garage of Portales, N. M., has established a free camping ground for tourists which when completed will be one of the best in that section of the state. The ground is located in the rear of the garage and will be equipped with free water and lights and all the expenses will be paid by the garage people.

Nearly all the equipment for building the road from Lovington to Carlsbad, N. M., has arrived and work will be started soon. Several large trucks will be used in the work and a power grader has also been shipped and will arrive in a few days. Part of this road has already been graded by the Lea County Construction Company.

Fulfilling every confident expectation of the members of the county highway commission, the board of supervisors, Judge Rush in Federal court in Chicago has ruled against all those attempting to block the highway building program in Maricopa county, Ariz., by denying the application for a temporary injunction to prevent the delivery of any more of the \$4,000,000 issue of highway bonds to the purchasers, and dismissed the case.

The big motor convoy which is making a transcontinental run from Washington to San Francisco under the auspices of the War Department will pass through Silver City on its way across New Mexico. The total personnel besides the big trucks is twenty officers and 100 men. The trip will be made at the rate of forty-five miles per day and barring accidents should arrive in Silver City about the 25th of August.

The Western Trading and Elevator Company has purchased a site and will let the contract soon for its new elevator building at Clovis, N. M.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, in a statement at Nogales, Ariz., regarding reports of revolts in parts of Mexico against the de facto government, said the revolting generals are former Carranza adherents who fear punishment by the present government on graft charges. The revolts, the general said, are confined to two or three local sections and are regarded as a bluff, preceding flight of the revolting parties to the mountains as fugitives from justice.

The long-talked-of and much-to-be-dreaded highway through the Black Range, one of New Mexico's most beautiful scenic routes, is now an assured fact to the boards of commissioners, both of Sierra and Grant counties, have made special tax levies, in accordance with an act of the State Legislature, to raise the necessary funds with which to build the road. This highway will open up a new link in an east and west transcontinental highway between the Elephant Butte dam in New Mexico and the Roosevelt dam in Arizona.

A resolution calling on President Wilson to place an embargo on further importations of beef, mutton and wool for the rest of this year, or until such time as is necessary to stabilize home markets was adopted at the joint convention of the Arizona Cattle Growers' Association and the Arizona Wool Growers' Association at Flagstaff, Ariz.

Forest fires, which broke out in five different sections near Nogales, Ariz., caused the thermometer to climb to 117 degrees in the shade, the highest mark ever recorded at Nogales.


