Arizona. Fine ore has been found on the 565 foot level of the United Eastern mine in the Outman district.

A number of men are at work on the old Moss mine, in Silver Creek, for the Gold Roads Mines Company.

The Ivanhoe mine, in the Silver Creek section, north of the Tom Reed, has struck a splendid body of ore at a depth of 100 feet.

A. B. Rogers of Aspen, Colo., has taken over the group of mines owned by J. Harrison and A. E. McDugall, contiguous to the Boulevard mine, in the Union Pass section.

One of the richest discoveries of tellurium ever made in the state is reported from the Enterprise group of mines, eighteen miles east of Kingman, at the north end of the Wallapa mountains. Samples taken to Kingman ran from \$1,000 to \$5,000 in gold and far into the hundreds of dollars in silver.

New Mexico. The Socorro Mines Company, operating at Mogollon, has declared a dividend of \$50,000.

The Gallup Coal & Clay Company of Albuquerque, which will operate in the Gallup section, filed articles of incorporation. The capital is \$25,000, and the amount paid in \$5,200.

Reports from Hland mining camp, west of Santa Fé, say that nearly 150 men are now employed at the mine and plant of the Coassack Mining Company alone and that the old time activity and prosperity of this famous camp is fast returning.

Wyoming. Valuable oil lands near Basin have been reopened by the government.

It would be a hard thing for the shares in the Bitter Creek Coal Mining Company to go below par. This company filed articles of incorporation in the office of the secretary of state with a capital stock of \$5,000, with 500,000 shares selling at one cent each.

County Assessor Streed of Wheatland reports that the tax schedule turned in by the Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. shows a reduction of about 30 per cent in the production of the Sunnys mines for the past year. This reduces the assessable valuation of that property \$220,000.

Colorado. Cripple Creek adds daily to the list of leasers who are shipping ore.

Breckenridge reports a new strike of lead ore, carrying both gold and silver, made in the Germania mine, on Little Mountain.

Boulder tungsten companies have announced a schedule according to which they will pay \$10 per unit for 60 per cent ore.

At Ouray Edward Canavan has been awarded a contract to drive not less than 100 feet on the Legal Tender property, about two miles south of the city.

H. H. Kaeser and John Loos, leasing on the twelfth level of the Granito mine, in Cripple Creek, have one of the most promising blocks of ground on the mine.

At Idaho Springs the management of the Bride Company states that the new compressor plant recently ordered shipped to the mines is now being installed and will soon be ready for operation.

The stockholders of the Wellington Mines Company were pleased to receive their seventh dividend early in June instead of in July. The total dividend amounted to \$50,000.

It is an exceptional day in the Cripple Creek district when some "long idle" property—largely the result of indifferent mining—is not restored to the actual list, either on company account or by groups of leasers.

The Rilla Gold Mining Company, which is developing a group of twelve lode claims on North Star mountain, nine miles south of Breckenridge, has completed a mile of new road connecting the mine with the county road.

Bateman and Hansen, leasing on the 400-foot level of the Specimen, have uncovered an unusually rich streak of smelting ore. The values appear to be a six-inch streak of free and assays show from 25 to 150 ounces gold a ton.

In the Georgetown, Silver Plume, Lawson and Daly districts, Clear Creek county, the high prices for lead and zinc have favorably affected mining and claims that have lain idle for years are now receiving attention.

The Saratoga mine ore, East Argentine district, gives satisfactory returns at the smelters and the lessees are making from \$150 to \$300 to the man per month. The streak is large and is worth more than \$100 per ton in the various metals.

Carnduff and Duncan, operating on the eighth level of the Dead Pine mine, on Battle mountain, Cripple Creek, have uncovered a body of ore that is eight inches wide, assays showing values varying from two to eight ounces gold to the ton.

The Primos mill at Lakewood, the Wolf Tongue at Nederland, the plant of the Colorado Tungsten Production Company at Carriestown park, and the Boulder mill under the management of H. J. Holmes, are all in operation. Eugene Stevens, manager of the Rogers tract, the oldest and biggest producer of tungsten in Boulder county, is pushing work in the property and has a number of lease operators in the workings.

New London went wild with excitement when the news of the battle of Lexington reached there.

Bands of patriots paraded the streets. Guns were fired and speeches made. A meeting was called at once to determine what that child should do in the war.

Every man of prominence spoke and then the young schoolteacher was called to the platform.

What words he said that day have been lost to posterity, but we do know they must have been the most stirring of the occasion, for immediately after he left the platform men began marching forward to enlist.

One sentence of Nathan Hale's that day has been preserved and it is worthy to rank with the greatest sayings of our nation.

"Let us march immediately and never lay down our arms until we have obtained independence," he said.

That is all the more remarkable when one remembers that it was more than a year later before independence was talked of in the continental congress and it was two years before the Declaration of Independence was adopted.

Nathan Hale enrolled as a lieutenant in the regiment of Col. Charles Webb. His studious habits stood him in good stead, and soon he was one of

the best officers in the regiment. He went with his company to Boston and during the siege of that city by the army under General Washington the twenty-year-old boy was promoted to be a captain for bravery and efficiency.

When the British evacuated Boston and sailed for New York a greater part of the American army went down that way. Captain Hale and his regiment were among them. They took part in all the hardships of that campaign.

Late in the summer of 1776, when the British had driven the American army from Long Island, General Washington was particularly anxious to establish some sort of secret information line into New York. He tried many plans without success.

Finally he summoned his officers to a council and told them to be on the lookout for some bright, courageous man who would undertake the dangerous task. He spoke, among others, to Colonel Knowlton of Knowlton's Rangers, the regiment to which Captain Hale was attached.

Colonel Knowlton conferred with his officers. When he put the proposition to them every cheek paled. If the messenger should be caught they all knew he would be hanged as a spy. The word spy is a horrible one to an honorable man. No one volunteered to risk a death of shame.

For a few moments there was a hush in the room. Then Captain Hale walked in and said: "I will undertake it, sir."

Captain Hale had been sick in bed for some time, and his fellow officers crowded about him seeking to dissuade him from his purpose.

Among them Capt. William Hull, a classmate of Hale's at Yale, spoke the longest. But the youthful captain could not be shaken from his purpose.

"Gentlemen," he said, "I owe my country the accomplishment of an object so important and so much desired by the commander of our armies. I know of no mode of obtaining the information but by assuming a disguise and passing into the enemy's camp. I am fully aware of the consequences of discovery and capture in such a situation. I wish to be useful, and every kind of service for the public good becomes honorable by being necessary."

In such manner did Captain Hale turn spy. That night he left the camp at Harlem Heights dressed in the brown garments and broad brimmed hat of a schoolteacher. He was accompanied a short distance by Sergeant Hempstead and his faithful servant, Ansel Wright, who arranged to have a boat ready for Captain Hale for his return, September 21.</

### ABOUT THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Albuquerque, N. M., June 28.—The last legislature made increased appropriation for the New Mexico state university just in time to meet an imperative demand for room in dormitories and college buildings by a rapid growth in the student population. The usual preliminary announcement of enrollment for the college year of 1915-1916, made today by the university authorities shows that seventy-seven percent of last year's students will return to college when it opens August 16th; and that the total enrollment shows an increase over the same period last year of 31 percent. This increase includes only students whose attendance is certain and none of those whose attendance or passage of the entrance requirements is in question. It is predicted that the year's actual enrollment will

show a fifty percent increase and it is indicated that this big gain is but the beginning of the first large period of growth. The university authorities are especially gratified that the increase comes almost entirely from this year's New Mexico high school graduates; indicating an advancement in interest in higher education in the state and appreciation of the fine equipment and advantages offered by the home state university.

One of the advertisements in this issue of the News-Herald is of interest as news to every young man and young woman, and to the parents of this community. It is the advertisement of the New Mexico State University at Albuquerque, announcing the opening of the college year on August 17th. The advertisement shows that living at the University is probably cheaper than at any other state university, and at the same time is substantial and comfortable; while the standards of education are in every way satisfactory. A New Mexico boy or girl may take the first three years of college work in the university and then, if desired, can enter the senior class of Columbia University of Chicago or other great universities, without examination, the credits of our university being accepted as equal to their own. It is the highest possible guarantee of the character of work our university is doing.

Mr. Rainer, whose receipt of a coal oil traction engine some time ago was mentioned in these columns, had trouble with the varmint. It was coaxed out of town about a mile, but proving obstreperous was left to rest by the roadside. Last Friday Mr. Knox of Dalhart, an expert employe of the company that manufactures the engines, came, and after a few minutes work diagnosed the trouble and set the thing going beautifully. It was taken to Mr. Rainer's place and hitched to the pump, where it made the water fly. Mr. Rainer has planted beans and has his ground in a high state of cultivation and free of weeds. Now that he can put water on it, no doubt he will succeed in producing a record breaking crop.

There was a pretty good rain in a limited area about ten miles northeast of town last Saturday, but aside from this, as far as we have heard no rain of consequence has fallen in the county during the past week. For the most part crops are reported still doing well. A few fields of beans have been badly damaged by flea beetles, but these insects do not seem to be spread over much territory.

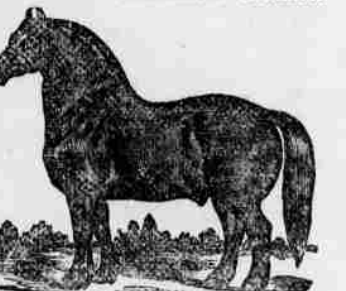
