PUBLIC LANDS TO STATE

FOR BENEFIT OF HIGHWAYS AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

Plan Proposed by State Land Commissioner Ervien for Disposition of Remaining Public Lands in West.

Santa Fé, N. M.—The campaign re-cently launched by State Land Commissioner R. P. Ervien, has gained a great deal of attention throughout the entire west. Mr. Ervien's proposition is that all of the remaining public lands in the west, which is not re served or otherwise appropriated, be turned over to the state in which it is located for the benefits of her public schools, or other educational insti-

tutions, highways, etc. He shows that the government does not secure enough from its administration of public lands to cover expenses of handling same when the ex penditures in the interior, agricultural and Treasury Departments are all

taken into consideration. On the other hand the western states have handled their lands in such a way as to derive large benefits from them for the public schools and other purpose for which they were granted, besides transferring a large part of them to private owner ship by which they have become taxable and help support the govern-ment of the states, counties and school districts in which they are located, while the government lands, exempt from taxation, are of no benefit to the munity in which they are situ-

The very large percentage of the poorer people of the western states, who would be benefited by the additional school money and taxable property, which would be a distinct relief to them, are interested in this campaign as well as the smaller stock men, who would have an opportunity of securing a small foothold on lands which are now monopolized and pastured in large tracts by the owners of large herds, who use the land for nothing and force the small owner out by entirely surrounding him and exhausting the range in his locality, which under the government laws, he is unable to fence or otherwise pro

Killing Result of Quarrel.

Silver City.-H. B. Johnson, a ranchman, was given a preliminary hearing at Hurley for the killing of Job Sayre, near Central. The men were neighbors and engaged in a quarrel in which Johnson shot and fatally wounded Sayre, who died on the way to the hospital. Johnson gave himself up at once, alleging self-defense.

Good Season for Angoras.

Silver City.-The kiding season for Angora goats is over and breeders report an increase in their herds, which is well above the average owing chiefly to the large amount of rainfall during the fall and winter and the conse-quent heavy growth of feed this spring. The high price of mohair makes the favorable season particular ly fortunate.

coal in New Mexico in 1914 was 3.-877,689 short tons, valued at \$6,220,-571. This was the greatest coal output in the history of the state, ac cording to C. E. Nathan Hale a Synonym for the Highest Patriotism.

How Youthful Martyr to the Cause of Liberty Met Death With Fortitude That Can Never Be Forgotten.

When the farmers of Lexington fired he shots that brought on the war of American Inde

pendence that April day in 1775, a pale, slim boy, not yet twenty years old, destined to become a martyr to our freedom, laid down his badge of office as a schoolteacher at New London, Conn., and took up

New London went wild with excitement when the news of the battle of Lexington reached there. Bands of patriots paraded the streets. Guns were fired and speeches made. A meeting was called at once to determine what that city should do in the war. Every man of prominence spoke and then the young schoolteacher was called to the platform. What words he said that day have been lost to posterity, but we do know they must have been the most stirring of the occasion, for immediately after he left the platform men began marching forward to enlist. One sentence of Nathan Hale's that day has been preserved and it is worthy to rank with the greatest say-

"Let us march immediately and never lay down our arms until we have obtained independence," he said.

Nathan Hale had no trouble in penetrating the British lines. He went to New York and over to Brooklyn, carefully collecting information about the number of British soldiers, their cannon, ammunition, other supplies and fortifications, in Latin, and concealed it in a hollowed out place in one of his

boot beels.
September 19 he began his return. He spent the night at a farm house near the place where the boat was to wait for him. The next morning he went to breakfast at a little wayside inn, "The Cedars," kept by a widow named Chichester. During his meal a man entered and stared at him. Captain Hale paid little attention, as he

thought he was safe by now. As soon as the meal was finished he hurried off to the rendezvous. It was a misty morning. As Hale approached the beach he saw a boat pulling in. Glad almost beyond belief to be rid of his dangerous task he hurried down to meet it. Too late he realized that instead of Sergeant Hempstead and Ansel Wright the boat was filled with British marines. He turned to run, but the marines caught him.

"What are you doing out so early?" a marine demanded. "Isn't it proper for a schoolteacher to get a breath of fresh air?" Hale asked in reply.

"Why did you run?"

"I thought you were rebels." The marines would not believe Hale's assertions of innocence and began to search him. They looked everywhere without success. One pulled off his boots and reached inside. Nothing suspicious had been found and the marines reluctantly were prepar-ing to turn him loose when one of them, with an oath, threw the boot he held at a tree. That tore away the strip that covered the secret hiding place and the papers fell out,


