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COUNTY AGENT IS RETAINED

On last Friday the board of county commissioners held a the month of January as follows: meeting to consider the matter of Warranty Deedsmaking an appropriation for the support of the county agent.

Petitions in favor of retention of the county agent signed by five or six hundred taxpayers of the county were filed with the board.

Pledges of money by private taxpayers toward the support of the agent aggregating nearly \$900 had been secured and was presented to the board.

Members of the citizens' comlook after the matter, and a considerable number of interested urged the retention of the agent. \$1,000.00. Also L. L. Johnson of Amarillo, Bickman, auditor of the N. M. and other considerations. C., Capt. J. H. Toulouse of Alpresent for the same purpose. other considerations. not be here, but sent a letter to \$250.00. were made to the board by many ne qr 15 5-7, \$500.00. of those present in favor of re-

We understand that petitions of remonstrance had been filed, Garland, sw qr 32-7-8, \$1. but they were not numerously

The board finally concluded that in the present state of the county's finances they would Savings Bank, n hf se qr 27-6-8, risk appropriating \$500 for the \$280.00. ensuing year, but could not ap-

propriate more. This made it necessary to \$2,000.00. raise the private subscriptions to \$1,000, which was done in a few selves subscribing to the fund. The board then passed a reso-

lution appropriating \$500. Hence the matter is settled, and we retain the county agent

for the ensuing year.

It is scarcely necessary for this paper to reiterate the belief heretofore expressed, that this 13.6.13. \$1. is a good move. And we further believe that as the end of the next year's work approaches there will be ample reasons to confirm belief in the wisdom of the action.

"The crop this year was good; the oats went 80 to 90 bushels per acre, and wheat went 40 to 50 bushels and

the price is fair."

Sam Morrow, of Millet, Alta., in writing to Mr. J. M. MacLachian, Canadian government agent at Water-town, S. D., says: "I am well pleased with the country. The climate is better than I ever thought it could be so far north; ideal climate for stock I have some colts and cattle that have not been inside of a stable in four years. I consider this a fine country for mixed farming. I know of farmers around here who had 42 bushels of barley to the acre and 55 bushels of oats to the acre."

Jacob Goetz of Piapot, Sask., had 43 acres of wheat from which he got 1,200 bushels, and got an average of 93 bushels of oats to the acre.
