Walter Nelson, un hombre de negocios de Silver City, comitú suicidio. Sesenta cantidades recibieron grados en la reunión del Rito Escocés en Santa Fé.

Doce poblaciones están representadas en la Asociación de Desarrollo de Nuevo Mexico. Las cifras de la oficina del censo estiman en 402,000 la población de Nuevo Mexico.

El aniversario de nacimiento de Lincoln fué observado en todas las escuelas del estado. Ratón ganó la contienda acerca de la posesión por el municipio de su abastecimiento de agua.

El Club de Rifle de Magdalena recibió su cédula y ha arreglado un monte al este de la ciudad. En Santa Fé se está manifestando un movimiento hacia la organización de una asociación de Y. M. C. A.

Las cantinas de Clovis tienen hasta el 10 de marzo para disponer de sus provisiones y abandonar el negocio. El gobernador McDonald nombró a los siguientes notarios públicos: Nora E. Summers, Santa Fé; Abner Barrea, La Joya.

Las escuelas de Tucumcari se abrieron de nuevo después de haber estado cerradas por tres semanas debido a la fiebre escarlatina. Las Señoras de Dexter han ordenado por el valor de \$30 de rosas que se plantarán alrededor de la ciudad con el fin de embellecerla.

La Asociación Protectora de Caza de Santa Fé ahora cuenta con 230 miembros, todos con formal licencias de guardianes de putados de caza. La segunda convención anual de la Asociación de Criadores de Ganado y Caballos de Nuevo Mexico se tendrá en Deming los 22 y 23 de febrero.

La póliza de seguros de \$5,500 sobre la escuela pública de Mogollón, que fué completamente destruida por un incendio, fué pagada por completo. Cierta cantidad de semilla de remolacha de azúcar, suficiente para plantar 150 acres fué expedida a Las Cruces procedente de Rocky Ford, Colo.

Pedro, el niño de cinco años del Señor y la Señora Yanea de Tucumcari, sucumbió a las heridas recibidas en un fuego principado con cerillas en sus manos. La Señora Henry Swan, viuda del representante Swan del condado de Quay, que falleció hace algunos meses, fué nombrada diputada tesorera del condado de Quay.

El cuerpo de otro hombre muerto, supuesto ser el de Clyde Wiggins, quien ha estado ausente por los cuatro ó cinco últimos meses, fué encontrado en un rancho cerca de Mills. Chris Goke de Park Springs proen tóna demanda por premios de estado representando la suma de \$159, ha biendo matado treinta y siete coyotes, cinco gatos salvajes y cinco lobos en enero.

Los ciudadanos de French están agitando la cuestión de un molino de harina, habiendo recibido una proposición de capitalistas de Oklahoma y Miami, N. M. Se demanda una suma de \$10,000. La Señora May D. Smith, esposa del Reverente Ellis Smith, anteriormente de Roswell y ahora pastor de la iglesia metodista del sur en Albuquerque, obtuvo divorcio y manutención. Juzgó el caso el Juez J. T. McClure.

James Sutherland, uno de los más antiguos residentes de Roswell, y antiguo tesorero de condado, es muerto. El Sr. Sutherland habia estado sufriendo de reuma por varios años. Un envenenamiento urémico fué la causa directa de la muerte.

Las cartas al procurador general describen cómo Theo. Cannard, un rancho del Río Rojo, condado de Colfax, cavó un túnel de cuatro millas por la nieve solo con el objeto de salvar algunas reses, entre las cuales se encontraban algunas que no le pertenecían. Los residentes de Mogollón están ofreciendo una serie de diversiones con el objeto de reunir fondos para asistir en la reconstrucción de la escuela pública, recién quemada en un incendio. Un recién bañe de "sobretodo y delantal" trajo la suma de \$251.50.

Un perdón condicional fué concedido por el gobernador a Golden Glambe y Arthur Keating, jóvenes de 18 y 15 años, respectivamente, confinados de la escuela de reforma de estado. Cada uno habia cometido su mínimo de tiempo y se habia conducido de manera irreprensible en la escuela. El gobernador McDonald designó como delegados a la Academia de Ciencias Políticas que se reúne en sesión anual duodécima en Filadelfia los 23 y 25 de abril los siguientes: W. P. Metcalf, Albuquerque; G. T. Veal, Roswell; C. B. Kolhausen, Raton; D. T. Hoskins, Las Cruces; E. C. de Baca, Las Vegas.

Emmett Goodin confesó su culpabilidad en Roswell en una acusación de comercio de las blancas, y fué amulido el caso por asesinato por lo cual iba a ser juzgado. Jien Revell, un joven casado de East Las Vegas, fué encarcelado en la prisión del condado de San Miguel sin fianza, mientras se espera que se le acuse de asesinato al segundo grado. Esta medida dependerá de la condición de Pearl Reed, de 16 años, también de Las Vegas—de si se rustabelece ella ó no.

El valor de la producción minera el estado, según reportes de la oficina de la comisión de transacciones de estado, probablemente será de \$10,000,000.

College Education Declared to Be Necessary for Girls Who Want to Marry. "Whether or not a college is worth what it costs depends upon the student," said Miss Edith H. Caldwell, dean of women at the University of Washington, in addressing the mothers of a high school in Seattle, according to the Post-Intelligencer of that city.

"I have seen a good many thousand dollar educations put on fifty-cent girls. But someone mentally objects, 'I do not intend my daughter to earn her living. I expect her to be married, as every woman ought to be.' In that case, I should say, emphatically more training is essential. Father is willing to put up with almost any amount of foolishness in his little girl, as he continues to think of her. Husband, if he is a man of sense, would like a companion for a wife, and not a doll.

"I feel, personally, that the married woman is not only under obligation to administer her home expertly, which means scientifically, but to make an intelligent contribution to the well-being of the community.
