## MURDERERS RUN TO EARTH

Chased Through New Mexico to  
be Shot to Death in  
Texas

The murder of J. K. McClure, a special agent for the Eastern Railway of New Mexico, more commonly known as the "Cut-Off", near Abo last week, has resulted in the death of two of his saayers, and the wounding of the third, as well as the death of another officer and the wounding of a third.

For some time the Santa Fe has missed goods from cars shipped over its route and special agent McClure was detailed to look into the matter. His sudden disappearance caused an investigation to be started, which resulted in the finding of his body in an old well ten feet deep on the Howe ranch, about a mile north of Abo station in southwestern Torrance county. Much stolen property was found on the premises in a secret cave, among the stuff being 26 sacks of lima beans, 13 sacks of dried apricots, about 35 sacks of chops, several new horse collars, 11 cases of Van Camp's Milk, two lawn mowers, 5 butts of Star Tobacco, 5 new axes, etc.

It is supposed the thieves boarded the heavy trains as they climbed the grade from Las Bocas and when passing the vicinity of the ranch, threw the booty from the car. Later the stuff was carted to the ranch and hidden.

When the officers reached the Howe ranch to make their investigation the murderers had flown. Telegraph wires were kept warm, notifying officers all over the country to watch for the fugitives. Three men, answering the description of Frank Howe and his sons, Robert aged 21 and Guy aged 17 years, were put off a freight train a short distance north of El Paso, or as may be more probable, they left the train thinking it more safe to attempt the crossing of the boundary into Mexico on foot. Near Sierra Blanca, a battle took place between the trio and Customs Inspector O'Connor and Justice of the Peace Hemley. The elder son, Robert, was wounded in the affray, as was Hemley while O'Connor was killed. The elder Howe and younger son, took to flight leaving Robert to his fate. He was arrested and later taken to El Paso.

Posse followed the fleeing criminals, overtaking them after dark near Fort Hancock, where another battle ensued. After probably a hundred and fifty shots had been fired, the officers made a search and found both bodies of the Howes literally shot to pieces.

Robert Howe is in the El Paso jail, charged with the killing of Custom Inspector O'Connor. It is said a confession has been secured from him whereby he admits shooting O'Connor, while he placing the killing of McClure on his brother, Guy. It is possible though hardly probable that Howe will be brought back to Torrance county to answer for murder of McClure. The El Paso authorities will hardly consent to turning him over, however, until after a trial for the murder of O'Connor, which will in all probability cost his life.

Frank Howe had resided in the vicinity of Abo for about thirty years. Report has it that he married an Isleta Indian woman. She now resides with her tribe. Five children were born to this mar-

riage, four boys and one girl. The daughter is the wife of Hans Kayser, who resides in the south west part of the county. One of the sons, Henry is in Los Angeles while the other Charlie is in Kansas City. The elder Howe was about 65 years of age, was a soldier in the Civil War. Some years ago, he changed his name it being alleged that his real name is Lee, and that his parents reside in Logansport, Indiana. Some of the oldtimers in Estancia may remember him, as one of the gatekeepers with Harve Cluff at the First Torrance County Fair. He worked at different times as sawyer for B. B. Spencer at Eastview and the Mora Timber Company, s mills.

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 30—Tom L. O'Connor, United States customs guard at Fort Hancock, Texas, and Justice of the Peace, M. R. Hemley, of Fort Hancock, were shot in a fight with Frank Howe and his two half-breed Indian sons, about three miles from Fort Hancock, Monday morning. O'Connor was badly wounded and was removed to Rancho Gallego by Hemley, who had received a bullet wound in the arm. Robert Howe, the eldest son, was shot and captured near Fort Hancock this afternoon.

Howe and his two sons were put off a freight train at Fort Hancock and started to walk toward the river in order to cross into Mexico. The men are wanted in New Mexico in connection with the killing of L. K. McClure, a Santa Fe special agent near Abo Pass.

The officers found that plunder stolen from box cars along the Santa Fe had been stored on the Howe ranch, they say McClure, who was investigating these thefts, was found murdered, hence the desire of New Mexico officers to arrest the Howes, who fled from home.

O'Connor and Hemley followed Howe and his sons after they left Fort Hancock and about three miles from town the fight occurred. The Howes had rifles concealed in bedding which they carried with them, it is said.

Officers from New Mexico have been pursuing the Howes since Saturday, but the men boarded a freight and got away. Word had been sent to all towns in this vicinity to be on the watch for them and when they were seen at Fort Hancock, O'Connor and Hemley followed them to arrest them. They resisted arrest and drew their guns which resulted in their wounding both officers.

A doctor from Clint, Texas, left for Fort Hancock to treat Hemley, who was badly wounded. A posse has started out from Fort Hancock in pursuit of the men and four Texas rangers left yesterday on the morning train to aid in the capture.

O'Connor lived at 36-2 Morenci Street in El Paso, and is married and has a son. Up to a month ago he was located at the local customs office in El Paso.

S. E. Pickens is drilling a thirteen inch well for W. A. Dunlavy on his farm just south of Willard. The well is to be put down two hundred feet, and if the water supply is not thought to be sufficient, deeper. Several strata of water have already been struck, the well now being down about 150 feet. A Centrifugal pump of the Lang-Bowler type will be installed and quite a body of land will be irrigated the coming season.

## HOTEL BURNS AT TORANCE

Fire of Unknown Origin Completely Destroys Two Buildings

Word was received in Estancia Monday morning of the burning of the Cottage Hotel at Torrance. R. N. Reagan, who had charge of the hotel came in on the evening train, bringing the "remains" with him. He cannot account for the fire, as when he awoke the whole building was in flames, and practically everything was destroyed.

There were in reality two buildings, one of four rooms and one of seven, but both were so close together that both were burned. Reagan had five hundred dollars insurance on his furniture, which will partially cover the loss. Just what insurance was carried on the buildings, could not be learned. The buildings were the property of the New Mexico Central. About all there is left of Torrance now is the depot building, the upper story of which is occupied by the agent and his family.

## INJUNCTION IS ISSUED

Second Chapter in Saloon Fight in Estancia Becomes History

The second chapter in the local saloon fight has been made a part of history. On last Friday night the village council held a meeting at which the ordinance regulating saloons was discussed and amended, increasing the number of saloons permitted in the village of Estancia to three in place of two and restoring the license fee to five hundred dollars. The amendment will however not become effective until the expiration of the licenses which have already been issued, April 25, 1911.

Not being satisfied with this, Barney Freilinger went to Santa Fe, where he began proceedings in the district court, enjoining the village authorities from interfering with his saloon. The date for final hearing is February 20, at which time the injunction will either be dissolved or made permanent.

The district court at Alamo-gordo has held that villages have no right to impose a village license on saloons. Judge McFie and Judge Pope have both held in similar cases the village authorities have such right. The proceedings will be watched with interest.

### New Store Building

Eugenio Romero has purchased the lots opposite the Valley Hotel, of L. A. Bond and will erect a large store room at once. A force of men is already at work taking down the portions of the wall. The new structure will be in the nature of a department store, having separate departments for groceries, hardware, flour and feed. We hope that this is only a start and that the other burned-over portions of the town will be rebuilt with substantial buildings in the near future.

The official canvass of the vote on the adoption of the constitution by the commissioners last Friday, shows a majority of 203 votes in favor of the constitution in Torrance county. We wonder just what this majority cost the corporations who put up the money for the campaign.

The New Mexico State Democrat, exponent of error, publishes as a news item the "Oldest Apple Tree" a tree which is believed to "be about eighty-five years old." Possibly the editor of the Democrat has not heard of the whole orchard of old apple trees at Manzano, within sixty miles of the office of the Democrat which trees have been proven to be one hundred and fifty years old, and possibly are older still. It might be well for the Albuquerque editor who can find nothing better to do than vilify ministers of the Gospel and Evangelists to study his own door yard a little and see just what he finds there.

The Willard Record is crowing over the fact that Willard gave a majority for the constitution, while Estancia gave a majority against the same. We cannot see how the Record, which did not have the backbone to take a stand either for or against the constitution before the election, can consistently say anything. Had we sat idly on the fence during the campaign we should have preferred to keep our mouth shut after it happened. For ourselves, we claim to be more patriotic than the Record, we worked and voted for a BETTER CONSTITUTION and consequently a BETTER STATEHOOD. Not having worked either for or against the adoption of the constitution, the Record can claim no credit either way. The News worked against the adoption of the corporation made document, and Estancia precinct voted four to one against it. Nuf Sed!

The boosters for the constitution promised if the constitution were adopted by the people on January 21, we should have all the benefits and privileges of statehood in short order. All right bring 'em on. But there may be a long wait before New Mexico will be declared a state. The constitution provides "If congress and the President approve this constitution or if the President approves the same and congress fails to disapprove the same during the next regular session thereof, the governor of New Mexico shall, within thirty days after receipt of notification from the President certifying said facts," etc.

Under this wording we cannot see how it will all happen suddenly, but we can see how it can be put off for some time to come. "The next session" of congress will not begin until December, 1911. The present session of Congress began in December 1909, and will end March 4, 1911. Should Congress

disapprove the next regular session," which, and March 1, 1912, the president may then take the reins in his own hands and declare New Mexico a state, but unless congress takes favorable action before that time, we may have to wait until the year of our Lord, 1913 before there will be anything doing in the way of statehood. We must note the difference between a "session" of congress and a "term." Both the "long term" and the "short term" must be taken together to comprise one "session." Won't it be nice for the present officers, including Delegate Andrews to hold their positions until the middle of 1913, without to bother about re-election?

"If any person liable to taxation, shall fail to render a true list of his property as required by the preceding three sections, the assessor shall make out a list of the property of such person, and its value, according to the best information he can obtain, and such person shall be liable in addition to the tax so assessed, to the penalty of twenty-five cent thereof, which shall be assessed and collected as a part of the taxes of such person."

All property owners failing to make return of their property between the first day of March and the first day of May of each year forfeit their right exemption of \$200.00 allowed by law.

The personal return of your property with the assessor when in your precinct will be found advantageous to all concerned and greatly facilitate the work in the assessor's office.
