NATIONAL GUARD AT CAMP MILLS

Seven Hundred Soldier Boys in Camp near Las Vegas

Las Vegas, N. M., July 19.—Before sundown tomorrow all of New Mexico's splendid military forces will be assembled on the rifle range northwest of Las Vegas to participate in the annual encampment and field maneuvers of the First Regiment New Mexico National Guard. Adjutant General A. S. Brookes, the commanding officer, arrived yesterday from Santa Fe. Early this morning with member of his staff General Brookes went to the range to lend his supervision to the establishing of the camp. Provisions and supplies of various kinds arrived Saturday and were taken charge of and moved to the camp grounds by the quartermaster's department.

Ten companies with their officers and the regimental band will take part in the maneuvers. General Brookes stated this morning that he could not state the number of soldiers who would attend the encampment until he had received the reports of the commanding officers of each company after their arrival. It is probable, however, that the number will be in the neighborhood of 700.

First Lieutenant Young of the United States army, who is stationed at Fort Bliss near El Paso, has been detailed by the war department to attend the encampment. Lieutenant Young will provide a problem in military tactics to be worked out by the guard every day. He also will conduct an officers school for the instruction of the company commanders and their lieutenants.

Doesn't Trust Fellowmen

A peculiar circumstance has just been developed by the postal savings bank. An Alabama postmaster has sent to the post-office department, a silver dollar so corroded by rust and covered with green mold, that it is only upon close scrutiny that it can be recognized as a genuine dollar. The postmaster in the accompanying letter explained that this particular dollar together with several hundred others in like condition had been deposited in the postal savings bank shortly after it was opened there. The dollar was dated 1889, and this was the latest date on any of those deposited, so it is safe to assume that some southern capitalist had his pile interred in mother earth for approximately 22 years. Does Prohibition Prohibit Murder?

On July 22nd Texas will vote on prohibition, and the campaign now going on in the Lone Star state is a warm one. At El Paso the other night a public meeting was held at which some great speeches were made. Among the speakers was Fred W. Freeman, who made a telling address.

"I have heard the argument," said Mr. Freeman, "you let whisky alone and it will let you alone. This is not so. Since I have been in El Paso I have let whiskey alone but it has not let me alone. Not three months ago my wife and another woman were driving down the Ysleta road and on their way they met a drunken Mexican in a buggy, who ran into them, causing the horse to run away, demolishing the buggy and that the two women were not killed was a miracle.

They were letting whisky alone, but liquor was not leaving them alone. I defy any man in El Paso to drive down the boulevard to Ysleta on Saturday evening who will not say that he found the trip to be hazardous through meeting drunken drivers of all classes of vehicles and machines. There is a woman living within three blocks of my home who is leaving whisky alone, but liquor won't leave her alone. It is robbing her of the bread that rightfully belongs to her and her children. You can leave liquor alone but it won't leave you alone."

"They say prohibition will not prohibit. I have before me a list compiled by the district clerk of El Paso county, which shows that from May 10, 1907, to June 11, 1911, there were 55 murders. You would at least suppose that of this number there would be 50 convictions, wouldn't you. But there were not; the same list shows that out of the 55 murders in El Paso county there were six convictions. Yet they say prohibition does not prohibit. Have you heard any of the anti-prohibitionists stating that the prohibition of murder prohibits; have you seen where anyone states that because the prohibition of murder does not prohibit that murder should be licensed? Will Serve Home Grown Dinner

Albuquerque, N. M., July 10.—The first New Mexico Development Conference at Mountainair is going to prove a success and promises to prove a big success. Replies have come in to the Bureau of Immigration from every county and almost every community in New Mexico showing that the interest is wide spread and that the attendance will be representative of all sections.

One of the latest acquisitions to the program is Professor W. M. Jardine of Manhattan, Kan., one of the famous experts of the Kansas Agricultural College and a practical dry farmer on a large scale. Professor Jardine will address the Conference.

Mr. Norris H. Reed the well known expert of the Santa Fe railroad's advertising department has been in New Mexico for several days studying conditions and more thoroughly familiarizing himself with the publicity need of the new state. Mr. Reed handles every year one of the most extensive advertising and publicity campaigns in the world—that of Santa Fe railway system. Very few people know it, but last year the Santa Fe railroad spent \$18,000 in advertising New Mexico alone.

"It is such a big state and has so many and so varied resources," said Mr. Reed on leaving Albuquerque, "that it takes a lot of money and a lot of united effort to get it all before the country. We have been very much interested in the activity of the various New Mexico communities in advertising their resources during the past year and this activity concentrated and extended will soon bring New Mexico the development its great resources justify."

One of the most interesting features of the Resources Day conference will be a luncheon served by the people of Mountainair to the members of the conference. This luncheon will be served out of doors and the menu will consist entirely of products grown immediately around the Chautauqua town where the crops this year are unusually good.

Cooler Weather and Rains in States

Washington, July 18.—Weather generally favorable to the growing crops prevailed during the week just ended, according to the national weather bureau bulletin of the weather bureau. There was decided moderation of the temperature east of the Rocky mountains and a corresponding rise in the west, and beneficial rains in the south and east.

In the corn growing states west of the Mississippi river much relief was experienced from the extreme heat. Good rains fell over much of Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma, but drought continues in Missouri, Iowa, where vegetation is suffering severely.

In the great corn growing states east of the Mississippi river the weather was most favorable. In the spring wheat growing states dry weather continues, and especially in southwestern Minnesota and over most of the Dakotas, and the need of more moisture is severely felt.

COUNCIL IN BUSY SESSION

Marshal Instructed to Collect Road Tax from Citizens of Village

The "City Dads" met in regular session last night transacting quite a little business. The matter of the collection of Road Tax was taken up and the marshal was instructed to collect the tax of three dollars from every able bodied man within the village. The money derived in this way will be used in putting our streets in better condition.

The ordinance relating to sidewalks which has been before the council for some time was taken up and referred to attorney for amendment.

The matter of cutting the grass in the park was taken up and it was ordered that Julius Meyer be allowed to cut the grass for the hay he might derive therefrom, for if the grass is allowed to stand too long, the young trees will be endangered thereby.

Bills were taken up and approved.

The proprietors of the Estancia Bakery appeared before the council and offered a compromise in regard to the location of the bakery. They offer to construct an adobe room, with metal roof and cement or earth floor for a bake room, with no more combustible matter in the structure than is absolutely necessary.

Several proposed ordinances were discussed after which the board adjourned.

The matter of minors frequenting the poolroom was brought up. The marshal reported having notified the proprietor in regard to the law, and says that the law will be enforced without further notice.

Washington, D. C., July 18.—The center of population of the United States is 4½ miles south of Unionville, Monroe county, Indiana, according to a census bureau announcement. Since 1900 when it was six miles southeast of Columbus, Indiana, it has moved 31 miles westward and seven-tenths of a mile northward. The geographical center of the United States is in Kansas.
