### EDITORIALES.

#### UN INSULTO A EL UNIFORME.

En algún tiempo en Diciembre pasado el Secretario de Guerra Baker declaró en una carta al Presidente Wilson, que él estaba haciendo absolutamente "todo en el interés de los objetores concienciosos que la opinión pública pueda sobre llevar."

Justo el otro día, el Secretario Baker ordenó el relevo de 113 de estos objectores de Fort Leavenworth, la remisión de las porciones de las sentencias no ejecutadas "su honorable restitución al deber" e inmediato descargo del ejército.

Estos objectores, cuando se descargan, son llevados a una tienda de ropa y vestidos con un completo vestido de ropa de abajo, vestido, sombrero, zapatos, mientras que los jóvenes quienes deseos y por amor a su país, cien por ciento Americanos, son descargados del ejército, se les da su pasaje, y se les dice que usen el uniforme por tres meses y de devolverlos al cuartel general.

Hay algo de malo en ello y el pueblo no se olvidara, ni aun los verdaderos soldados se olvidaran.

Un editorial en el Kansas City Times, de Enero 23, 1919, bajo el encabezado "Un Insulto a el Uniforme," debe ser leído por todo lo Americano. El editorial es como sigue:

"Sr. Secretario Baker, Vd. ha ordenado la inmediata soltura de 113 hombres, quienes se habían enlistado en el servicio de los Estados Unidos, pero quienes rehusaron pelear.

"Ha considerado Vd. la significancia de lo que Vd. ha hecho?

"El pueblo Americano ha acabado de pelear en medio de grande guerra. Millones de hombres se han puesto el uniforme y han arriesgado sus vidas y parado al frente poniendo sus vidas en riesgo. Una multitud de ellos han vuelto a sus casas mancos y ciegos. Otros cientos de miles han hecho el sacrificio supremo y nunca jamás volverán.

"Estos hombres han estado y de lucro.

### EVENTOS PRINCIPALES EN NUEVAS.

La barrida de amnistía fue concedida a 113 objectores concienciosos la semana pasada por el Secretario de Guerra Baker. Los hombres estaban sirviendo sentencias en Leavenworth, Kans.

En la orden de soltura el Secretario ordenó que las porciones no ejecutadas de sus sentencias fueran remitidas que ellos sean honorablemente descargados del ejército.

La razón dada por esta acción como de ser un deseo del departamento de guerra para que el país pueda tener el beneficio de su trabajo de estos hombres en lugar de tener que pagarse para cuidarlos y mantenerlos sin ningún beneficio correspondiente.

Solamente aquellos hombres quienes han sido hallados sinceros en sus objeciones al servicio militar están incluidos en el perdón. Aquellos quienes han urrido escrupuloso conciencioso que ellos no sentirían tendran que servir lo restante de sus sentencias.

El descargo concedido a los objectores contendrá la siguiente sentencia:

"Este es un objector conciencioso que no ha hecho servicio militar de ninguna manera, y quien rehusó usar el uniforme."

Una junta de los principales trabajadores de todas las partes del mundo, incluyendo Alemania y Austria, está formulada para reunirse en Berne, Sivetzterland, el 27 de Enero. Esta es la primera vez que aliados y enemigos del trabajo se han oficialmente reunido desde el comienzo de la guerra.

Que precios más altos para los vivieres se esperan durante el año es el modo de pensar de un gran número de oficiales del ejército. La removida de restricciones de administradores de comidas se dan por esta razón.

Autoridad para el mas grande quinto Préstamo de Bonos de Libertad, que el límite de cinco millones ahora permitido se está buscando por el Secretario Glass.

Alemania y sus aliados no se admiran a la liga de naciones hasta que hayan expiado sus pecados, es el punto de vista del Lord Robert Cecil, quien ha preparado el plan Británico para la liga.

Una comisión de Franceses expertos legales ha reportado que bajo la ley internacional, el Kaiser es personalmente responsable por los crímenes de Alemania y que los aliados tienen el derecho de demandar el rendimiento de Holanda.

Siguiendo el anuncio que el administrador de comestibles ha descontinuado en fijar el precio mínimo de carbón, se predica oficialmente que el precio del mineral mengue. La orden removiendo restricciones federales entrará en efecto hoy, la orden no aplicará a carbón antracita.

Según el Viscount Uchida, el ministro Japonés de relaciones extranjeras, el objeto que el Japón tiene su vista en los términos de paz es la realización de un desarrollo libre de su vida nacional. Está determinado a seguir una política igual en todas las relaciones internacionales.

Los bancos de los Estados Unidos compraron una mitad de los Bonos de Libertad que se vendieron según una declaración del contador de la tesorería, molestias y desventajas de guerra no obstante, las instituciones bancarias del país muestran una condición favorable.

### NOTAS OFICIALES.

La comisión legislativa de la asociación banquera de Nuevo México se reunió en Santa Fe con el Gobernador Larrazolo el Miércoles pasado, y se discutió legislación futura perteneciente a bancos. Los banqueros pusieron en su lista de recomendaciones una ley de cielo azul que dará protección a invertidores sin expedir iniciativas legítimas hacia fabricar negocios nuevos. Otros tablones en la plataforma de banqueros son: Un acta haciendo la venta y disponiendo de propiedad hipotecada sin consentimiento del hipotecador una felonía. Un acta enmendando la presente ley bancaria de reserva tenida por miembros en bancos, contra su tiempo de depósito de doce por ciento de dicho depósito, y reduciendo la reserva efectiva en bancos de 40 a 20 por ciento. Un acta protegiendo a los bancos de pagar fondos de depósitos finados arriba de \$500 sin haber administración.

Policías adicionales fueron añadidos a la policía montada del estado según un anuncio hecho por el Gobernador Larrazolo, y son: Silviano Roval, del condado del Bio Arriba; Rafael Lucero, del condado de San Miguel; J. J. Hayden, del condado de Union; C. R. Van Houton, del condado de Torrance; y Andres Gandert del condado de Mora.

El Gobernador Larrazolo explicó la semana pasada un perdón completo a Lizzie Strickland, la joven fue sentenciada a la escuela reforma en Springer. Este es el tercer perdón expedido por el nuevo ejecutivo desde su inauguración.

## AN INSULT TO THE UNIFORM.

Sometime in December last Secretary of War Baker stated in a letter to President Wilson that he was doing absolutely "all in the interest of conscientious objectors that public opinion would stand."

Just the other day Secretary Baker ordered the release of 113 of these objectors from Fort Leavenworth, the remission of the unexecuted portions of their sentences, their "honorable restoration to duty" and immediate discharge from the army.

These objectors, when discharged, are taken to a clothing store and fitted out with a complete outfit of under-wear, suit, hat, shoes, while the boys who willingly and for love of country, 100 per cent American, are discharged from the army, given a ticket home and told he can wear his uniform for three months and then must return it to headquarters.

There is something wrong and the people will not forget; neither will the real soldiers forget.

An editorial in the Kansas City Times of January 23, 1919, under the heading, "An Insult to the Uniform," should be read by every American. The editorial is as follows:

## THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND WHAT CAN YOU DO ABOUT IT.

During the past two months a series of articles have been appearing in the leading newspapers over the state, setting forth the activities of our health situation in New Mexico. They have been interesting, even compelling.

We have had the special health problems that result from our location, the nature of our occupations and the fact that the state is a health resort for the tuberculous, pointed out to us.

In spite of the fact that there is no state machinery for the collection of vital statistics we have learned to record knot by country clubs and in some instances societies and individuals that our death rate is way above what it should be, especially preventable diseases among children.

"These men have been fighting for all that men hold dear. They have been fighting for their homes, their women and children.

"In contrast has been a little group of slackers of men who would not fight. If the nation had been made up of them, if they had constituted even a respectable group Germany would now be supreme in the world. A na-

At San Diego, Cal., 212 airplanes from Rockwell Aviation field, flew over the city maneuvering and giving thrilling exhibitions lasting two hours; every machine landed without a mishap. The planes looked like a flock of birds high in the heavens.

Thirty-eight members of the W. W. were sentenced to serve from one to ten years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kans., by the federal Judge sitting at Sacramento, Cal.
