## FIRE AT ALAMO NEWS OFFICE

Considerable Damage from Water but Little from Fire.

## PRINT PAPER AT DISADVANTAGE

At 5:30 Thursday afternoon fire was discovered under the floor of the front building of the Alamogordo News' office, and at 5:31 the entire office was a wreck. The damage by fire was about 15 cents, the damage by water and axes about \$1200. The 15-cent loss on the building was not covered by insurance, but the stock and equipment was fully covered. ## DELEGATES TO DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Monday last, W. R. Eidson, F. R. Boynton, J. W. Prude, W. H. Lumbley and J. E. Wharton left for Roswell to attend the Territorial Democratic convention. This is a very strong delegation and as they went with their hands untied their influence will be felt at the convention. They are going to try to send Judge Wharton to Denver as a national delegate.

## THE WORLD'S GOOD ROAD CONGRESS

The greatest good roads congress ever held will be held in Paris this coming October and the one principal subject to be discussed at that world's congress will be how to keep the automobile from destroying the public highways. It is said that while a heavily loaded iron wheeled wagon improves macadam roads the rubber tired auto simply demoralizes it and public roads in France have deteriorated 10 per cent in the past few years on this account. President Roosevelt has delegated three of the greatest good road experts in America to attend this convention.

Improvements to cost \$100,000 will be made on the Southwestern between Alamogordo and Three Rivers during the next four months. The work will consist of fills, raising the track and cement bridges and when completed will make this one of the best pieces of track on the road.

This week Mr. Beam, who lives between Alamogordo and the mountains had his best horse severely injured by catching a hind foot between two large rocks. It leaves him with only one horse.

## NEW MEXICO A LAND OF HEALTH AND HONEY

A Kentucky professor is visiting at Las Vegas and he gives the following report of conditions back home.

New Mexico is a by-word with the people in my part of our state. Many of the biggest and best farmers in our immediate locality have caught the 'New Mexico craze' as it is called, and have sold out and come to the territory, locating principally at Elida, and Montrose, in Roosevelt county.

"These people and their neighbors write back to friends and relatives that their part of New Mexico is a land of health and honey, with the result that the craze for homes and lands in the great southwest has not abated in the least, nor will it soon."

## FIRE AT THE DEPOT \$1,000 DAMAGE

Monday morning at about 4 o'clock when the night operator, W. H. Heinke, at the depot was getting some baggage ready for No. 1, a fire broke out in the operator's room and completely stripped it of all instruments and furniture before the flames could be extinguished. The cause of the fire is a mystery. Night Watchman Nimo had just been there and was scarcely a block away when the alarm was given, the operator had been out of the room only a few minutes and yet when the fire was discovered the whole room was a blaze. A freight crew was in the yards and the boys put the fire out with a hose at the depot. About \$1000 damage was done. W. J. Davis, the day operator had his typewriter destroyed. No trains were laid out though the station here was unable to use the wires for several hours. The only cause for the fire is presumed to be defective wiring for electric lights.
