The morning of December 6th, the day for the beginning of the Otero county contest, found the entire county wrapped in snow and the snow still falling at a rapid rate. Notwithstanding the fact that some of the teachers and contestants had arrived the day before an effort was made to postpone the program for one week, hoping for fair weather. The schools in the valley were promptly notified by telephone, but the wires being down it was impossible to get word to the schools in the mountains. The train from Cloudcroft brought in a large number of teachers, contestants and visitors, and it became necessary to arrange for the contest. Both programs were set for Saturday evening. Of course the field meet had to be omitted.

A very fair audience was present and every contestant answered to call. According to the rules submitted by the committee each contestant who spelled correctly every word given from the chosen list was to receive a first prize, paid for by their communities. The result was the awarding of five first prizes as follows: Laura Pace, Alamogordo; Andrew Hendrix, Cloudcroft; Christine Wohlenberg, Della Porter and Emma Hillburn, Tularosa.

In declamation the first prize was given to Kimberlin Carlisle, Logwood school; second prize to Roy Fun! Three Rivers; third prize to Coochie Lockney, Orogrande. Julia Johnson, Alamogordo, received first prize on recitation, with Fred Kronenberg, Tularosa, second, and Ellen Osby, Tularosa, third.

The prizes in oration were: Lee Walker, first; Chalmers Bowers, second, both contestants residing in Alamogordo.

For drawing the best map of South America, Lucile Charles, Logwood school, was given first prize, and Lucy Vigil, Tularosa, second.

The prizes were well distributed, every school entered receiving one or more prizes.

The display work brought in, and now on display in the office of the county superintendent, is a credit to the schools of our county. Professors or Tipton will be very glad to have the people call and see this work.

The total receipts were \$28.20, while the expenditures totaled this amount, being distributed as follows: Medals \$19.85; janitor \$1; tickets \$1.50; programs \$2.25; telephone 60 cents; rent for church \$3.

COUNTY TAXES CUT 5 MILLS

County Commissioners Have Lowered the Levy from 24 to 19 Mills

STATE LEVY NECESSARILY RAISED BY STATE BOARD

Statehood Brings Added Burden to Taxpayers—State Machine Must be Oiled

The taxpayers of Otero county in particular and of the state in general are cognizant of an increase in the levy; at least they realize they are paying taxes in large round numbers. Some are inclined to believe the trouble lies with the county commissioners, some know the trouble lies with the state board of equalization, while others don't know who or what is to blame. The only thing they are real sure of is that they are compelled to dig pretty deep, in some instances, in order to get possession of that coveted tax receipt.

It is not here intended to consider any other section of New Mexico except our own bailiwick. The treasurer of Otero county is daily asked the question: "Why are the taxes so high this year?" There is a reason. Prior to the admission of New Mexico into the sisterhood of states dry lands were assessed at from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per acre; at the present time, under the statehood regime, the same land is assessed at \$1.50 per acre, while the state tax has jumped from 10 mills to 13 1/2 mills on the dollar. Thus we have an approximate increase of 62 per cent in the state tax, an increase for which the state board is responsible, as this board fixes the value of the land for assessment. While this is a fact, it is not mentioned for the purpose of criticism in any way; in fact, the state board has no alternative. The expenses of carrying on the state's business has very materially increased since we passed from a territorial form of government, and these expenses must be met. It is up to the state board to provide ways and means, and it has done so to the best of its ability.

On the other hand, it is indeed gratifying to the residents of Otero county to note that our board of commissioners is steadfastly watching their interests. The levy last year for county purposes was 24 mills, while this year it is 19 mills, a very material reduction in the county tax rate; and were it not for the necessary increase in the state levy, Otero county taxpayers would in no sense be carrying a heavy tax burden.

The purpose of these lines is to inform our residents as to where the cause for the high tax rate lies. It is wholly on account of the increased state expenses, and wholly because of the necessary action of the state board. Our county commissioners have reduced the rate about 20 per cent over the levy for last year, saving the taxpayer many good dollars on their county assessments.

ELECTRIC LINE SEEMS CERTAIN

Right-of-Way from Cloudcroft to Roswell Will Be Secured Immediately

PROMOTERS SURPRISED AT ROUTE'S RESOURCES

Mrs. C. F. Barrett Dies Suddenly on Friday Night—New Notes From Cloudcroft

Cloudcroft, Dec. 13.—In the latter part of November, after having made a trip over the proposed Cloudcroft-Pecos Valley electric line, Messrs. C. C. Carroll and Wm. Morgan Hand returned to Cloudcroft and met with the Business Men's Association for a discussion of the line. These gentlemen had been met at Cloudcroft by Mr. J. C. Jones who entertained them at his home on his ranch near here one night and the next morning he drove them over the proposed route down Cox Canon to Elk N. M., where they were met by Mr. Bud Cleave of that place who drove them to the Pecos Valley. Both gentlemen at the meeting of the Business Association expressed themselves as surprised at the resources of the country along the proposed route. This section had always been pictured to them as a rich and fertile one but it proved beyond their expectations. They were well pleased and felt confident that in the very near future some definite plan would be worked out to put in an electric line through that section. At any rate they feel that the outlook is so good that if the interests they represent do not take hold of the proposition, some other will. These gentlemen have gone east to consult with those they represent before taking further action and in the meantime the citizens of this section will see what can be done to secure a right of way from Cloudcroft to the Pecos Valley either down Cox Canon or James Canon. This line is one that Mr. J. C. Jones has been working on for several months and if it goes through the citizens of this section should not lose sight of the fact that it has been so enthusiastic about it.

At the last meeting of the Business Association G. A. Breckheimer, proprietor of the Texas, and J. Ben Hancock of Bailey's Pharmacy, were appointed as members. The application of Dr. L. K. Warren was read and will be voted on at another meeting.

The Courier will be connected with the department of Extension and the clubs, farmers' short courses, and all other means of extending the college's sphere of usefulness to the people of New Mexico.

The Courier will be small in size for the first few months, the present size being three columns. Four pages in newspaper form, but it will be made larger as soon as sufficient funds are available. It will be sent free to any resident of New Mexico on application and will begin with a circulation of about ten thousand.
