JUDGE MANN TALKS
OF ALAMOGORDO.

Says Its Citizens Labor as a Unit for Its Growth and Perfection—New Bank Building Exceptional in Beauty.

While in Santa Fe attending Territorial Supreme Court Judge Mann was interviewed by the New Mexican as follows:

"Tell you about Alamogordo? I would be a poor citizen of Otero County's growing capital city if I would not tell you all that you would print."

Thus replied Associate Justice Edward A. Mann, when approached for facts regarding his home town.

"You see," the big handsome young jurist continued, "the town spirit of the citizens of Alamogordo is a large and positive element in that plucky little city's growth and improvement. Our people are possessed of a high civic consciousness and pride. In anything touching their city's welfare Alamogordo people are as one. I have never in my life observed a people so unanimous in anything as the residents of my city in its upbuilding. So long as that is true we cannot stop growing."

"We certainly had a prosperous year in 1904 and we have every reason to expect even better things of 1905. It is a pleasure to tell you of the new building which the First National Bank has just erected at New York and Tenth Streets. There is not a more handsome bank building in New Mexico. It is built of block cement, finished with beautiful native stone from quarries near Alamogordo. Its fixtures and interior finish are all of solid Flemish oak."

"Another building improvement lately accomplished is the spacious annex to the court house which provides chambers for the court of that district as well as office accommodations for the district attorney and other county officials. It is two stories in height, and is built of fine pressed brick."

"One improvement on which the city prides itself is that during the past year the E. P. & N. E. Company has erected several neat cottages in various sections of the city which have been sold to railway employes on the installment plan. These cottages contain seven rooms each with bath, hot and cold water and all modern plumbing. They add to the general appearance of the city. In addition to these twenty residents of the city have lately built handsome residences."

"Work is progressing rapidly on the new territorial institute for the blind, the walls of which have now reached the second story."

"Our people have taken up the matter of street improvement and a few months hence will probably see every prominent street of the city well gravelled. By test experiments we have learned that gravel abolishes the dust nuisance which certainly in a consumption devoutly to be wished. Dust has always been our bane and we believe that the gravelled street solves for us this vexatious problem."

"Socially one of the most important features of the year was the organization of the El Paso & Northeastern Club by employes of that railroad. They have rented a suite of comfortable rooms in the new bank building and have fitted them with a reading room, gymnasium and both rooms. For the successful fruition of this excellent idea much credit is due to the efforts of Dennis Sullivan, the young superintendent of the road who has shown himself to the right man in the right place in many instances and who is as popular with all of his fellow townsmen as he is with the road's employes."

"Many improvements are contemplated for the coming spring and summer. Chief amongst these, perhaps, is the construction of a \$125,000 hotel and also of a large sanitarium. Not a few new business blocks are under contemplation."

"One factor in Alamogordo's prosperity is that the Alamogordo Lumber Company continues to produce 125,000 feet of fine pine lumber daily and is able to boast the ownership of sufficient timber to assure a continuous output for twenty years to come."

"In the Sacramento Mountains there were many snow falls this winter insuring an effective water supply for the next year with its attendant good crops."

"Otero County generally is prosperous. Its ranchers have plenty of feed with the best prospects for next year's growth of hay and range grass. Our sister cities, Clarendon and Tularosa, are both prosperous and growing."

"Several valuable mineral finds have lately been made. Perhaps the most interesting of these is the discovery of soda in large quantities. In all probability a plant for the treatment of this soda will be installed the coming year."

"SOMETHING GOOD
FOR ALAMOGORDO."

This Year will Witness Big Things for Our People and Town.

For some days citizens have been talking about something good for Alamogordo in store. No one seemed to know exactly what it was but there was something in wind. To learn the truth about the reports a News representative visited Messrs. D. Sullivan, A. J. King and W. A. Hawkins. From each of these gentlemen we learned something new. Mr. Sullivan stated that while the shops of the E. P. & N. E. would not be rebuilt this year yet they would be enlarged and improved in order that the road might handle more business. That the E. P. & N. E. is now full of business, handling orange trains and the like; that the R. I. had been compelled to hire E. P. & N. E. engines in order to move the business as fast as the E. P. turned it over to that road. It will be remembered that about one year ago the E. P. was compelled to hire R. I. engines and the business of the E. P. was not so heavy then as now. Again we say this kind of business speaks well for Mr. Sullivan and his assistants.

Mr. A. J. King was found up to his eyes in work but stopped long enough to say that a \$125,000 hotel was on the program for Alamogordo for the year 1905 and that the sanitarium proposition, known here as the Greig sanitarium, was by no means a dead proposition; that Dr. Martin was hard at work on the scheme and meeting with encouragement. The hotel is to be situated on the grounds where the Pfaff saloon is located.

Hon. W. A. Hawkins was seen in his new quarters over the First National Bank. He is working on a proposition to build a wagon road with convict labor, the road to run up the Alamo cañon to the Sacramento summit in order to give the people from the Weed and other mountain precincts a good route to Alamogordo, something the ranchmen and farmers of the east side of the mountains need in order to reach market with their products. This matter was up before the Alamogordo Board of Trade Tuesday night, some action might be taken in order to get the proposition on foot.

Thus Alamogordo is to get something good this year and our people should stand as a unit in assisting all of these plans.

Poets' Opinions of Each Other.

POST OFFICE RECEIPTS.

Postmaster Hawkins Tells of the Business of his Office for the Past Year.

"For the year ending Dec. 31, 1904," said Postmaster J. M. Hawkins to a News representative, "the receipts of the Alamogordo postoffice amounted to \$750 more than for the previous calendar year."

"This statement has no reference to the money order business, but relates to stamp sales and box rents only."

"Considering that receipts fell off \$300 in the strike month compared with the previous year, the three weeks suspension of traffic owing to was hours, the showing is a good one."

Postmaster Hawkins estimates the loss on above accounts at \$600, yet there was still a growth of \$750 in the volume of business, compared with the year 1903.

But for the labor troubles and floods Alamogordo would have made a long march in 1904.

There is no visible reason why 1905 shall not be better than 1904 in business.

J. E. DeMier Returns.

J. E. DeMier returned Wednesday morning from St. Louis where he went to consult with the board of the Federal Sanitarium. Mr. DeMier reports that all things considered the location of the sanitarium in the La Luz cañon near here is the most probable. From the description of the site which was given the board by Mr. DeMier they are more than favorably impressed and the committee to visit this section will leave St. Louis about February 1. The committee will visit Clarendon and Fort Stanton sanitarium and spend a day and night on the proposed grounds up La Luz cañon.

The Englishwoman's Latchkey.

Talking about the British aristocracy, a woman who has met it on its native heath tells me that the feminine section of it never stirs out without a latchkey. We carry latchkeys over here, but we don't do it in the British way. The American woman ties her key in the corner of her handkerchief or hides it under the mat or puts it in her purse along with cold cream receipts and car tickets and samples. The Englishwoman parades hers. The woman who knows her tells me that she has seen latchkeys set with precious stones and fastened to long chains. Floating Targets of the Sea.

When a specially formidable one drifts along past St. John's a cruiser slips her moorings and runs to sea after it, pelting it with projectiles until she fires away her allowance. Figure any way you will, gentlemen, but the plan to haul gravel by wagons from the nearby foothills is the cheapest and the best. Rock crushing is all right, but we think it would be a little too much for our financial strength. The cost of a crushing outfit would gravel lots of roadway not to mention, as Mr. George Warnock says, the cost of blasting rock and getting some to crusher. Then by wagon hauling we can stop or begin any time without having money tied up in a machine and lying idle. Hauling gravel would give employment to quite a number of men and teams thus giving food to both man and beast and in its way stimulating home market. This gravel mixed or on top of our adobe soil say not more than six inches deep would in time become as hard as a quarry and then by occasional patching at a small cost we would have roads always. This plan of building roads was employed between Fort Worth and Dallas over a black waxy soil and has given satisfaction and the Fort Worth-Dallas road is along the Texas & Pacific railroad and had railroading gravel been the cheaper it certainly would have been done. By all means give us teams and wagons. The gravel is all right and we

have plenty of it and a down hill pull to any section of the town or precinct.

With G. C. Scipio at the head of the committee to look after the Alamo cañon road we may expect something. Mr. Scipio is a shrewd business man and the piloting of a road from Alamogordo to the east side of the Sacramento could well be termed one of the crowning acts of his life. This road would give an income to Alamogordo as lasting as the foothills by bringing the Sacramento mountain farmers nearer Alamogordo's market.

The plant to work the great soda deposits near Alamogordo is almost an assured thing. This plant would give employment to several hundred workmen. J. A. Eddy, the promoter, has his plans almost perfected on that proposition and if its go it will be the biggest thing yet for Alamogordo. We are just beginning to grow.

When Judge Mann goes abroad he never lets an opportunity slip to advertise his home—Alamogordo. And the beauty of it is the Judge knows exactly how to talk about his home so as to impress the right kind of an idea. We need a few more good men to talk about Alamogordo.
