## THE TAXPAYERS' ASSOCIATION.

Santa Fe, N. M., July 12.—The Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico now nearing the end of its first year of work, has attracted the attention of tax experts and taxing authorities throughout the United States to New Mexico and has won a remarkable volume of favorable comment upon the accomplishments of the opening year and the high character of the work. Requests for the New Mexico Tax Review are coming from tax authorities and students, from public and municipal reference libraries, and from schools and colleges all over the country and the magazine, used almost entirely to report the work of the Association to its members, is being extensively quoted. The high plane upon which the Association's work is being conducted is noted in the current issue of the "Bulletin of the National Tax Association", the leading tax organization journal in the country, in the following comment on the May number:

"The May number of the 'New Mexico Tax Review' is a stirring one, well worthy the attention of outsiders. The Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico, in the course of its examination of the various state departments, has evidently come to one—the department of public lands—whose policy, construction of the law and administrative management it cannot endorse. The situation is obviously a delicate one. For instance, \$710,621, representing in large part preliminary deposits on proposed purchases of land, and deposited by the commissioner of Public lands with various banks, pay no interest to the state. The Commissioner, we gather, sincerely believes that he has full warrant in the law and administrative precedent for this and other practices which impress the outsider and the Taxpayers' Association as very debatable.

"The Association's treatment of this unpleasant situation is admirable. President Hagerman opens the subject with a ringing editorial. The problem of Publicity, which might well serve as the Magna Charta of high-grade taxpayers' association. It deserves to become a classic. Then follows a clear-cut impersonal analysis of the Financial Transactions of the Department of Public Lands—telling the facts as the Director of the Association finds them, without bias. President Hagerman then concludes the discus-

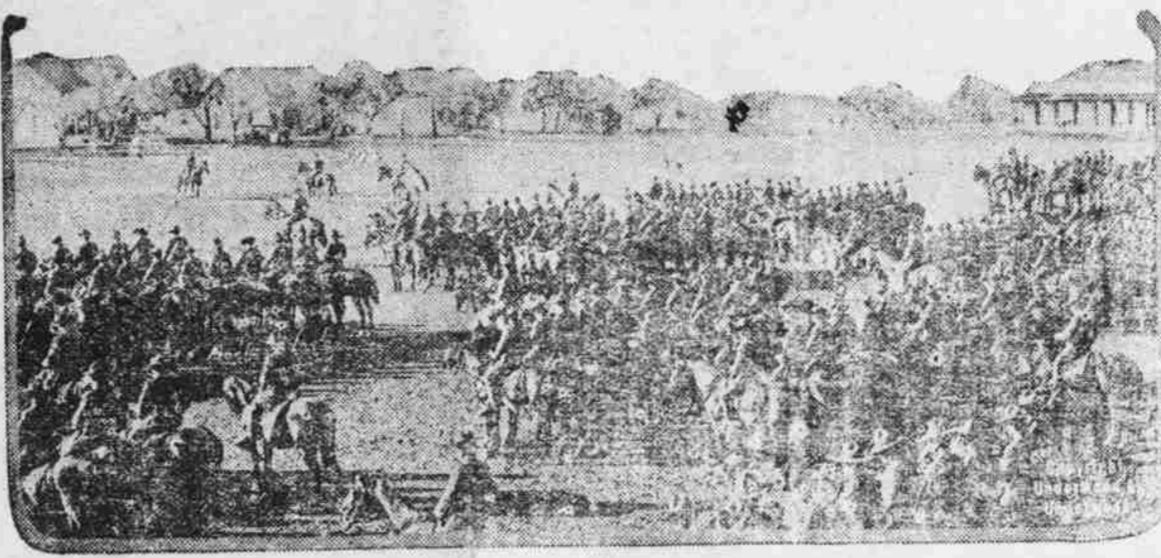

### NEW MEXICO MILITARY INSTITUTE.

Roswell, N. M., July 13—The catalogue of the New Mexico Military Institute, which recently came from the press and is now being distributed to patrons and prospective patrons of the schools, is one of the attractive and ornate publications ever issued by an institution of learning, either in New Mexico or elsewhere. Not only is it an excellent recommendation of the school which gets it out but it is also an advertisement of New Mexico and its educational possibilities which could not be surpassed.

The work of sending out this catalogue in response to the numerous inquiries that are coming into the office of Colonel Willson, the superintendent of the institution, is now going on, and indications are that the attendance on the opening day in September next will be the largest that the institute has ever known. Not until the complications growing out of the war in Europe and the present trouble with Mexico arose did the people of the United States fully appreciate the importance of educating young men to be good soldiers in case the call to arms should come, and the result has been a general awakening to the value of military training that is in every way gratifying.

By an act of congress each of the ten schools designated as "distinguished" military schools one of which is the New Mexico Military Institute, is permitted to send each year two cadets to the military academy at West Point and the naval academy at Annapolis. The two latest representatives of the Roswell school to go up to the big leagues are Cadet Wiley, of Silver City, who has entered West Point, and Cadet Kraker, of Gallup, who is at Annapolis. That both are sure to make good in their larger field is considered a certainty.

The New Mexico Military Institute stands for a manly education for manly young men, and New Mexicans have every reason to be proud of it.

### ANOTHER BENEFIT FOR SANTA FE EMPLOYES.

A few days ago a brief newspaper dispatch announced that effective July 1st the Santa Fe railroad will begin payment of benefits to the families of employees dying while in the service of the company. The dispatch gave no details and it has required the arrival of the official circular announcing the plan to show how extensive is this additional protection which the great railroad system has placed around the families of those who do its work. The new death benefit has nothing to do with the company's long established pension system and is entirely additional in the protection it gives. It has, moreover, no relation to the pending wage controversy between the railroads and the trainmen, since the matter has been under consideration for some time past and since the death benefit applies to every employe of the Santa Fe, from general officers to the men on the section.

"It has been believed" says the official circular signed by President Ripley, "that regardless of the amount of wages a man may receive he will derive comfort in the knowledge that in the event of his death those dependent upon his will not be in absolute want. It has been exceedingly difficult to ascertain with any reasonable exactness the cost of such a scheme as has been discussed. But the present year has been one of unusual prosperity, and feeling that the results attained are in part due to the efforts of our employes it is desired to recognize these efforts in a substantial way.

"Beginning, therefore, on July 1, 1916, the Company proposes to pay to such party, or parties, as such employe, dying while in its services and who has been in its employ for two or more years continuously, may have designated in writing as his beneficiary or beneficiaries, or in case of failure to make such designation, then to his next of in dependant on him, a

sum equal to five per cent of the salary or wage received by him during the twelve months immediately preceding his death, multiplied by the number of years of continuous service, in accordance with the 'examples' hereafter set forth, provided that the maximum amount to be so paid shall be one year's pay, but shall in no case exceed \$3,000, and provided further that the minimum shall be \$250.00."

The employes referred to show the operation of the benefit as follows:

(Indent) A has been in the service of the company or wage last year \$75 per month; at his death his beneficiary would be entitled to 5% of \$900, for each year, or \$90, for the two years, but the minimum operating in this case the amount to be paid would be \$250.

B has been in the service of the company 6 years; salary or wage last year \$1200; at his death his beneficiaries would be entitled to 5% of \$1200 for each year; or \$350.0).

C has been in service 20 years; salary or wage last year \$2,000; his beneficiaries would consequently be entitled to that full amount.

D has been in service 16 years; salary or wage last year \$4,000; his beneficiaries would be entitled to 80% of \$4,000 or \$3,200, but the maximum here applies and the amount paid would be \$3,000. (and indent).

The plan, in effect, amounts to the insurance without cost to him of the life of every Santa Fe employe who work for the company in any capacity for two years continuously, in an amount not less than \$250, and not to exceed \$3,000. It extends the insurance against old age, carried in the pension system, as a reward for faithful service, to practical, expense free life insurance for all employed, and in another striking example of the desire of the Santa Fe railroad not only to deal fairly with its employes, but to share its prosperity with them. It is being made increasingly worth while for the man who has a job with the Santa Fe railroad to keep that job, and doubly worth while because at every opportunity the road is offering honorable reward for honest service.

## TRAINMEN CONTRAVERSY.

Albuquerque, N. M., 13—How do the 350,000 men enlisted in the membership of the four great brotherhoods of railway trainmen take the vote which will determine peace or war in the nation's greatest industry? The question is one frequently asked by the un-informed public since actual taking of the strike vote has begun. The manner of taking the strike vote was described today by a veteran local member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive engineers who explained first that the negotiations between the brotherhoods and the railroads have been conducted throughout the present controversy upon a system basis: That is, the general manager or chief operating department official of each railway system has participated in the negotiations and conferences in behalf of the railroads, while duly elected representatives of the trainmen from each railway system have been sitting in these conferences in behalf of the Brotherhoods. This was the manner of representation on both sides in the recent New York conference wherein the proposal of the railroads for arbitration was rejected by the men and the nation wide strike vote ordered.

While action by the men in behalf of their demands is a concerted movement of the four brotherhoods, the actual taking of the vote is divided as to the count, first for each railway system, and second, for each of the four brotherhoods upon each system. For operating purposes, for instance, the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway is two separate systems; the permit line with its branches, east of Albuquerque, and the Coast Lines, being Santa Fe lines west of Albuquerque. Should a majority of the four brotherhoods upon the Coast Lines, for instance, vote against the strike proposal, men in the Coast Lines service would not be called upon to go out, even should a majority of the men on all other railways in the country vote to strike. The same would be true of the Santa Fe main line, or of any other railway system. Railway system individuality is maintained throughout. In the same manner the individual preference of any one of the vote, and should one of the brotherhoods upon a given system go on record against a strike, that particular

## The University Advise.

Albuquerque, N. M., July 13.  
—New Mexico young people  
who expect to enter the State  
University when it opens on  
August 22, are being urged to  
advise the University immedi-  
ately of their intention. This  
week postal cards are being  
mailed to every New Mexico  
high school graduate, asking  
the single question whether or  
not he or she intends to come to  
the University this year. This  
is a measure of precautions and  
preparedness on the part of the  
University government. Last  
year the University made pro-  
vision in dormitories and other-  
wise only for those students who  
had written of their intention to  
apply for the entrance. Almost  
double the number appeared on  
the opening day of enrollment,  
none of whom had made any  
previous arrangement for rooms  
and board, and the result was  
several very busy days on the  
part of the University registrar  
and his assistants. This year  
the University proposes to be  
prepared, and while a freshmen  
class of 100 is assured, arrange-  
ments will be made to care for  
considerably more than that  
number. Ten additional cott-  
ages are being built on the cam-  
pus for the use of young men.  
There is a men's dormitory  
building, but this has been full  
for several years past. Last year  
the cottage system was tried for  
the first time and proved instan-  
tly popular with young men.  
Each cottage consists of three  
room, two bed room and a study,  
being designed each to accom-  
modate two students. Even  
the additional cottage room,  
however, is likely to be taken  
and those who intend to enter  
the University in August are  
being urged to advise President  
David R. Boyd, or the registrar  
at once.

brotherhood would be relieved of obligation to go out should a general strike be ordered, even should the other three orders the same system vote in favor of the strike. Thus, it is explained, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers on the Union Pacific system separated themselves from the movement before the strike vote was ordered taken, and thus are not affected by it.

The actual vote upon the proposal to strike is a sealed ballot by which each man has the right to express his individual preference. The sealed ballots are collected by an officer of each local division or chapter of each of the four brotherhoods and the votes thus collected are sent to the general chairman of the railway system, who in turn reports the result to the headquarters in New York. It is pointed out that no effort is being made to influence individual members in determining how they shall vote; that the vote is a pure referendum; that each man has the right to go on record as his own preference and judgment tell him to vote, and that a vote against a strike is in no way an evidence of disloyalty to the brotherhood, but is a simple expression of personal preference and belief.
