Territorial Treasurer J. H. Vaughn has received from Secundino Romero, clerk of the Fourth judicial district, \$619.70 of fees for the quarter ending March 31; from E. A. Burnam, collector and treasurer of Colfax county, \$7.42 of 1900 taxes; \$174.80 of 1901 taxes; from Mark Howell, collector and treasurer of Chaves county, \$169.16 of 1900 taxes and \$244.86 of 1901 taxes; from Fred Muller, collector and treasurer of Santa Fe county, \$10.79 of 1899 taxes, \$30.69 of 1900 taxes, \$283.70 of 1901 taxes; from L. N. Jackson, collector and treasurer of Otero county, \$7.27 of 1900 taxes, \$134.42 of 1901 taxes; from J. D. Homestead Contest.

In the homestead contest of Virginia D. McClurg, of Colorado Springs, vs. Clara A. B. Corbin, of Washington, D. C., involving 160 acres of land in northeastern Socorro county, upon which the ruins of the Gran Quivira stand, the general land office has given Mrs. McClurg thirty days in which to proceed and perfect the contest. Mrs. McClurg alleges that William C. Corbin, the late husband of Mrs. Clara A. B. Corbin, had abandoned the homestead and had never cultivated it or placed and improvements upon it; that Mrs. Clara A. B. Corbin is not his lawful widow, and that the lawful widow is now a resident of New York; and that Mrs. Clara A. B. Corbin has not made any improvements upon the homestead or cultivated any part of it and has abandoned it for six months.

Bureau of Immigration.

The regular annual meeting of the bureau of immigration took place in the office of the secretary in Santa Fe. The members present were: W. B. Bunker, Las Vegas, president; Granville Pendleton, Aztec, vice president; Alfred Grunfeld, Albuquerque, treasurer; Jose E. Torres, Socorro, and J. W. Bible, Hanover. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The annual report of the secretary, Col. Max Frost, and of the treasurer, Alfred Grunfeld, were read and approved. The accounts of the treasurer were examined and approved. Plans were then adopted for the pushing of the work of the bureau for the printing and distribution of literature on the climate, resources, etc., of the territory. The members of the bureau expressed themselves as greatly satisfied with the work done during the past year, finding from personal experience and judging from the many inquiries received by them individually that there was a great demand for information concerning New Mexico and that much capital and immigration were coming into the territory as a result of the work of the bureau. After attending to the routine work before the bureau and after a thorough discussion of the work done and business before it, adjournment was had to meet at the call of the president.

INDIAN DEPREDATIONS CLAIM.

Taking Testimony for the Heirs of John Chisum.

Chisum, have been trying to get the United States government to settle a claim of the estate of John Chisum, the pioneer cattleman, brother of James Chisum, for heavy losses by Indian depredations years ago, when the Comanches and Mescalero Apaches roamed over the country at will. A. Richardson, the plaintiff being represented by Judge A. L. Matlock, of Fort Worth, and the government by John A. Hendricks, of Marshall, N. 

**KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.**

**A Tired But Delighted Crowd Returned From El Paso.**

**THE PROGRAM FOLLOWED.**

This morning twenty-nine tired, but jolly members of the Knights of Columbus tumbled off the El Paso train. They went down Saturday to help institute a new council on Sunday. The work was begun in the afternoon and completed at night. Four were present from Pueblo and six from Denver. The Albuquerque Knights are loud in their praise of the El Paso Knights and the royal welcome extended.

The El Paso Herald says:  
The institution of El Paso council No. 638, Knights of Columbus, was begun yesterday afternoon in Odd Fellows hall and completed last night.

This is a secret fraternal order for Catholics only, but it is in no wise a religious institution. There is an insurance feature connected with it but that is of secondary importance.

The new council starts out under the most favorable auspices, and the personnel of its membership is a guaranty of its strength and usefulness.

The delegation from the Denver council arrived Saturday and were driven about the city or otherwise entertained. The Albuquerque delegation, thirty-two strong, arrived Sunday. All the candidates for membership in the local council and the visiting knights attended high mass at the Church of the immaculate Conception at 10 o'clock.

The organization of the lodge was begun in Odd Fellows hall at 1 o'clock and finished during the evening, and followed by an elaborate banquet at the Ordorff hotel.

The reception committee consisted of Dr. J. L. Samaniego, president; M. Hughes, C. E. Kelly, J. C. Ronan, G. W. Emerson, T. C. Lyons, D. C. Beckham, P. H. Durack, J. P. O'Connor, W. H. McCarthy, Henry Welsh, Wm. H. Watts, Dr. Francis Gallagher, and Prof. H. T. Lopez, all of whom were untiring in their efforts to make it pleasant for the visiting knights.

The first and second degrees were conferred by the team of Albuquerque council consisting of O. N. Marron, G. K.; P. F. McCanna, G. K.; E. V. Chaves, C., and John Beaven, W.

The third and highest degree was conferred by John H. Reddin, T. D. S. K., assisted by the celebrated Denver team.

During the degree work the Right Reverend Bishop Dunn, of Dallas, addressed the lodge.

Toasts, speeches and music were interspersed from time to time. Dr. Francis W. Gallagher acted as toastmaster.

E. V. Berrien delivered the address of welcome to the visiting knights.

Joseph Newman, the prince of humorists, sang "Patsy Hogan," and as an encore came forward with "Then He Told Me Another One."

Dan Powers responded to the toast "The Clergy," paying a tribute to the unselfish devotion of the Catholic priests. His speech was interspersed with pathos and humor.

Joseph H. O'Reilly, of Albuquerque, was called upon and responded off-hand in a witty speech fitted with little homely touching truths of life.

"Columbianism in the West" was responded to by Territorial Deputy Supreme Knight John H. Reddin, of Denver, who gave an eloquent review of the progress of the order in the west. O. N. Marron spoke of "Our Sister City, Albuquerque," in an eloquent witty manner and touched a responsive chord in the hearts of the local knights.

Tom Burke, of Chicago, gave a recitation.

C. E. Burg, in a fine voice rendered beautifully and dramatically "Mother's Song."

The party receiving same will be required to give bond to be approved by the mayor in the sum of two hundred dollars for the faithful performance of such contract. Said sealed bids to be directed to the city clerk and marked "Bids for furnishing teams and drivers for city purposes."
