Chief Ruppe's Report.

The department answered during that time 42 alarms, of which 27 were communicated by the fire alarm stations throughout the city, 15 by tele phone, and 1 by the bell tower. The property involved by these fires

amounted to \$132,475.00; the amount of insurance carried on said property amounted to \$82,850; the total amount of damage suffered was \$8,973, leaving only \$1,230 as a loss uncovered by insurance. New York, April 15.—Negotiations oking to the settlement of the Louisville & Nashville situation were re-sumed at the banking house of J. P. Morgan & Co. today. The conference began before the opening of the stock market. At 11:20 o'clock, Harris, Gates & Co., stock exchange brokers and representatives of the Gates interests, is-

sued the following statement:
"We have bought a large amount of stock of the Louisville & Nashville road. We did not buy it for specula-tion but for an investment, believing

absolutely in the present and future value of the property. There will not be any corner in the stock."

Later Mr. Harris was asked if he had anything to add to the formal statement. He took out a pencil and changed the original statement so it read: "We bought control" instead of 'We bought a large amount of stock."

TOO HEAVY CHARGE.

Burglars Blew Up the Safe, Building

and Themselves.

Duluth, Minn., April 15.—Telephone advices from Eveleth today reported the destruction by fire last night of the city jail and the blowing up of the Du-luth, Missabel & Northern railroad de-

luth, Missabel & Northern railroad depot by burglars at that place.

In the jail an unknown prisoner was burned to death. Several hours later burglars blew up the depot safe. They overestimated the amount of nitro-glycerine needed and with the result the report woke up the entire town and shattered windows of houses for blocks around. When the citizens reached the scene the station lay in ruins and the debris had caught fire from the stove. The flames were exfrom the stove. RUSSIAN MINISTER KILLED.

Minister of the Interior Died Within an Hour.

St. Petersburg, April 15.—Minister of the Interior M. Sipiaguine was shot and fatally wounded at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the lobby of the ministerial offices by a man who held the pistol close to the minister's person. The wounded man died at 2 p. m.

The assassin is a student who gained access to the building disguised in the uniform of an aide de camp. He met the minister on the main staircase and emptied the revolver in his body at close range. The assassin was immediately arrested.

The military and police adopted more stringent measures to preserve order. The burgomaster refused the socialists request to be allowed to follow their own devices in burying the socialists killed during Saturday's roits. Orders were issued that the procession be held at 6 o'clock in the morning, without bands or funeral emblems. Otherwise the interment must be carried outright. It is estimated the strikers in the Charleroi district now number 50,000. Frequent parades are there, but the town is generally peaceful, in accordance with the advice of strike leaders.

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

British Government Wants to Borrov £32,000,000.

London, April 15.—Government Leader Balfour, replying to a question in the house of commons today, announced the ministers had no informa tion to impart on the subject of South African peace negotiations, nor under the circumstances, could any information be imparted at the present stage of negotiations. The government would immediately inform parliament of the fact when it had any news to communicate.

The resolution of the house of commons providing for a loan of £32,000, 000, was adopted.

THE LION WHIPPED.

A battle at Juarez, Mexico, on Sunday, between a Numidian lion and a wild Samalayuca bull was witnessed by thousands of people. The battle took place at the Plaza de Toros, which is just across the Rio Grande from El Paso. In this arena have occurred scores of bull fights, but no attraction of recent years caused such high expectation of bloody scenes as Sunday's fight between the lion and In the center of the arena was erect-

ed a large iron cage, octagonal in shape, ninety-six feet in circumference. Into this the bull was decoyed. The lion was in a smaller cage adjoining and connected with it by a uoor. At a blast of the trumpet the door was open-ed and the lion rushed into the larger cage, the door being closed behind him, and the smaller cage removed so as to give the spectators an unobstructed view.

The attendance at this spectacle excelled any ever seen in this section. The trolley cars carried thousands across the Rio Grande, while hundreds of carriages and pedestrians crossed the bridges. Thousands came from other places, and the two cities are filled with visitors.



of as pure water as can be obtained in

this section. The committee further states in their report "nor is there any means of adequately cleaning the reservoir." To impractical men-such as seemed to be on this committee—the conclusion was exceptionally appropriate. Suffice to say, not only can it be cleaned "ade-quately," but it can be cleaned expedidutely, but it can be cleaned expedi-tiously and twice during the last six months it has been thoroughly cleaned. It was cleaned the latter part of March—not only were the sides and bottom swept, but scrubbed and I will state that there was not a gallon of any foreign matter remaining.

One reason that it can be "adequate-ly" cleaned is that it is constructed along the general lines used in such constructions—sloping sides, level bot-tom, a person walk down the sides, rendering the cleansing process excep-tionally feasible, which has been found y experience.

The work begun last year is still in progress and when completed will enable the water company to guarantee absolutely to the public a supply of as pure water as can be obtained.

I respectfully invite any unbiased committee to investigate the plant and reservoir and satisfy themselves as to condition of same.


