## WHERE IS THE "FUlL

 DINNER PAIL" NOW?The following correspoudence is self-explanatory:

This extraorditary epistle, tor the purpose of debasing the franchise, closes as follows:

Regardless of politics, once the manufacturers of this country join universally in this movewent depression will cease.

Lend us your helpand post the card 'Full time and keep goins.' Yours very truly

Permit us to szy we do not uaderstaud. Why have you stopped your factories? Why is the 'Fuli Time and Keep Going' plan not now in operation? Why has there been any shutting down by you and the other memhers of the National Association of Manufacturers, the American Hardware Manufacturers' Association, and the numerous other similar associations to which you say you belong? Did you not assure us that McKinley would insure as full dinner pail' to all who desired to work? Was not this assurance renewed when your several bodies indorsed Rosevelt and Fairbanks? Then what has emptied the dinner pait of miltions of men who are willitg to work? What greater reliance cat be placed on this assurance than ou the others? If you were false prophets before, how do we know you will not be again?
"But why the closed factories? why the idle milis? why the unused freight cars? Why the maintenance of high prices in the face of falling demand? Where is the 'athounditg,' 'marvelous,' 'wonderful.' umparelleled, widespread' prosperity? Haven't we got a Republican adeninistration? Haven't
we got a Republican Senate and House of Representatives? Have'tht we had them uninterruptedly for twelve geara? Haven't the Republicans made the laws, state as well national, and haven't and they been charged with their entforiement? Then what is the matter? If the laws are defective, why haven't they been altered? If defective now, were they not equally detective eight and four years ago, when you assured us. "all is well," and 'leave well enough alone?'
"Why the depression, we ask? Haven't we had seven years of Roosevelt, who, according to Republican orators and assistant Republicans, as well as Republican newspapers, is the greatest, wisest and best President the country ever had? Haven't we had twelve years of 'standpatism, with Hanna, Aldricu and Cannon sitting on the brakes to prevent the enactment of legislation not desired by the gentiemen who are so conspicuous in their support of Tafi aad Sherman-Murgan, Rocketeller, Carnegie, Harriman, Schilt? Do these men ever make a mistake when they select candidaues? Whach is most likely to be misled, these men whu say that Talt 'is all right, that he is a conservative or the Western farmer who in told that Tait is a radical?

Where is the 'abounding prosperity? Wealith bas certaialy mereased enormousiy, or, at least, prices have been boosted to a point that ought to have satistied the most avaricious. The
tortunes of the few have become tortunes of the few have become
gigantic-bounded out of sight. Morgan, we are told, has thre buaured or so militons, Carnegie as much; while Ruckelelier is credited with a buhon; a few thousand others having trom one o a huadred multons each. These seem to have had therr 'fill time and keep going' cards in operatron. while they are generally redited with having in Octoler November last gathered in neariy verythug in a large way in the shape of banks, trust companies ndustriai and railroad combnathots, which had so far escaped them. In fact, the buik of the people have been set a lively pace to pay the increasing priees for the uecessaries of life these and a lew others control.

But what has happened to the masses, whom you and other boosters of McKinley and Roosevelt assured were to share in the prosperity? With a total estimated weaith of some one humired and ten bilions the per capta tables work out all right, there should be enough to go round, for that's equal to about 37,000 per family. But who has it? How many of the millions of toilers have a tenth of that sum ree and clear? How comes it that the bulk of the propleare
shy their proportion of this enor mous wealth? Have they been lazy, thriftess, of improvident
during these twelve years? If lasy, then who created the wealth? Has the average farmer, mechame, salesman, clerk, teacher, or laborer squandered their portion in riotous living? Did they spend it for automobiles, steam yachts, or even for diamonds? If not, what has become of it? Why haven't they got it; how did they lose ut? What has been the unseen, subtle, but apparently all-powerful force that tas taken it from them? Why have matters become so appalihave matters become so appali-
ing in America that the so-called 1 ng in America that the so-called
effete countries of Europe have telt impelled to take official cognizance of the deplorabie condtions in which so many of our toners are compelled to live. The Italian government (as the result of the shocking reports that reached $1 t$ ) having sent a commission to investigate. Most revolting condtitons were shown to exist. Whole families were found crowded into one and two-room apartments, while not only the women, but littie chnldren nut much more than babies, were found working in filthy, unhy genic quarters, helping to eke out a scauty living for the family. Cvercrowditig was shown to be the rule not the exception. In one case seven adults and seven children were 'living' in a dark, middle room, and a large, bare rear room

The daily press also tells us that situce October thousands of entire familes have been out of work, as a result they have used up all their savings, not their proportion- 87,000 , as abovebut a paltry \$50, all they had been able to save durimg the vears of boasted prosperity. The president of the Associstion for Improving the Condition of the Poor, K. F. Cutting, says: cannot remember such a condition existing before, Nor even in 1893 and 1894 did the depression exist so long! While, according to Senator Foraker, on July 1, 22,000 skilled workers are out of employment here in Cinciunati.' Presumably the number of unskilled was greater yet. These illustrations of 'unparalleled prosperity have been duplicated all over the country; no section has escaped the blight. There has been a tremendous exodus of those who could not find employment, three-quarters of a million more haviug immigrated to Europe than have immigrated here.

Why the depression, why the blight? This 'marvelous' pros perity seems to have been wothderfully efficacious in keeping the toilers poot. 'I his unprecedented prosperity seems to have been monopolined by a few. They
but the larders of the workers it seems have accumulated nothing. so that they now face starvation as their reward for the part they took in producing 'widespread prosperity. The bottom has dropped out of their 'full dinner pail.
'Again we ask why? Yo. say, regarilless of politics, once the manufacturers of this country join universally in this movement, depression will cease.' Who are they to sell to? How can the masses buy when their savings are gone? With wages reduced how are they to pay monepoly prices and yet live? How are you going to bring prosperity to the toiler without destroying monopoly and spectal privileges? Uving the force-pump won't alter conditions. The people want something more than wind. Why not prick the monopoly bubble. let out some of the wind and water, bring the necessaries of life within the purchasing power of the prople. The crop of millionaires may not grow, but an equitable distribution of the wealth produced according to the part that each has contributed to its production will bring happiness to millions and insure a nat-ural-therefore lasting-instead of the 'force-pump' prosperity you propose.

Let us clip the talons of monopoly, uproot special privilege, and economic conditions will improve so mightily that all will be able to enjoy the comforts of life and none will have to toil such long hours that life becomes a burden.

Finally, firmly believing in the fundamental democracy of American instifutions, we have no more right to dictate how our employes should vote than they have to coerce us.

## HOW TO USE CONCRETE.

## W. F. Fitzpatrick Gives Pratical

 Points for Amateur.
## The form or mold has to be exact

 and strong. If you wish to bulld a wall, the boarding has to be true and plumb, set close together and properiy braced, both sides if an independent wall, one side if a retaining wall. This planking or the forma retainingthe concrete in place nhould be kept the concrete in place nhould be kept
there until the concrete ts absolutely there until
well net.
It is better to err on the safe alde and keep the forms up for a couple of weeks than it is to have the whote thing erumble by removing them too soon. Fatal concrete collapses are oecurring with all too great frequoncy, and hurry to oceupy those bulldings is generally to blame it they fall.
For ordinary walle, plers and such work, dry measuren of concrete should be one of cement, three of coarse, clean sand and nix measures of elean gravel, broken slone or brokn brick, broken large or smanl as the nature of the work demands, but never crumbled into dust. Where greater strength is required, increase the cement proportlonally.
The mixture should be falrly wet and thoroughly mixed, as wet as bricklayers usually have their mortar will accomplish the best results. This
mixture should be poured into the mixture should be poured into the mold or form and tamped with heavy weight and not more than six or elght fachen thick at a time before tamping.
It is diffeult to foin it, so one unit of the work had bent be completed at the one operation. If a day has to elapse between times then leave the edge of the finlahed work very rag ged and broken so that the new may implnge upon it in good shape.

P ROGRESS made in food and Arum p Rogress made in food and drus 1907 is explained in detall in the year book of the department of agriculture fust issued. The book uhows that methods of manufacture wero studled by government experts and whenever posifble assistance was given manthfacturers in improving their methods. Hy means of sterilization it was found that various frult and vegetable produets can be preserved without the use of chemical preservatives. The experiments along this line resulted in new methods for the preservation of pie-filing articles and canned goods. Extensive investigations as to the use of sulphur for drying frult were made, resulting in the discovery of better methods for drying frutt and in dinclosing the fact that molanses and syrup do not contain so much sulphur ns has generally been supposed. PROBABLY FATAL ACCIDENT.
Harry Amsden, formerly a miner in White Oaks, met with a probably fatal accident in the White Mountains about two miles east of the Ellis ranch, Tuesday $\$ 100$ noon. He was driving a tunnel, and a shot having failed to go, the went back to examine it and the explosion occurred. A brother who was working at some distance heard his cries and went to his assistance.
The injured man was conveye 1 to the Elits ranch, where he now lies, and Dr. Raniger of Oscura was hastily summoned. The doctor labored with his patient from 7 o'clock on the evening of the accident until three o'clock next morning. The unfortunate man's injuries are reported to be of a shocking nature-two inches of the lower jaw were torn away; thirteen lacerations on face; right side of neck torn open, and both interior chambere of the eyes blown out.

Seed Rye at Skinner's.

TERRITORIAL GAME LAWS.
It is unlawful to kill, or to injure in any way, elk, mountain sheep, beaver or ptarmigan. The offense is punishable by a fine of $\$ 100$.
The 1905 session laws protect antelope, pheasant, bob-white quail and wild pigeon for a period of five years from the passage of the act.
Native or crested quail may be killed with gun only during the months of October, November, December and January.
Deer with horns may be killed with gun only from October 15 to November 30; limit, one deer.
Turtle doves may be killed from July 15 to May 1.
Wild turkey, mountain grouse. or prairie chicken may be killer with gun osly during the months of October, November and December.
The minimum penalty for the violation of any of these provis ions is $\$ 50$.
