#### Women as Economists.

The idea generally prevails among men that women are densely and incurably ignorant about the value of money. "He knows no more of money than a woman," is almost a proverb. The most absurd stories are perpetually told of woman's total incapacity to learn anything about money, and some of them are doubtless believed. She is, notwithstanding contrary bellef, an intelligent economist when she comes to learn what economy means. It is frequently said by the other sex that she can make a dollar go as far as they can make two. Nor is this by any means the language of compliment. Many a husband has discovered that his wife can buy more with a small amount of cash than he can, and he is in the habit of giving it to her for that special purpose. The extravagance of woman has been a stock theme everlastingly. We shall hear of her wild extravagance, of the waste of fortunes by her excess, of her uncontrolled and uncontrollable prodigality. This must be accented with considerable allowance for exaggeration. Man, not woman, is the great spendthrift; he always has been; always will be. Few men forced into economy by circumstances relish it, unless avaricious; and when their circumstances grow easy they cease generally to be economical. A woman who has once become economical will continue to be so, though there be no need of the habit, even if it be glaringly out of keeping with her condition. Woman's love of small details inclines her to economy. She may not be a financier in any large sense-that may not be within her scope-but careful use of little amounts of money certainly is, and she constantly demonstrates her profi clency therein. There is much more reason for calling woman penurious than prodigal, declares the New York Weekly, and she is really called both though the adjectives are absolutely incongruous. The plain truth is, if a woman has any common sense and is the least enlightened, she usually restrains her husband's tendency to lav-Ishness and employs all her influence in the direction of economy.

#### A WATER GATEWAY.

### Keeps Stock in, But Does Not Ob-struct Stream.

When farmers have trouble with a fence passing over a ditch or small stream they may be able to get an Idea to fix their fences so as to turn stock in, from the accompanying illustration.

Posts are set at a point near the edge of the stream and if there are



Water Gateway Through Fence.


supporting wires they should be connected with a rod shown at A. Below this rod is a stationary cross piece to which BBB are hinged.

Boards are nalled across these supports at C. The whole gate is hung that it swings out with the current of the stream. When the water is high the current carries the gate out and allows the passage of debris, but when the water is down the gate naturally swings in a normal position.

#### HOW TO USE CONCRETE.

#### W. F. Fitzpatrick Gives Practical Points for Amateur.

The form or mold has to be exact and strong. If you wish to build a wall, the boarding has to be true and plumb, set close together and properbraced, both sides if an independent wall, one side if a retaining wall. This planking or the forms retaining the concrete in place should be kept there until the concrete is absolutely well set.

It is better to err on the safe side and keep the forms up for a couple of weeks than it is to have the whole thing crumble by removing them too soon. Fatal concrete collapses are occurring with all too great frequency, and hurry to occupy those buildings is generally to blame if they fall.

For ordinary walls, plers and such work, dry measures of concrete should be one of cement, three of coarse, clean sand and six measures of clean gravel, broken stone or broken brick, broken large or small as the nature of the work demands, but never crumbled into dust. Where greater strength is required, increase the cement proportionally.

The mixture should be fairly wet and thoroughly mixed, as wet bricklayers usually have their mortar will accomplish the best results. This mixture should be poured into the mold or form and tamped with heavy weight and not more than six or eight inches thick at a time before tamping.

It is difficult to join it, so one unit of the work had best be completed at the one operation. If a day has to clapse between times then leave the edge of the finished work very rag-ged and broken so that the new may impinge upon it in good shape.

#### HAWK SCARER.

Merely a Glass Bottle, But It Is Effective.

I have tried this plan of keeping away chicken hawks and it succeeds,

says a writer in Farmers' Mail and Breeze. Take pint or quart size clear glass bottles, fill two-thirds full of water and cork tight. The end of strong cord around the neck

of each and tie other end around the small the 16-foot poles so onds of neck of bottle is about one foot from pole. Sharpen large end of pole and set in the ground. Set the poles every ten or 20 rods clear around the chicken range. The wind blowing against the bottle causes it to swing and turn around and at the same time the sun shining on the bottle of water makes it throw beams of light in several directions. When the hawk sees this he darts away as though he had been shot at.

#### Alsike Clover on Low Land.

Alsike clover is especially adapted to low land. This gives it a great advantage over the common red clover for low localities. Many a meadow on which it has been impossible to get a catch of red clover could be made clover producing if the alsike clover is sown. It will pay to make a trial of this, for many a low piece



P ROGRESS made in food and drug inspection and legislation during 1907 is explained in detail in the year book of the department of agriculture. just issued. The book shows that methods of manufacture were studied by government experts and whenever possible assistance was given manu-facturers in improving their methods. By means of sterilization it was found that various fruit and vegetable products can be preserved without the use of chemical preservatives. The experiments along this line resulted in new methods for the preservation of pie-filling articles and canned goods.

Extensive investigations as to the use of sulphur for drying fruit were made, resulting in the discovery of better methods for drying fruit and in disclosing the fact that molasses and syrup do not contain so much sulphur as has generally been supposed.

Among the more important studies of the methods of manufacture and preservation of foods and drugs were the bleached flour investigation, the lemon oil investigation, the whisky investigation and the investigation of nonfermented beverages alleged to contain cocaine or other objectionable drugs.

The experimental work of the bureau of chemistry, the enforcement of the federal food and drugs act, numerous investigations and the part played by various states in the enactment of laws regulating the manufacture and sale of foods are some of the subjects treated in the book.

The bureau of chemisty established ten additional branch laboratories throughout the country, where samples of food and drugs collected by inspectors under the direction of a chief inspector are sent. During last year 7,041 samples of foods and drugs were sent to these laboratories, resulting in 323 hearings and the transmittal of 12 criminal cases to the department of justice for protectivities. 

#### TERRITORIAL GAME LAWS.

It is unlawful to kill, or to in-\$100.

The 1905 session laws protect antelope, pheasant, bob-white quail and wild pigeon for a period of five years from the passage of the act.

Native or crested quail may be killed with gun only during the months of October, November, December and January.

Deer with horns may be killed with gun only from October 15 to November 30; limit, one deer.

Turtle doves may be killed from July 15 to May 1.

Wild turkey, mountain grouse, or prairie chicken may be killed with gun only during the months of October, November and Decem-







CAPT. GADSEN PERFECTS DEVICE TO CORRECT FALSE HORIZON.

#### Relatively as Valuable as Sextant-All Reward Inventor Seeks is to Know He Has Made Ocean Travel Safer.

Washington .- There has been presented to the bureau of navigation of the United States pavy an ingenious device to aid in taking observations to determine a ship's position, and which, if adopted, will not yield, and is not expected to yield a dollar of profit to the inventor, Capt. H. A. Gadsen, a retired mariner, now enjoying the comforts of life ashore at No. 6 Binden road, London.

Capt. Gadsen't invention is as important relatively as the sextant itself.

bortson glass of a sextant when day observations are taken. It carries a central wire for night work, on which a star, a light ashore or afloat or other small object may be brought in line. On the darkest nights the altitudes of the stars may be taken with the spanner. In the daytime, when the horizon is obscured and the limbs of the sun are brought between the legs of the instrument, the altitude of the sun's center is obtained and the true horizon is established.

Capt. Gadsen invented the instrument after his retirement from an active seafaring life. Its value as an aid to navigation was recognized by English marineys and it was suggested that a company be formed for the manufacture of the auxiliary to the sextant, but Capt. Gadsen, who is mid-dle-aged and "set" in his ideas, would not consider the proposition. The satisfaction that he will derive, and all he asks for, is the approval of the navigators who find his invention to be practical and helpful. He would rather know that a hundred ships had laid a true course and avoided danger with the aid of his spanner horizon than to receive a hundred thousand guineas.




#### Japan Raises Monument to Russians Killed at Port Arthur.


London .-. The peaceful epilogue of a great military drama was given at Port Arthur recently when a curlous picturesque and touching ceremony was performed. Through the initiative of Gen. Oshima, governor of Kwang-Tung, Japan has put up a collective monument to the remains of the Russian defenders slain in the slege of Port Arthur. "This measure serves two purposes," says "L'Illustration." "Many of the soldiers, in the first place, had a merely provisional burial. They were buried where they fell, and the place was marked by a cross of wood or uncarved stone, This made of Port Arthur a graveyard that was eloquent but not dignified. In the second place, the proverbial rapacity of the low class Chinese does not spare the poor mains of the dead. Inauguration of Port Arthur Monu-





Ever since the time when the hardy Norsemen ventured out of sight of land, guided only by a rude compass, dependence has been placed upon the sea horizon for those observations of the celestial bodies which enabled the navigator to fix his position upon and shape his course across the vast expanse of the oceans. When the horiton is obscured the observations cannot be taken, and reliance-uncom-fortable and uncertain-has to be placed on dead reckouing, the heaving of the lead line and the cries of the lookout. This is the case 0200 when the sun or stars are shining brightly and only the horizon is ob-

neurad. The great danger, and which has lured many a good ship to her destruction, is the counterfeit horizon, which for appears so clear and well defined that it will deceive experienced navigators -men who have been deceived before by the same false assurance that they were looking upon the real horizon. Secure in the belief that his "sights are good," which is the nautical way of saying that the safety signals are set, the mariner stands boldly on his course only to find that he is several miles out of his reckoning, and has made a bad landfall.

The spanner horizon is so called because it exactly spans the periphery of the sun's image reflected on the ment.

### **GOOD MOTOR SCARF**

USEFUL WRAP TO BE WORKED IN FINE WOOL.

May Be Made Any Width and Length Preferred-Directions for Both the Garment and the Accompanying Fringe.

This useful wrap, which should be worked in Sheiland or any fine wool, may be made any width and length preferred.

Both threads to be taken up throughout.

Work a chain the width required, turn, 2 trebles in the sixth from book, , pass two, a double crochet in next, 2 trebles in next, and repeat from



for length of chain, ending with a double crochet, 5 chain, turn and work 2 trebles on the last-made double crochet, taking both threads, \*, pass the 2 trebles, and into the next double crochet work one double crochet in the chain-stitch past the last 2 trebles, 5 chain, turn, and continue working this last row to and fro for length of searf, ending with a row of 5 chain into every third stitch, also into the foundation chain work 5 chain into every third stitch.

For the border at sides work a double crochet in the first chain loop, 5 trobles with a chain between each in the next loop, and repeat for length of work, turn, and work 5 chain into every other stitch back to the starting poin. Repeat on second side. For the Fringe .--- Cut the wool into 26-inch lengths, pass the book through the first loop at end of scarf, fold four strands of the wool exactly in half and draw them a short distance through, forming a small loop, draw the eight strands right through this loop and pull gently, drawing the knot close up to the work. Repeat this into every loop, taking care that all the knots are turned the same way.

tie the remaining strands of the second tassel to four of the third one and repeat to end of row, being careful to keep the Fnots quite level.

Tie ano'her row of knots an inch below these, but this time taking the eight strands of each tassel and tying them together. The two more rows of knots at equal distances below these, and cut the ends level with a pair of sharp scissors. Fringe the other end of the scarf in the same manner.
