At present Tokio has no institution that would correspond to the health centers of other nations. It is proposed to make St. Luke's hospital the nucleus for an establishment which shall include a hospital of 250 beds, a training school for 150 Japanese nurses, a postpital of 250 beds, a training school for 150 Japanese nurses, a post-graduate department for training Japanese internes and for medical research work, a public welfare and health department to include medical social service and a medical laboratory for American and British medical literature and magazines. Dr. Teusler says that about \$1,000.000 would be required to properly establish the proposed health center.

Exports to Europe aggregated \$196,000,000 compared with \$423,000,000 in October last year, while imports amounted to \$67,000,000, against \$88,000,000. During the ten months ended with October exports to Europe were \$2,056,000,000, against \$3,720,000,000 during the corresponding months of 1920, while imports aggregated \$622,000,000, compared with \$1,078,000,000, Exports to South America for October aggregated \$15,000,000, against \$58,000,000 a year ago, while imports totaled \$18,000,000, compared with \$47,000,000. In the ten months ended with October, exports to South America aggregated \$244,000,000, compared with \$491,000,000 for the same months last year and imports aggregated \$244,000,000, against \$685,000,000.
