Insannch as we have heretofore noticed the arrest, imprisonment and court-martial of James H. Holmes, Secretary of New Mexico, by order of General Ed. R. S. Canby, we feel it our duty to state, upon what we consider good nathority, that the War Department, on hearing a statement of the facts in the case, immediately ordered his unconditional release.

If otherwise, the offendors will be reported for trial or orders in their cases.

To give effect to this order, to prevent abuses and to guard against malicious or automoded accusations, the following rules will be observed.

1. At the Head Quotrors of each District, and at each post or command where the force is sing emogal to warrant it, an energetic and discreet officer will be charped with the dubes of Propost Aarshal, and will be intrinsived with such assistants as may be present.

Provost Harshal, and will be jurnlished with such assistants as may be necessary for the prompt and efficient execution of his duties. In small commands the commanding officer will himself be charged with and responsible for the execution of

2...
