SPELLING REFORM GETS DEATH BLOW.

New York, Dec. 14.—Professor Matthews, of Columbia University, chairman of the executive committee of the simplified spelling board, declined to comment last night on President Roosevelt's action yesterday afternoon regarding the new spelling. Yesterday Representative Landis called on the President in regard to the reformed spelling, and the President agreed to withdraw his order to the public printer in case the house would go on record against the system. Accordingly, Landis introduced a resolution favoring the old method, and the house passed it unanimously. Matthews said he had refused to comment on the President's original order, and must refuse to criticize the President's action now. He stated, however, that the system of reformed spelling was daily gaining friends both in this country and in England.

SPECIAL MESSAGE ON JAPANESE QUESTION.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 14.—A special dispatch to the Record-Herald from Washington says: A special message on the Japanese question and California school problem supplementary to the treatment of these subjects by President Roosevelt in his regular message last week, will be sent to congress from the White House next Tuesday.

It is stated authoritatively that this special message will be more vigorous in tone than the former communication, and will not be calculated to cool the indignation of the Californians. The special message, moreover, aside from its local application, will be one of the most notable and important communications in the entire list of those sent to congress by the present Executive. It will bring to a direct issue a centralization scheme which will likely form the climax of endeavor on the part of the Roosevelt administration. The administration is alleged to take advanced ground regarding the doctrine of Federal supremacy over state sovereignty.

The Japanese question raised in connection with the school problem of California has supplied the opportunity to give forcible expression to a mighty scheme of centralization that is to be carried out if possible.

It is not possible to forecast the details of what the President will say in his second message, which is understood to be an explanation of the administration's projected policy as to the supremacy of Federal control over state power, and will include the report of the special investigation of the San Francisco school question made by Secretary of Commerce and Labor Metcalf. Regardless of the nature of his report, the President will adhere vigorously to the position taken by him in his regular message.

As to Metcalf's report it has been learned its author found much to condemn in the matter of treatment of the Japanese outside of the school question. It will show, it is understood, that labor union tyranny over the Japanese affects the rights held to be theirs by treaty in even a more pronounced manner than anything connected with the school imbroglio. Matters of this nature in Metcalf's report will furnish the key for many arguments to be advanced by the President in his message.

TEN PER CENT INCREASE OF WAGES.

Scranton, Pa., Dec. 13.—The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad today announced a ten per cent increase of wages to all employees of the transportation department, effective January 1st next. This includes all station agents, baggage masters, clerks, operators, and other employees, affecting in all about 10,000 persons. The increase will add about \$150,000 yearly to the pay roll. The engineers, firemen and switchmen had already been granted a ten hour day and increases, and are not affected by the order.

GREAT NORTHERN STOCK ISSUE ILLEGAL.

St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 13.—Attorney Young, of Minnesota, today announced that under the state law the proposed \$60,000,000 increase in capital stock of the Great Northern railway, recently announced from New York, is invalid. Young holds that before the railroad can increase its capital stock it must serve notice of such intention upon the state railway commission for review and public hearing to determine the necessity for such increase. He also says that the increase of \$25,000,000 made last year must also be explained before either will become legal. The Great Northern operates under a Minnesota charter, and the original company was incorporated under territorial laws.

Stockholm, Sweden, Dec. 14.—King Oscar's condition shows considerable improvement today. Toward noon the following official bulletin was issued: "King Oscar passed a quiet night. He slept six hours, only coughed a little and his temperature was 100.9. Pulse still irregular, but due to increase of phlegm in the lungs. The patient's general condition is fairly satisfactory."

DEMOCRATIC PARTY SHOULD ACCEPT ISSUE.

Republican Administration Seems to Favor Imperialism.

New York, Dec. 14.—Edward M. Shepard declares that the Democratic party should accept the issue of centralization of power in the Federal government made by Secretary Root in his address Wednesday night. "I think the existence of the Democratic party is more necessary day after day," Mr. Shepard said, "and especially so if I think so after considering this speech of a man who may truthfully be called a trained statesman, although his idea of what our government would be is abhorrent to me. He proposes as a policy what

we may call the destruction of the state and final subordination of all state power to the Federal power in Washington. The fight of the Democratic party against this idea goes back to the days preceding the adoption of the Federal Constitution, and we owe the fact that a federal and not a consolidated republic was established to this fight."

SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE COMPLETE.

Paris, Dec. 14.—The first day of the regime of separation of church and state passed without grave disorders. Public interest in the details of the continuation of the struggle is already flagging. It is now apparent that the resistance of the clergy will be purely passive, and there is no prospect of religious passions being aroused unless the churches are closed. The government is therefore resting on its oars, and will continue to do so until the parliament authorizes the drastic measure which the cabinet is preparing. In the meantime in this city, except in churches where legal applications were filed, the police again took notes of infractions of the law at the morning masses.

RECOMMENDS BUILDING LARGER WAR SHIPS.

Washington, Dec. 14.—After declaring that in the design of vessels of the battle fleet the space and weight assigned to ammunition has been so restricted that the ammunition on board under certain conditions of battle would be expended in less than one hour, Rear Admiral Mason, chief of the Bureau of Ordnance, in his annual report urges the building of two vessels of considerable size, one for the Atlantic and one for the Pacific coast, devoted exclusively to the carriage of ammunition, and states that ultimately one of these vessels should be with each fleet.

CONGRESS PROPOSES TO INCREASE SALARIES.

Washington, Dec. 14.—The house today adopted the following amendment to the Legislative, Executive and Judicial appropriation bill: "On March 4, 1907, the compensation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and Vice President of the United States shall become \$12,000 each." An amendment was also adopted increasing the salaries of members of the President's cabinet to \$12,000 each, effective after March 4, 1907. Representative Littauer also offered an amendment increasing the salaries of senators and representatives to \$7,500 per annum, which compensation shall be in lieu of all other allowances, except actual individual traveling expenses from their homes to the seat of government and return by the most direct route once for each session.

ROOSEVELT THE FORERUNNER OF BRYAN.

Guthrie, O. T., Dec. 14.—In addressing the Oklahoma Constitutional convention today, Hon. Oscar B. Colquitt, a member of the Texas railroad commission, declared that railroad rate regulation in Texas has been a failure except in producing uniformity, and he quoted Mr. Mayfield of the same commission as acknowledging that it had been almost a failure. Commenting on the effort of President Roosevelt, Mr. Colquitt said that if strong men were kept on the Interstate Commerce Commission and the courts did not nullify their work, the Hepburn rate bill might satisfy the people. Otherwise he believed that Roosevelt would be the "forerunner of Bryan."

Colquitt was an advocate of railroad regulation in Texas when the cause was championed by the late Governor Hogg. He is the first prominent man in public life in Texas to declare it has been a failure in results.

WOULD REMEDY THE ANNUAL CAR SHORTAGE.

Chicago, Dec. 14.—A convention of shippers and receivers has been called to meet here January 4 to devise some means of remedying the car shortage which is an annual occurrence during the fall months. A week ago the lumber interests in Chicago got together and communicated by mail with one hundred big lumber operators of the country asking their advice upon the matter. Answers have been received from 25 communications, and in each case the reply favored bringing the shippers together to endeavor to remedy the evil.

Berlin, Dec. 13.—The Reichstag today by vote of 178 to 168 rejected the supplementary budget for German Southwest Africa, and Chancellor Von Buelow read an imperial message dissolving the parliament.

Senator Teller, of Colorado, has introduced a bill for the admission of New Mexico to statehood. It provides for a constitutional convention of sixty-six delegates, one representative from each of the judicial districts, headquarters Santa Fe, seventy-five thousand dollars for expenses of the constitutional convention and the election. It follows the general tone of the joint statehood bill and eliminates all reference to Arizona.

The "Barbarian," published at Albuquerque, by Rabbi J. H. Kaplan, defines conscience as follows: "Conscience with most people is that self-satisfied feeling of superiority that lays a flattering unctious to their soul, which stamps their action, done for pure self-gratification, as right, and most other people's as wrong. Put 300,000 negroes into the city of Boston and let them begin to assert their social and political rights, and the Bostonian would out-Tillman Tillman. The whites of this nation will never consent to blood relationship with Ethiopian or Mongolian, and in these days when the people of the whole world are rising in the scale of prowess and intelligence, the only safety for any nation is to maintain the numerical power of their own people—Las Vegas Optic.

ELEGANT AND EXPRESSIVE.

Albuquerque Journal, (Rep.)
No doubt Delegate Andrews spoke just as he felt when, in reply to a civil and proper question by a representative of the Journal he said, "What the hell do I want to talk about that for?" The subject referred to in this elegant and Andrews-like remark by the delegate, was the report which had been current for some time, that certain gentlemen of this territory had filed charges against Governor Hagerman, in which they alleged that the governor had "demoralized the republican party of New Mexico," the said demoralization being evidenced by the fact that whereas the normal republican majority in the territory is about ten thousand, Mr. Andrews had been able to pull through with only a beggarly two hundred and some odd, on the face of the returns—and we may fairly assume that this would be a very unpleasant matter for Mr. Andrews to think about, as well as to talk about, especially in view of the impression prevalent among men of all parties throughout the territory, that the republicans of New Mexico on the 6th of last month, repudiated the action of the packed convention at Las Vegas in forcing Mr. Andrews on the party again as its candidate for delegate, and that it required a good deal of very active manipulation on the part of his friends, who happened to have control of the election machinery in most of the counties, to make a showing of a bare majority for him on the face of the returns, and it is not at all unreasonable to suppose that Mr. Andrews may have some fears that Mr. Larrazolo, in presenting his case before the committee on privileges and elections of the next congress, may be able to show up some of the methods by which this bare majority on the face of the returns was made to materialize. That, of course, would be very unpleasant for Mr. Andrews, and that, we take it, accounts for his pious rejoinder to our correspondent at Washington, who had the temerity to suggest this disagreeable topic of conversation.

We believe that Mr. Andrews knows that a majority of the republicans of the territory did not want him for a second term, and that if they had been permitted to send to the convention delegates representatives of their will in the matter, he would not have been nominated. But when his nomination was forced upon the party by a convention packed for that purpose some of these men thought it better to vote for him lest the chances of statehood might be injured by the election of a democrat, and others supported him under protest out of regard for party discipline; but notwithstanding all these, there are good reasons for believing that a deal of crookedness had to be resorted to in order to give him even a bare majority on the face of the returns. And since Mr. Andrews knows full well what these reasons are, and upon what substantial foundations they are based, it is not surprising that he should inquire, "What the hell do I want to talk about that for?"—especially in view of the fact that the whole republican ticket, except the delegate, was elected by more than the normal majority—the legislature being almost unanimously republican in both branches.
