Washington, D. C., Mar. 5 .- U. S. Senator Clark, of Montana, today won the case against him in the supreme court of the United States, in which particularly affected. It now develops that Father Gapon was himself present at yesterday's meeting when Sechoff killed himself. Father Gregori Petroff charged Sechoff with obtaining \$2,500 from Father Gapon, and with having accompanied a member of the secret police in search of Malushensky, counselor and press agent of the Father Gapon movement, who fled with the organization's funds. During the meeting Sechoff made an impassioned speech, declaring that he could not endure the infamy involved in the charge that the organization had been in league with the government, nor the obloquy heaped upon himself, as both he and the organization were innocent. He then called upon Father Ganon to declare in the presence of his fellows whether he (Sechoff) had received a cent from the government. Father Gapon arose and exonerated Sechoff, whereupon the latter said "I will give you the supreme proof of my honesty," and drawing a revolver, blew out his brains.
