From what could be learned from persons who escaped from the building it appeared that the fire was accidentally started, probably by dropping lighted eigar on the carpet in the hallway on the second floor. The smouldering fire filled the building with heavy smoke and several were suffocated.

Many of the bodies were found in the beds in the same position as they slept. Others were found in the hallways, lying face downward in positions that mutely portrayed how they had vainly endeavored to save their lives. Some were half clad and others were nothing but night clothing. It was by means of articles and letters in pockets of what little clothing some of the dead persons wore, that many identifications were made.

#### A FATAL ALLEGED DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Secretary Wilson Tells What Has Been Done During the Past Year.

#### CUT OFF FROM ESCAPE INSPECTION OF ANIMALS

Experiments With Alfalfa and Investigation of Soils in the A-id Regions Affected by Alkali.

Washington, Dec. 4,-The annual reort of the secretary of agriculture as submitted to congress today.

The secretary opens his report with reference to the educational work of he department, which he says ha grown in effectiveness since his innual report. He finds that the mands of many public institutions for men to conduct research in scientific fields and for ability to manage agriultural enterprises encourage young nen to take advantage of the oppor tunities thus afforded. The teaching of the science of agriculture and of the sciences relating to it are receiving more attention in the colleges instituted for the purpose, many of which have neglected their full duty in the

The past year affords evidence of the value of forecast warnings of the weather bureau in saving life and proper ty. Ample testimony is afforded that the value of property thus saved from loss amounts to many times the cost of maintaining the bureau. The secretary urges the desirability of extending the distribution of daily forecasts coextensively with the rural free delivery. Of the 10,000 rural free delivery routes existing August 1, 1902, it has been found possible to serve only 1,000. To make the distribution coextensive with the rural free delivery would, he estimates ost about \$100,000.

Experiments in wireless telegraphy ave been made under the direction of he chief of the weather bureau, be ginning nearly two years ago, but the rogress reported will not justify the department in dispensing with roast telegraph and cable lines.

INSPECTION OF ANIMALS. Under the inspection service of the bureau of animal industry antemortem inspections for the year aggregate nearly 60,000,000, at a cost of a fraction over one cent each. The number of postmortem inspections was near 39,000,000. The meat inspection stamp was affixed to over 23,000,000 packages of meat products, and the number of certificates of ordinary inspection issued for meat products for export, ex-Th quantity of pork examined microscopically and exported exceeded 33,000,000 pounds. Altogether the value of exports of animals and animal productions for the year amounted to \$244,-733,062. The clearances of vessels carrying livestock was 837, and the Inspection of these vessels has reduced the percentage of loss in ocean transit to 0.13 per cent for cattle, 0.89 per cent for sheep, and to 0.65 per cent

There were inspected and admitted from Mexico over 65,000 cattle, and ful-

ly 6,000 sheep, lambs, and goats. The bureau of animal industry has continued its investigations in contaglous diseases with a view to their prevention or remedy. Over one and onehalf million doses of black-leg vaccine were distributed during the year. Reports show that its use reduced the oss of cattle to 0.51 per cent of those

The losses to sheep owners from poisonous plants aggregate annually \$400,000. The study of these poisonous plants has developed an antidote for some of them, not only effective but which can be rapidly applied.

The department is investigating the subject of cold storage as a necessary adjunct to the rapidly developing fruit interests. A fruit district survey has been undertaken to determine the varleties of the different fruits best suite to the conditions prevailing in various localities, and to study the influence of conditions upon their behavior.

The senator from Indiana, the chairman of the committee on territories, has stated in open senate today, that the committee will report on the territorial bill, so-called, on the third day of the next session of congress. The report of the committee on territories of the senate was not a surprise to the people of New Mexico and Arlzona. An adverse report had been expected and it now remains to be seen whether the Republican senators who are favorable to admitting New Mexice and Arizona will unite with the Democrats and will pass the omnibus bill despite the disposition of a few leaders to deny this territory right and justice.

Congress is much more favorably disposed towards reciprocity with Cuba than it was when it adjourned a few months ago. This is altogether due to President Roosevelt and the endorsement his administration received at the polls on November 4. President Roosavelt is convincing many even against their will that he is a farsighted statesman whom it is safe to follow in every particular.

One of the most influential advertisements that the climate of New Mexico has ever received is that included in the annual report of the secretary of the treasury. Leslie M. The gross earnings from traffic were \$1,612,448,826 and the operating expenses were \$1,092,154,099, leaving net earnings from traffic of \$520. 294,727 in addition to \$68,368,814 other receipts. The equipment of the railroads includes 39,729 locomotives 27,144 passenger cars, 8,667 baggage and mail cars and 1,409,472 freight cars, The capital stock of the railroads totals \$5,978,796,249 and their bonded debt amounts to \$6,035,469,741. #### A FIGHT THAT CONCERNS NEW MEXICO.

New Mexico is very much interested in the fight for the control of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, which has been going on for several months. That company operates the coal mines at Madrid in Santa Fe county, the largest mines near Gallup, McKinley county, Iron mines in Grant county, is about to open coal deposits in Sierra county and has other large interests in this terriory, employing over 1,000 men It is no wonder therefore that the people of New Mexico do not look with favor upon the merging of the company's property into the larger consolidations which have been formed to control the eastern steel and iron trade. They anticipate the possibility of this local industry becoming a pawn in a larger game which might include in its opening moves the closing of the works and the mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, which not only would be disastrous in a direct way but also indirectly, as it would discourage the upbuilding of other industries in the southwest. Beyond this selfish interest in the outcome of the present contest there is a sentiment of peculiarly strong loyalty and good will toward the men who, bit by bit, built up the splendld superstructure of a local coal and iron business of noble dimensions upon natural resources which they themselves developed and by their skillful management for the past twenty years have administered in a manner very beneficial to this section. The company has upon its pay rolls 15,000 men and pays out \$750,-000 monthly in wages. The throwing out of employment of this great army of laborers would be a hard blow to the prosperity of the Centennial state and partly also to New Mexico.

#### DISASTROUS FOREST FIRES.

The bureau of forestry at Washington reports that the damage caused by the recent forest fires in Oregon amounted to \$3,910,000, and the damage in Washington to \$8,857,000. In Oregon the amount of standing timber on the land burned over, it is estimated, would have yielded 2,124,000,000 feet of lumber, valued at \$2,449,000, and in Washington the estimate is that the lay in a new stock of perseverance and Douglas spruce killed or destroyed would have yielded 5,026,800,000 feet of lumber. Much other valuable timber was burned. The direct cause of these disastrous fires was carelessness. In the Cascade forest reserve, which is patrolled by rangers, practically no damage was done. 


