

Spanish Fleet Sailed from Cape Verde Islands Today-French and German Consuls Protest Against Bombardment of Matanzas.

New York, April, 29 .- A dispatch to Wall street news agency says that the monitor Terror and gunboat Machias has bombarded Cardenas, killing many

Spaniards, but after an hour's firing the batteries of the enemy were siledleed.

An Evening Post special from Key West says: "Reports from the blockading fleet this morning were to the effect that the bombardment of Matanzas on Monday was followed vesterday by on Monday was followed yesterday by the bombardment of Cardenas, east of Matanzas, on the north coast of Cuba. At that station were the monitor Terror and gunboat Machias. A shot from shore batteries provoked them to fire back. For two hours Cardenas with-stood the bombardment, then the ancient guns which did no damage to the ships suddenly grew silent."

#### SANTA FE LAND TITLES.

Attorneys of the City Should Prepare Bill for Introduction in Congress-Delegate

Fergusson's Letter on Subject. The rejection of the land grant upon which the city of Santa Fe is located, by the United States Supreme court leaving unsettled titles to real estate in the city. efforts have been and are being made to secure legislation in congress which will quiet all titles to tracts of land and lots on the land formerly supposed to be within the Santa Fe land grant. At the meeting of the board of county commissioners of Santa Fe county held April 12, a resolution was passed requesting Delegate Fergusson to intro-duce a bill for that purpose in the house. A copy of the resolution was sent Mr. Fergusson by County Clerk Romero, to which the following reply has been received:

Mr. Atanacio Romero, Santa Fe. N. N. Washington, D. C., April 19, 1898.

—My dear Sir:—I have received your favor of April 12th inclosing the resolutions of the board of county commissioners of the county of Santa Fe. I am well aware that legislation by congress is necessary to properly settle the titles to real estate in the city of Santa Fe, and I have been not only ready, but quite anxious to press that matter to a conclusion in congress. matter to a conclusion in congress. For two reasons, however, I have not yet introduced the bill. The first is, that it was thought advisable to wait until all the grants as claimed, which seemed to affect the titles, should be passed on by the land court. Lately that has been practically done, as I was informed by Mr. Reynolds here in Washington. But the second reason why I have not introduced the bill is this: That Mr. practically done, as I was informed by Mr. Reynolds here in Washington. Bu the second reason why I have not introduced the bill is this: That Mr Spiess and Mr. Gildersleeve both prom ised to prepare a bill which would be in the opinion of the lawyers of Santa Fe, both acceptable to all the people of Santa Fe, and also one that would most

certainly accomplish the purpose and fully protect the titles. These gentle-men have not yet sent me a draft of such bill. I relied on it that they would so send me a bill, and therefore have not myself made the exhaustive study that would enable me, unaided, to prepare a bill such as would protect the titles. You and the board can see the advantage of having such bill prepared by Santa F lawyers, who, presumably, know all the technical points to be guarded.

#### Spanish Treachery.

In regard to privateering Spain is indulging in her usual tactics of deceit. While declaring that she will not engage in privateering, she is arranging to begin at once and at the same time gives notice that American privateers will be treated as pirates, even though armed with authority from the congress of the United States. All this treacherous business should warn this country that it has a nost cruel, inhuman and treacherous enemy, that has never yet observed the laws of war in any conflict, domestic or foreign, and must, under the circumstances, be watched accordingly.

It is probable that the best sentiment of this country is against privateering. and the chances are that no privateers will be commissioned. But Spain should be informed early in the action that under no circumstances are American prisoners to be treated as pirates, with impunity, and that any such conduct on Spain's part will be met with reprisals. Steps should be taken to inform the Spanish authorities, civil, military and naval, that soldiers, sailors and citizens of the United States are not Cuban insurgents, and they are not to be treated as such when captured.

The United States stands in the attitude of a civilized power prepared to carry on war according to the rules of civilized warfare, engaged in a conflict with a nation which is notoriously disregardful of such obligations. The United States has, therefore, nothing to expect or to hope from its enemy and must enforce its rights in order to secure
