**OPENING LECTURE OF SUMMER SESSION SUNDAY.**

Dr. Lewis B. Paton, One of Foremost Scholars of World, Will Deliver It at the Capitol.  
 The opening lecture of the summer session of the School of American Archaeology will be given at the Hall of representatives in the Capitol building, Sunday night, July 30, at 8:30. The lecture will be Dr. Lewis B. Paton, formerly director of the American School of Archaeology in Palestine, who is one of the foremost authorities in the world on the history and archaeology in the Holy land.  
 The subject of the lecture, "Jerusalem in the Time of Christ," is one of absorbing interest to the people of every civilized land, and Dr. Paton presents it as very few scholars are prepared to do.  
 This, like all the Sunday night lectures of the course during the month of August, is a free lecture, and a cordial invitation is extended to the entire public to attend.  
 The lectures are placed a little later in the evening than usual so as not to conflict with the band concerts in the Plaza. The churches have dismissed their Sunday evening services so as to enable all their members to attend the lectures at the Capitol building.  
 Dr. Paton's lecture will be illustrated with a large number of stereopticon views prepared under his personal direction while a resident of Jerusalem.

Tired But Happy, After Tramp That Took Them to Upper Pecos and the Lake Peaks.  
 Scout Master Francis C. Wilson and his Boy Scouts returned yesterday afternoon from their ten days' hike to Winsor's on the Upper Pecos. The boys stood the tramp well and had the time of their young lives. They made their journey leisurely and saw all the sights en route, including Holy Ghost Lake on top of the Lake Peaks at an altitude of 12,000 feet. They did not go into camp on the Panchuels until the fourth day out and even then kept on the move. They encountered no heavy rains, but a contemplated ascent of Santa Fe Baldy, almost 13,000 ft. high, was abandoned because of the dense clouds that covered the peak. Fishing was not as good as had been anticipated, but still there were enough trout to go around at meal times. Wild strawberries served as dessert and pancakes were a daily standby. The home trip over the Knox trail was made in two days and the boys arrived yesterday afternoon after having walked fifteen miles since the forenoon, the night before having been spent in the rangers' cabin on Lake Peak.

It was pointed out at the meeting of the automobile club that Santa Fe should make an effort to bring autoists here and keep them as long as possible, as they spend a good deal of money. Wedded This Afternoon—Samuel Flanigan of Santa Fe, and Miss Myrtle Mosher, also of this city, were married this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the M. E. parsonage on Don Gaspar avenue by Rev. B. F. Summers. The groom has a position at Las Vegas and will go to the Meadow City.

Writ of Habeas Corpus—A. G. Halcomb who had been sent home to Roswell from the asylum for the insane at Las Vegas on parole, has sued out a writ of habeas corpus to prevent his being returned to the asylum. He claims he is sane and that efforts to declare him of unsound mind are simply to get a hold of his property. The case is set for July 31. In the meanwhile Halcomb is in jail.

Must Close on Sunday—The mayor and aldermen of El Paso have given strict instructions to the police force that the very strict Baskin-McGregor saloon regulation law must be enforced Sundays and weekdays and that the police must keep especially watch on every saloon. Any policeman failing to close a saloon open on Sunday or to report other violations, is to be dismissed forthwith.

manufacturer woolen rates correspondingly. These rates are still high above the rates proposed in the Underwood bill, especially on wool, which was placed at 20 per cent ad valorem.

Penrose Pleased. Washington, D. C., July 27.—"The situation is entirely to our liking" said Chairman Penrose of the finance committee.

"We are satisfied that the president will veto any bill that can be sent to him within range prescribed and what shall proceed next winter and whatever tariff revision may be necessary. Then we shall have the tariff board's report and can work intelligently."

Farmers Free List Up. Washington, D. C., July 27.—The farmers free list bill was laid before the Senate by Senator Penrose today and was made the unfinished business.

Senator Bristow of Kansas announced he would offer amendments to be voted on tomorrow. The final vote on the bill will occur Tuesday of next week.

How It Was Done. Washington, D. C., July 27.—The passage of the bill came after a defeat of the Underwood House bill, 44 to 36, on almost a party vote, after the original La Follette substitute had been voted down with only the Republican insurgents in its favor.

Having secured a vote on the Underwood bill, as passed by the House, the Democrats then supported a motion made by Senator La Follette to reconsider the vote by which their bill was defeated.

As soon as the motion to reconsider had been carried, La Follette offered his compromise.
